Our schools have had a very successful year, but at its close there is much talk of depleted finances. When the two new school houses in West and East End were finished everybody was proudly proud of them, it was mentioned frequently the superior up-to-date mode of heating, and the work was accepted without an actual test. No housekeeper I think would have done that. When the cold days came and fires were lighted the furnace failed so completely that stoves had to be put into every room. This was some years ago, but so far not a word has been said about the plumbers reimbursing the taxpayers for their useless expenditure. That money wasted would be useful just now. If the "poppers" that he" would enforce the many excellent town ordinances, such as the anti-spitting, judging from the appearance of our pavements enough could be collected to run our schools for quite a while. There is an ordinance against cattle at large, still big pigs and little pigs from somewhere break into ones garden, eating vegetables and melons and passing through the chicken yard, gather up a few little chickens for desert. As to the speeding of the fine cars that illuminate our dingy streets at night, they are generally in careful hands, thus we have no or very few accidents, but occasionally there will streak through the thoroughfare a splendid car (reminding you of the reputation of the Halley Comet before it lost its tail) at such speed that if any one happened to be in the way, they would be dead before they knew they were struck. Such reckless speeding ought to net the school a goodly sum, or else pay for watering or oiling carts to save poor, but proud pedestrians from returning to dust before their time. New Iberia needs a Civic League very badly.
