TO DETERMINE QUALITY OF FABRICS

1. If you wish to find out whether the material sold to you as all wool or all silk is really so, make a five per cent solution of caustic potash and in this boil your sample of silk or wool. If the entire sample is consumed in the boiling, your material is what it pretends to be; if there is a residue is cotton. The caustic solution consumes the animal fibers.
2. If you wish to find out whether the silk that seems to be heavy silk is weighed with mineral, burn the sample and the ash will show you how much mineral weighting there is. The pure silk will be wholly consumed.
3. In buying supposed linen goods of toweling or suitings, dip your sample into concentrated sulphuric acid for two minutes and wash it out carefully. The cotton will have been consumed, the linen will have resisted the action of the acid. This test is one that should be made with precaution, as vitriol is not a thing to be tampered with.—Mary Heaton Vorse.
