## LOCAL NEWS.

That there is money in figs has just been discovered by several of the farmers living on the outskirts of the City. One of these gentlemen the other day was complaining that his figs were growing to waste, were ripening and that there was no sale for them. Apparently he had never heard that there is a canning factory at Avery's Island, but he was so informed by Mr. John R. Taylor and a little conversation over the telephone resulted in the disposal of his crop at fair prices. He now counts figs as one of the best paying products of his farm for his only labor with them is the picking. They are growing and making money for him while he goes about his other business.

This climate evidently agrees with figs and according to those who have planted out a few trees they do well with out hardly any attention. As preserves they are in demand and a cannery is always glad to get them. The trouble is to get them to the cannery with small expense. When the City Canal is finished it is probable that a cannery will be established here and that figs will be one of the fruits it can handle to advantage. Those who have room to spare are advised to plant fig trees and reap the reward later on.

Quite a number of people have got within the last few days to the Peebles Coulee where Mr. W. S. Davidson is dredging a drainage canal towards the Bayou. It has been found that excellent progress has been made and in the opinion of most of the visitors this canal should have been made navigable at the start. As it is, it is feared that vegetation may be troublesome as in other drainage canals which do not carry tide water.

With an additional depth and width it could easily be made a canal that would be of use to persons desiring to reach the Bay. It is understood that the property owners are thinking about making this a navigable waterway, but it is not certain that anything will be done until it has been decided whether there is a chance for the Inter coastal canal to accept this route.
