A. J. Ulrich, traffic manager of the company, says the girls, in answering calls, and the patrons in making them, use the word 900,000 times, every twenty four hours. Estimating that it requires half a second to say the word, 7,500 minutes are consumed every twenty-four hours, which is a loss of 125 hours.

SCHOOL NEWS.

The Parish Superintendent has arranged with the editor of this paper for space in which to report the school news. It is his desire in so far as it is possible, to let the people know, not only of what is being done in the school room, but of the effort that is being put forth by those interested in making the school facilities such that every child of school age in the Parish may have an opportunity to attend.

Ases-or-Poirson's report shows that there are 4984 white children of educable age in the Parish, and every one of these children have a right to be in school, and ought to be there every day school is in session. If there are not enough school houses, then more must be built; if there are not enough wagnettes, then more must be provided; if there are not enough teachers already employed to teach the children, then more must be employed. It is a problem easily solved. If the School Board has not money sufficient to make the school facilities what they ought to be, then it is your duty as a reasonable and fair-minded man having the welfare of your children at heart to help in providing it.

The following schools were opened last week: New Iberia, Jeanerette, Darby, Patoutville, Weeks, Lydia, Peebles, Duboin, Dugas, Norres, Bodin, Jefferson, Avery Island, Steckler, Loreauville, Belle Place, Prince, Bonin, LeBlanc, Coteau, Segna and Derouen. There are two other schools in the Parish that will be opened as soon as board can be had in the communities for the teachers.

In all the schools that have been heard from, the enrollment is very gratifying. In fact, in some, it has proven a record breaker. In Jeanerette, it has been found necessary to rent rooms and put in two more teachers in order to accommodate all the children that applied for admission. Two teachers have been added to the corps in New Iberia since school opened, and it may be necessary to add a third before relief is given to all the teachers.

The School Board is trying for the first time, the transferring of children from the country districts to school centers. So far, it is such a success that the number of transfers has already been increased from four to five, and the number may still be increased, as an application for a sixth is on file.

The Parish Teachers Association will hold its first meeting in the Central High School building on the first Saturday in October, at which time the following programme will be rendered:

- V.—Among Country Schools.—"Beautifulizing School Grounds" by J. W. Honeycutt.
- VI.—Address by the Parish Superintendent.
- VII.—Principles of Teaching by Prof. E. L. S. Brown.
- VIII.—Department meetings.
- IX.—Assignment of work for the next meeting and miscellaneous business.
- X.—Adjournment.

Each teacher will be given two minutes to talk on their reading during the vacation, on their plans for professional improvement, on their progress made in the organization of a "School Improvement Association."

These meetings are open to the public, and all interested in the work of developing the schools throughout the Parish are cordially invited to attend.

Austin, Sept. 9.—Former State Senator E. A. Atlee of Webb county, now general attorney for one of the Mexican railroads, was here yesterday on business with some of the state departments. He said that the union season just closed has been one of the most successful in the history of the onion industry of Webb county. The onion growers all made a good crop and got top prices for their products and as a result have plenty money in bank. He said this season's crop netted the growers in Webb county \$350,000.

THE FLOWER GARDEN.
