One of the largest and saddest funerals ever held in New Iberia was that of Mr. E. Sam Carter, last Sunday afternoon, who had the misfortune of losing his life on Saturday morning by falling from a box car. The services at the home were conducted by the Masons, deceased being a member of Abbeville Lodge, having joined when a resident of Vermilion Parish, after which the remains were taken to the Methodist Church, Rev.
