Rayne.—The condition of the rice crop on 154,450 acres of rice land in Louisiana and Texas, according to reports made from five points in Louisiana and one in Texas to the Rice Journal and Southern Farmer, is from 12 to 50 per cent below what was expected at planting time, the average from the points reported being about 40 per cent under normal. This is due to the drought principally, according to the reports, making it too dry for the rice recently planted to grow and also curtailing the supply of water for both pumps and canals.


