White, special agricultural and horticultural commissioner of the Frisco lines arrived in New Iberia last Tuesday containing exhibits of the products of the country along the lines of that big road from Springfield, Mo., to the Gulf Coast. Hundreds of our citizens visited the car and were well compensated for their trouble. Prof. White held a lecture at the City Hall on Wednesday evening which was highly instructive to the few present, due to the inclement weather. The gentleman while here visited some of the schools where the more advanced pupils are being taught and made interesting talks to the young people after which Supt. Frame accompanied many to the car to witness the exhibits.
