DEATH OF ROBERT H. CAGE.

All that was mortal of Robert H. Cage, at one time one of New Iberia's leading citizens was interred yesterday after the arrival of the train from New Orleans. The Grand Lodge of Masons of the State of which he was Past Grand Master conducted the impressive ceremonies which were held in the Episcopal church and which were attended by hundreds of his friends who mourn his untimely departure from this life.

As a Mason he was known all over the South and as a man he was loved by all who knew him. He had a plain, open-hearted way which won the sincere friendship of every one with whom he came in contact.

Mr. Cage was made a Mason of the Aurora Lodge, New Iberia, in 1889, and was elected Senior Deacon in 1891, Senior Warden in 1892, and Worshipful Master in 1893 and 1894. He was made a Royal Arch Mason in the Keystone Chapter, Alexandria, and assisted in the reorganization of Girard Hope Chapter, New Iberia, of which he became a member. In 1894, 1895 and 1896 he served as High Priest. He received the Cryptic degree in Summit Council, of Alexandria, La., and upon the organization of Gordy Council, New Iberia, joined that Council. He was elected Th. Ill. Master in 1895 and re-elected in 1896. He served as Grand Junior Warden in 1893, and at the session of 1894 was elected Grand Senior Warden. He served as Grand Scribe of the Grand Chapter during 1895 and 1896, and was named Excellent Grand High Priest in 1896.

He was also Grand Treasurer of the Grand Council from 1902 until 1907, retiring from that office.

The body was met here at the train by the full membership of Aurora Lodge No. 193 which had met at its hall at three o'clock and was escorted to the Church where the religious services were conducted by Bishop Davis Sessoms of the Episcopal Church. Thence the cortege moved to the Protestant cemetery where the interment took place with the public grand honors of masonry.

MINOS DUGAS.

That there is about to be a boom in New Iberia and that there is already an enquiry on the quiet for lands for subdivision into City lots is evidenced by an occurrence of the last week when an offer of \$17,000 and \$10,000 in stock of a company formed in Minneapolis for a central tract of land was made by representatives of the Syndicate who had been here for three weeks or more looking into the section and its possibilities. The offer was declined by the owners of the land who feel that it was not enough and that better prices may be obtained when the trolley line is built and the road to Port Barre is built during the coming year.


The property referred to is the Lourd tract across the Bayou comprising in the neighborhood of 140 acres and occupying the land between and surrounded by the Bayou on the three sides, directly opposite the heart of the City. That some day it will be opened to homes, that it will be the site of a big hotel and that it will be a fine residence section is the opinion of many and while it is regretted that the northern enterprising syndicate did not bid enough for it, it is believed that the day is not far distant when it will be on the market.

It is understood that this syndicate intended to build a steel bridge across the bayou either at the foot of Jefferson St., or Corinne and to subdivide the property, opening up streets and grading them as well paving on the regular northern plan of operation. But the offer was declined and it is not known whether the syndicate is looking at other plots or not. It is hoped that it may be suited here and may invest their money on the lines of that intended with the property mentioned.




