New Iberia La., Jan. 11, '12. The regular meeting of the Police Jury was held this day, with President L. A. Moresi, presiding, and the following members present, viz: Curtis, Delahoussaye, Delcambre, Gonsolin, LeBlanc, Carlos Mestayer, F. J. Mestayer, Romero, Stansbury. Absent—Thibaux.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

President Moresi made official announcement of the death of former Attorney Andrew Thorpe and asked that his successor be appointed. On motion of Mr. Carlos Mestayer, seconded by Mr. Delahoussaye, Mr. L. T. Dulany was appointed to position of legal advisor to Police Jury at the same salary as was paid Mr. Thorpe.

The President appointed Messrs. L. T. Dulany and R. F. Delahoussaye, a committee to draft suitable resolutions in memory of Mr. Thorpe.

The committee submitted the following which on motion, duly seconded and carried were ordered spread on the minutes and copies of same be given to the Parish President and to the family of deceased attorney:

Whereas it has pleased the Almighty Father to remove from the activities of this life the Honorable Andrew Thorpe, who for a long time rendered valuable legal services to this body, as its attorney, and commanded our confidence and respect as a man.

Now therefore, be it resolved by the Police Jury of Iberia Parish, in regular session assembled, that we, each of us as public officers and citizens, regret the loss of that noble citizen and friend, and now inscribe upon the minutes of this Jury this testimonial of our esteem as a tribute to his memory.

Be it further resolved that these resolutions be published in the local papers and a copy be sent to the bereaved widow, with the condolence of this Jury.

On motion of Mr. C. Mestayer, seconded by Mr. Stansbury, Mr. Sandos' request was granted.

COURT CASE OF INTEREST.

When one goes into a restaurant and orders a meal and liquor to accompany it, paying the waiter at the time for the liquor, and the waiter goes to a saloon and purchases the liquor with such money and then brings it to the restaurant and serves it, the Supreme Court of Iowa in Mullinex vs. Brown, 131 Northwestern Reporter, 671, holds that the restaurant keeper dispenses liquor in violation of the statute providing that one shall not manufacture, sell, exchange, barter, dispense, or give, in consideration of the purchase of any property or any services, any intoxicating liquors, and is therefore within the statute making one guilty of a nuisance who uses a building for any of the purposes prohibited by the first-mentioned statute.


