THE TRUSTS HAVE WON.

The decision in the Standard Oil case will prove disappointing to the country. The dissolution of the Standard Oil company works no hardship when the supreme court decision is virtually a license to reorganize under a pledge of greater security. No wonder the stock of the Standard Oil company went up five and one-half points when the decision was announced! Tobacco trust stock went up fifteen points, and the head of the Steel trust praises the opinion. The real meat of the decision is to be found in the amendment of the anti-trust law to meet the demands of the trusts. It has been demanding the very amendment that the court has read into the law. There will be rejoicing in Wall street, but there will be sadness in the homes of the masses who are now compelled to begin a campaign for the enactment of an anti-trust law so clear and explicit that the court can not repeal it by construction. The decision explains several things. First, it explains why Justice White was made chief justice instead of Justice Harlan. Second, it explains why Governor Hughes was made a justice of the supreme court. Third, it explains the discriminating care exercised by the president in selecting democrats who would help the republicans out of a hole by making the democratic party bear some of the odium of a decision that builds a bulwark around the predatory corporations. And, fourth, it explains why Wall street went over to Mr. Taft in March or April of 1908 and then coerced their employees and the business public into the support of the republican candidate in November. Who will appoint the judges? was the question raised toward the close of the campaign and Mr. Bryan was given an opportunity to decline to make any pledges. The people will learn after a while, what the corporations have long known, namely, that the power to appoint United States judges is a far-reaching power. The people agitate and congress legislates to little effect so long as the highest court in the land is in sympathy with those who exploit the public. The amendment which the court makes by judicial construction is the very amendment which Mr. Taft suggested in his Columbus speech when he announced his candidacy, and now the judges whom he appointed have so voted as to make it unnecessary to secure the amendment by legislation. Now let those democrats and republicans, who are opposed to trusts, set to work to overcome the decision by legislation. The democra-

tic plan will be found in the following plank of the democratic platform of 1908:

"A private monopoly is indefensible and intolerable; we therefore favor the vigorous enforcement of the criminal law against guilty trust magnates and officials, and demand the enactment of such additional legislation as may be necessary to make it impossible for a private monopoly to exist in the United States. Among the additional remedies, we specify three: First, a law preventing duplication of directors among competing corporations; second, a license system which will, without abridging the right of each state to create corporations, or its right to regulate as it will foreign corporations doing business within its limits, make it necessary for a manufacturing or trading corporation engaged in interstate commerce to take out a federal license before it shall be permitted to control as much as 25 per cent of the product in which it deals, the license to protect the public from watered stock and to prohibit the control by such corporation of more than 50 per cent of the total amount of any product consumed in the United States, and, third, a law compelling such licensed corporations to sell to all purchasers in all parts of the country on the same terms, after making due allowance for cost of transportation."—The Commoner.

WHAT'S WRONG.

Acadia parish is cursed with an institution that is responsible, directly or indirectly, for a large percentage of the indictments by the grand jury for minor infractions of the peace and for most of the killings that are committed in the parish. The public ball is de-lared by the grand jury in this parish and the police jury has been called upon to pass an ordinance calculated to suppress this evil.

THE PUBLIC BALLS.

Judge Campbell is authority for the statement that in his twelve years of service as district attorney and Judge he has been called upon to face at the bar regularly every year about the same crowd, recruited every year by boys growing up and the ranks occasionally thinned by death, but the main body of offenders are from year to year the same class of men and boys—the frequenters of the public balls.

This same state of things prevailed in Lafayette parish until five years ago, when the police jury adopted an ordinance imposing a license of \$500 on public balls. This effectually stopped them, and at the last session of the grand jury in Lafayette parish there were no indictments. Before the adoption of the prohibitory license ordinance conditions in Lafayette parish were similar to those in this parish. Judge Campbell attributes the decrease in misdemeanors to the abolition of the public ball.

Probably no parish in southern Louisiana has a better reputation for observance of the law than Acadia, but the abolition of the public balls would improve Acadia morals and its reputation. The police jury should take some action on this matter at an early meeting.—Crowley Signal.

AN ELEMENT NEEDED IN REFORM.

The Good Government League is actively at work trying to organize Leagues all over the state, and meetings addressed by prominent speakers are being held, energetically assailing the present system of government in this state. But none of the speakers have as yet said a word about the initiative, referendum or recall.

In a Democracy the people are supposed to rule, but they do not and cannot as long as they delegate their authority to a set of law makers or executive officers for two years or four years or any length of time without control over them.

Without the initiative the people can have no law enacted by their representatives unless the representatives choose. Without the referendum the legislature, police jury or city council can pass laws distasteful or unsatisfactory to the people like it or not. This is a most unreasonable power to put into the hands of any set of men, and yet we have done so, leaving to ourselves no recourse.

And what is still more unreasonable is that we should elect a man to office with no power to discharge him until his term of two or four or more years is up. This was not intended by the founders of our government for they incorporated into the Constitution the right of impeachment. But this right of impeachment is so difficult to exercise that it practically amounts to nothing, and in order to make it effective, the right of recall has been adopted which upon petition of a certain number of voters, gives the people the right to vote the officer out of office if they choose. Having the right of recall would place the people in position of any business man in that they can discharge employees at any time; and officers should be only employees, not bosses.

Mr. Aswell declares for a constitutional convention to correct the evils in our state system of government, but like all the others, he fails to say a word about the initiative, referendum and recall, and without these reforms will lack being reform by considerable.—Lafayette Advertiser.

AMENDMENT TO CHARTER OF MYLES SALT COMPANY, LTD.

Be it known, that on this Twenty First day of the month of April, in the year of our Lord, one thousand, nine hundred and eleven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and thirty-fifth.

Before me, John Marshall Quintero, a Notary Public, duly commissioned and qualified, in and for this City and the Parish of Orleans, there sitting, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared B. M. Myles, of this City, President, and Charles F. Tomes, also of this City, Secretary, of the Myles Salt Company, Limited, a corporation created under the laws of the State of Louisiana, domiciled in the Parish of Iberia, and incorporated under act passed before Lamar C. Quintero, Notary Public, in and for the Parish of Orleans, on the 5th day of February, 1908, in his said capacities, and on behalf of said corporation, by virtue of the authority conferred in them by the stockholders of said Company on the 6th day of March, 1911, as will more fully appear by reference to a certified copy of the resolution adopted at a meeting of the said stockholders and annexed hereto.

The said applicants declared, acting in their said capacities, that a general meeting of the stockholders of said Myles Salt Company, Limited, was convened at the office of the said Company, in the Parish of Iberia, on the 5th day of March, 1911, for the purpose of making certain changes and amendments in and to the aforesaid act of incorporation of the aforesaid Company, passed before the said Notary, Lamar C.
