—The Republican Primary for State officers was held on Thursday for the selection of candidates to be placed in opposition to the regular Democratic nominees. The Parish of Iberia has the distinction of having only eleven registered Republicans, seven of whom voted in New Iberia. The candidates for Governor are C. F. Bell, who received one vote and U. Sutherland, who received 6 votes. State Committee members at Large, Louis Corde, 4 votes; E. F. Dugas, 6; Jules Godchaux, 7; J. A. Thornton, 4. State Central Committee, Jules Dreyfus, 7.

—Died, at her residence at Spanish Lakes on Tuesday, January 23d, 1912, at 11:30 o'clock P. M., Mrs. Alphonse Landry, nee Clara Comeaux, a native of Lafayette Parish. Deceased was born on Oct. 12th, 1847. She leaves to mourn her demise four children, two sons, Messrs. P. Anthony Landry of this City and Mr. Gabriel Landry, a prosperous planter of this Parish and two married daughters, residing in the Parish of Lafayette. The funeral obsequies were held at St. Peter's Catholic Church in this City on Wednesday evening in the presence of a large concourse of sympathizing friends and relatives. The family have the sympathy of the entire community in the hour of their great loss.

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—Work on the Trolley line has begun in earnest between New Iberia and Jeanerette. On Thursday morning several dozens of laborers were at work under the direction of the assistant to Mr. Harry K. Johnson, the contractor of the Southwestern Traction and Power Company throwing dirt and if the weather permits, much work will soon be done in building the road bed of the line. All of the rails and other material is en route to New Iberia and the indications point to the completion of the line within the specified time.
