—The cane losses in this Parish due to the three freezes from all indications will not be over twenty per cent. From statements furnished us there has been several cars of cane rejected due to failure of withstanding before the second freeze, which is unfortunate to the farmers caught in that predicament this year. As a whole, when taken in consideration the fancy prices paid at the beginning of the grinding which was a dollar per ton more than last season there will be but little difference in the final wind up of the crop. The early freeze was something so unusual in this country and few of the farmers were prepared to withrow that some losses are bound to occur, but in the future seasons we dare say in the last days of November will find the entire crop withrowed.

—State High School Inspector, Mr. Leo M. Favrot, of Baton Rouge, was in our city a few days ago, and made an inspection of the High School here. He reports himself as being very well pleased with the school, its faculty and the work being done. In a letter written to Superintendent Frame, he states in part, "The school at New Iberia has a large enrollment of boys and girls, a large and well equipped faculty and deserves to rank with the best in the State. There are many features about the work that are excellent. I have no doubt that each teacher is a master of his subjects and many of these are enthusiastic about their work and possess the strong professional qualifications necessary to make the work successful." Mr. Favrot made special mention of the fine work being done in English and some of the other branches.

—In all probability we will publish next week in our columns the charter of a new railroad to be known as the New Iberia, Lafayette and Northwestern Railroad that contemplate building from New Iberia to Eunice, through the town of St. Martinville. On Wednesday evening a number of gentlemen from the neighboring towns through which the road will traverse met with Mr. F. M. Welch to form the organization to take up the great project of giving this section another railroad system to the Northwest. Whatever encouragement the progressive citizens of New Iberia can offer to have another trunk line enter this country will be accorded these public spirited promoters, headed by Mr. Welch, the untiring worker and railroad builder. If all likelihood before the new year of 1912 comes to a close we will be able to boast of a third railroad with New Iberia as the divisional point for the entire territory.

—Mr. A. A. Perkins, president of the New Iberia and Northern Railroad, and head of the syndicate now building the Iberia, St. Mary and Eastern Railroad, gives out the information that he has contracted for three McKee electric gas motor cars at a cost of \$26,400, each to be delivered for service March 1, 1912. These cars are to run on an hour schedule between the towns of Lereauville, Iberia parish and Jeanerette, and as far into St. Mary parish as the line will be constructed at the date, with an ultimate terminus at Berwick. New Iberia will be headquarters of this line, as Mr. Owens, the roadmaster, will be stationed here, sending orders from this city. They will arrive of the most up-to-date style, being arranged for smoking for white and colored passengers, and for baggage, and will be a boon to this community, permitting rapid and frequent communication between these towns and New Iberia, which is the center of the system.

STATEMENT OF THE STATE NATIONAL BANK OF NEW IBERIA. AT CLOSE OF BUSINESS DEC. 8, 1911. (CONTROLLER'S CALL)

The Police Jury met in regular session last Thursday morning and transacted considerable business. This was the first meeting for near on to two months, due to want of a quorum. Besides the routine work of that body, a resolution was presented and carried calling for bids to construct a steel bridge across the Teche at Olivier Station to replace the worn out delapidated one now in use at that point. Mr. Willie L. Burke was sworn in as Secretary and Treasurer of the Parish under a \$10,000 bond which he furnished and will assume the duties of Hon. A. B. Romero until the health of that gentleman will again permit him to resume his work.

—Died, at the residence of his mother on Iberia Street, on Thursday morning at 8:40 a. m., Dr. Charles C. Delhomme, a native of St. John the Baptist Parish, in the 58th year of his age. Dr. Delhomme returned to the Parish of Iberia about three years ago and entered the practice of his profession, dentistry, having graduated several years previous with high honors. The gentleman was a learned man and well posted on almost all the topics of the day, being a deep reader and lover of books. He leaves to mourn his loss his wife, his children, wife and his venerable mother, Mrs. Chas. C. Delhomme of this City and several other brothers and sisters to mourn his demise. His funeral was largely attended at St. Peter's Catholic Church yesterday morning at eleven o'clock and the remains interred in the Catholic cemetery of New Iberia.
