Mr. Jules Blanchet was engaged for the past seven days procuring the signatures and reported to us that he had secured more than the required signatures and found no opposition whatever to the proposition as proposed. **DEATH OF LEONARD S. FRERE**  
The death last Wednesday evening at Covington, La., of Parish Assessor Leonard S. Frere, while not unexpected, was a shock to many of the citizens of Iberia and St. Mary Parishes, who held him in great esteem. Mr. Frere and his family had for about fifteen months seen fit to take up their residence in the above place to get the benefit of the fresh air and waters of that health resort which beyond a doubt, prolonged his life many months. Mr. Frere came to New Iberia in the year 1884 from St. Mary Parish, buying farm property and engaged in farming for several years, later being appointed Assessor, serving two terms under appointment by Gov. Foster and another under Gov. Heard and was again honored by the vote to the same office in the year 1908 to the present time. His remains arrived here on Thursday evening and was met at the depot by a large delegation from the Elks Lodge of New Iberia, who accompanied the body to the Epiphany church, where services were held by Rev. Diggs in the presence of a large concourse of sympathetic friends. Deceased leaves a widow, Mrs. Fannie Compton, formerly of Alexandria and one son, Mr. A. G. Frere, and several brothers and sisters to mourn his demise, among them being Dr. Thos. Frere, Gayland, Willie, Hugh, Fred, Bryan and M. S. James C. D. Kemper, John Caffery and Misses Lula and Charlotte all residents of Franklin. Deceased was aged, respectively, 45 years, eleven months and five days.
