Mr. Conery and his party returned to New Orleans Tuesday after expressing themselves as pleased with the prospects for trolley line as a paying investment. Mr. Conery will be back here next week probably. It is stated that he expects to begin work on the line within sixty days, and to push the construction of the line along as rapidly as possible. It is probable that the first line will be built to the east from here although it is also thought that a line to St. Martinville will be constructed at the same time.

According to the articles of incorporation this will be "for hire as well as to use the same for all suitable purposes." The Company proposes to "engage in any business for which the building might be suitable, such as skating rink, bowling alley, etc." It is probable that work will begun on the structure before long.

FORT BROWN ABANDONED.

Washington, Sept. 21.—Fort Brown at Brownsville, Tex., has been abandoned by direction of President Roosevelt, and Company H of the Twenty-six Infantry, the only troops there, were to-day ordered to Fort Sam Houston, Tex. Fort Brown was abandoned because of trouble between whites of the city and the negro soldiers of the Twentieth Infantry, which resulted of the soldiers shooting up the town. The negro soldiers are now at Fort Reno, O. T.

Fort Brown has been put in charge of caretakers, and it is not likely that it will ever again be occupied by troops, unless there should be trouble with some of the countries to the south.

Working on Deep Water.

Morgan City, La., Sept.—Contractor W. B. Reed and Engineer Squires left here today for work on the survey, staking and sound for deep water through Atchafalaya Bay to the Gulf. They are employed by the Atchafalaya Bay Channel Company. It will take several weeks to complete the work.
