### THE FEVER SITUATION.

Last Tuesday morning Drs. Sabatier, Sanders, King and Shaw, having pronounced the cases of Fever at the homes of Hon. Walter J. Burke and Mr. H. C. Brooks, yellow fever, the Health Officer of New Iberia Dr. Sanders, at once quarantined the district in which the cases is located, commencing at Prairie Ave. (Knights' store) and extending east to Lewis Avenue, bounded on the north by Bayou Teche on the South by Railroad. No one living in that district was allowed egress and those absent up-town were ordered to their homes by the Chief of Police, orders in which all cheerfully acquiesced. Fumigation of every house in the district was performed last Thursday, all the yards and streets were thoroughly oiled and every necessary sanitary measure was immediately put in vogue. The cases to Thursday numbering eleven. One at the home of Mr. R. F. Hogsett, his little daughter Ruth, being stricken; four of the children of Mr. Burke; five in the family of Mr. C. L. Gueses and one of the children of Mr. Rene Delahoussaye, all doing well up to this writing. It is thought that with an intelligent fight at all points the fever can be restricted to the district where it has appeared.

The very low temperature of Wednesday and Thursday mornings gives the hope that frost will soon occur and end the whole matter. At any rate the appearance of the fever at this date does not alarm, as the frost date cannot be very far distant. Our people are taking the matter philosophically and after the first flurry of excitement, have settled down to a stern fight and of hearty co-operation with the Health Authorities. Under these conditions it is not thought that the fever will spread.

The Parish Health officials have instituted quarantine against the City of New Iberia temporarily, and if no further developments occur, and we show them that the cases in New Iberia are isolated, we sincerely believe that they will raise the quarantine by next Friday, if not sooner.

Since writing the above, Hon. W. J. Burke has been taken with the fever though not yet diagnosed as Yellow Fever.

### YOUTH, AGE AND THE ASHES OF DESTINY.

Youth sees through rosy glasses and the bleak and lovely of life alike take on delicate, mellow tones, elusive ghosts of color beyond the power of any material brush. Old age through failing of sight, looks at life through flawless spectacles, which keeps the vision and reveals vivid pictures, sharply defined contrasts in light and shade and melancholy monotonies in gray.

Sorrow's banner is gray, symbolizing the mist of tears, the sunless yesterdays of the regret that mingles its tears with sorrow. Black to give to grief, deep, tragic, inconsolable—grief that no word may measure, not plummet sound that no one may comfort, that nothing may lighten save the touch of God. These differences in heart pain enable us to lapse naturally from gray to black, like the eastern sky at sunset.

Grief is a tragedy, sorry an intermezzo of tears. In some lives both are combined, and we have either a soul that rises triumphant from its incarceration or one that, hopelessly overwhelmed, utters a plaintive cry of pain and vanishes into the eternal tomorrow. A Brooklyn septuagenarian who had gathered for long years found himself beyond the allotted years of man, not holding the rare blooms of life, but rank weeds. Then he sent a bullet into his head, having first penned this message to his son: "You can't have things as you want them. In your old days you can't have them that way. You've got to prepare in your youth for that time when your hair turns gray. If I had it all to do over again I would have quite a different ending. But that is impossible now, so I must go."

Happy old age, it will be seen owes an inestimable debt to youth. The stripling, flushed with confidence, who steps forth into the world of stress and struggle carries in his hands all the secret of the future, though he may not divine what will follow in the end.

Time, rich in potentialities, one minute of which is sometimes worth an eternity, men dissipate with the prodigal spirit of the spend thrift. Time is our brief but priceless heritage, and he who lives no idle, no unproductive moment, is he who builds for a symmetrical life, rounded into that content which shapes old age into a benediction.

Senator Platt in his seventy-two years voices the lament of this Brooklyn man who brought to his disappointment a pathetic weakness. The one stands strong and drugged in his failure; the other was overcome. They are as a stern admonition to the strong and the weak who go out in the blossoming fields of worth while to "gather handfuls while we may;" a lesson that life is a thing of purpose and that no one may disregard the sterling and true without eventually bearing a bitter penalty.

Peace may be the award that awaits at the end of the way, and peace may come to us in the severe reaches of the troubled journey. To him who loves nature, despite the forces which break with harsh discords into his existence, life cannot be wholly unlovely. He may reap along the way that which will be realized at its fullness at the end. Benson, an English poet, in his recent verse:

"By the Wier," sounds with compelling charm, this note: "Ah me! but we forget to live! We sell sweet days for wealth and pride; And when we have no more to give, The soul is still unsatisfied! Well, I have labored, I have planned; For once my plans, my labors cease, God lays to-day a loving hand Upon my shoulder, saying Peace!" —New York Telegram.

### SMALL COTTON MANUFACTURERS.

At the Thibodeaux meeting of the Louisiana Press Association the editor of "The People" read a paper advocating cotton manufacturing on the smallest scale in every town or settlement possessing an electric power plant, and he attributed the slowness in the expansion of this the natural correlative industry of the South to the erroneous idea that extensive and costly plants only can be successfully operated.

We can see no good reason why small electric motors could not turn a few looms and spindles in a good sized room of a cheap building, and give pleasant and steady employment and living wages to as few as six or twelve girls or women, who, under present conditions, find more or less difficulty to earn a living in the Southern communities where they reside. For these small manufacturers there would be no need to import operatives from other places, as their capacity and the cost of these manufactures would be regulated by the number of operatives that the locality could furnish.

A few thousand dollars would suffice to start and operate manufacturers of this kind, but in the aggregate the quantity of cloths they would turn out annually would go on increasing the demand for the raw cotton and compel the now dictatorially inclined great manufacturers in this country and abroad to cheerfully pay more for it to the cotton grower than they are disposed to do.

Electric motors are used to operate street and railway cars, elevators, printing presses, sewing and may other sorts of machines. Why can they not be used as well for these small cotton manufactures?

Louisiana is producing any quantity of cheap fuel oil with which the electric power can be generated at the lowest cost.

We submit that the Legislature could not appropriate to greater advantage to the people in general, a moderate sum to equip small textile departments at each of the three industrial colleges, namely, at Ruston, Lafayette and Baton Rouge. Nor could any more beneficial industrial art be taught by these institutions.—The People.

### PARISH BOARD OF HEALTH.

NEW IBERIA, LA., Oct. 10, 1905.  
At a special meeting of the Parish Board of Health held this day at Olivier, La., as per call of Dr. Emmer, President of said Board, for the purpose of considering the yellow fever situation at New Iberia all the members being present, the following business was transacted: Mr. A. B. Romero being absent, Mr. Henry Pharr was appointed temporary secretary.

Dr. Emmer informed the Board of the action of the Police Jury, and presented the resolution passed by the Police Jury this day, the same was by motion of Mr. Goula seconded by Mr. Labau declared duly adopted.

The resolution adopted reads as follows, to wit:

An ordinance establishing a quarantine against the City of New Iberia.

Be it ordained by the Parish Board of Health in special session duly assembled that we do hereby adopt and co-operate in the ordinance of the Police Jury this day adopted in special session at New Iberia, a copy of which is before this body, and the same is made part of our laws.

And be it further ordained that we hereby declare by virtue vested in us, that the Parish of Iberia this day quarantine against the City of New Iberia, and that no one in the City of New Iberia be hereafter, from this day, permitted to enter the Parish limits, except after complying with the detention laws and going through detention camp of the Parish.

And be it further ordained that an effective system of guards be posted around the City of New Iberia to enforce this ordinance.

Moved by Mr. Labau seconded by Mr. Goula and carried that the Board adjourn subject to call.

### SPECIAL MEETING OF POLICE JURY.

NEW IBERIA, LA., Oct. 10, 1905.

In obedience to a special call issued this morning by President Labau for the purpose of considering the advisability of establishing a quarantine against New Iberia and the members being duly notified and a quorum being present, Mr. Lemaire was called to the chair, when this body proceeded to business.

The following ordinance, introduced by Mr. Boutte was read and on motion of Mr. Boutte seconded by Mr. Miguez was unanimously carried.

An ordinance establishing a quarantine against the City of New Iberia and providing for the moving of the lines as required by necessities.

Be it ordained by the Police Jury of Iberia Parish in special session duly assembled that in view of the fact that two cases of yellow fever are reported to exist in the lower end of the City of New Iberia that by virtue of the power granted by law to this body, the Parish Board of Health, co-operating, the City of New Iberia is hereby declared quarantined and the Parish Board of Health ordered to establish an effective system of guards to keep the people of New Iberia out of Iberia Parish.

And be it further ordained that the Parish Board of Health is hereby delegated the power without further action on the part of this body to contract the lines of this quarantine within the City limits or any portion of same or recommend the same to the City Board of Health or to extend the lines outside the said City limits or to isolate any cases that might occur in any portion of the Parish.

It is further ordained that the Parish Board of Health be requested to consult the experts, if any are sent here regarding the future actions under this ordinance.

It was moved by Mr. Decuir seconded by Mr. Boutte that the City Board of Health be requested if they have not already done so, to call in an expert on yellow fever for the purpose of assisting in the fight against yellow fever. Motion provided.

Moved by Mr. Dallas seconded by Mr. Boutte and carried, Mr. Lemaire is hereby constituted a committee of one to call on the chairman of the City Board of Health to inform him of the action of the Police Jury and call his attention to the resolutions just adopted.

On motion of Mr. Dallas duly seconded and carried the meeting adjourned.

### PRESIDENT'S FLEET.

The entire American DeForest Wireless Telegraph Company is making elaborate plans to have in perfect working order their system of coast stations in time for the passage South of the West Virginia and the voyage north of the President.

Mr. Sam McD. Herndon, manager of this end of the Company, stated yesterday that the wireless system would keep in touch and in constant communication with the fleet from the time they started South until they reached the city, of a point off the mouth of the harbor. They would also be in constant communication with the fleet all during their stay, and would follow the vessel northward until she reached Washington. This communication would be maintained by a relay system, and as fast as the fleet would lose one station they would be able to pick up another, and these powerful shore sta-

tions would exchange all the communication between each plant. In this way every point where there is a wireless plant would be perfectly informed upon the movements of the ships and the messages leaving the vessels. The local station can hear the messages as far as Key West without the slightest trouble, but the plant of the cruisers is not sufficiently strong to send a message that far. The big shore plant can easily be heard. Owing to the lack of power in the ship's outfit it will be necessary to relay, but there will be absolutely no time lost in this relaying.

Mr. Herndon had a message yesterday from Galveston telling of the perfect success with which they heard the communication between the city and Southwest Pass during the storm a few days ago. Cleveland a day or two ago was in communication with Pensacola, and Cleveland and New York have been

in perfect communication for days. A letter from the manager of the Southside Station in Chicago told of a message they heard New York sending to Montreal, a distance of 1,000 miles overland. Mr. Herndon added that the big local plant, which is located on Mandeville street, has been delayed on account of the slowness in delivering a part of the machinery. That plant is guaranteed to communicate a distance of about 1,500 miles overland and about 5,000 miles at sea. There will be no difficulty when this plant is in working order to communicate with the wireless station at Colon, Boas, Bocons del Toro, Panama and Port Limon, Costa Rica.
