**BUSINESS HOUSES CLOSED.**

As evidencing the progressive spirit of Hammond, La., a proclamation recently issued by Mayor Wilson of that town, is unique in the annals of municipalities of Louisiana. The Hopkins-Rhodes Company of this city is developing a new residential section in Hammond, and with that object in view will run a special excursion to the town this day. The train will leave the city at 9 o'clock Thursday morning and after a run of one and thirty minutes, purchasers of building lots will arrive in that thriving town. Realizing that this excursion means to Hammond, Mayor Wilson has issued the following proclamation: "Whereas public interest, civic pride and the advancement of our commercialism require that our people should take an active interest in the movement of opening the new residential section of our beautiful town, Colonial Place, which has been laid out in avenues and parks, and which is being developed by the Hopkins-Rhodes Company, and whereas it is the duty of our citizens to give their most hearty support to the development of their town, and that all places of business be closed during the same hours on that day, so that our people can participate in the stock and development of the same, and extend a hearty welcome and earnest courtesy to all who may be our guests on that day, and who may hope that they may find our town so attractive and our people so loyal that they will invest in this community, and give it their support and citizenship."—Picayune.

The above clipping is very opportune matter for your readers at this time. The spirit displayed by the citizens of Hammond is commendable and is the sort of spirit, which builds and keeps alive cities. This oneness of interest, this work altogether spirit might be cultivated to advantage by our people of New Iberia.

A sale of land which at great expenditure of time and money has been improved and made desirable and attractive as an addition to our city was advertised to take place today.
