The new pump of the Plant did excellent work as it has on other occasions since it has been installed and New Iberia can proudly boast of having the best Power House of any town its size in the South. The insurance carried by Mr. Blassesley on his furniture amounted to \$700, his loss being adjusted by Mr. P. B. Jones, representing the White Fire Insurance Agency.

—It is with pleasure we note the success of the New Iberia High School in the English contest, one of the features of the High School Rally held in Baton Rouge, April 26-27. All eighth grades in state approved high schools are eligible to enter this contest. The questions are sent from Baton Rouge and given to the entire class, then submitted to the State University for correction. Of the thirty schools competing New Iberia's eighth grade made the highest average, thus winning the prize, a Webster's International Dictionary and a framed certificate giving names of teacher and pupils taking part in the contest.

The sad news was then made known to his parents here which was a great shock to them and they have the sympathy of the community in their distress. The remains were brought to this City the next day and interred in St. Peter's cemetery after the funeral services which were held at the Catholic church.

Did you ever return to your home town after a delightful visit to some of your near neighbors, and find all the houses and shops and public buildings beautifully decorated, flags flying, banners waving, all the school children marching and singing and dancing (no doubt) for their twinkling feet seemed to keep time to music of their own. The Opera House crowded to the curbstone. Orators telling all about the admission of this scrap of the original Louisiana as a State. Then the whole population (as it seemed) singing patriotic songs, ending with "My Country 'Tis of Thee" so the whole atmosphere was electrical with patriotism. It was very gratifying, we had that experience on Tuesday last. Having visited in the morning that very interesting institution, the Industrial School at Lafayette, the old wound of regret, that New Iberia could not have been public spirited enough to have secured such a prize was reopened. But our sister town, where immediate, personal profit, can be merged into civic pride and future prosperity, richly deserved her success.

The grounds are extensive, being laid out with an eye for the beautiful as well as practical results. The commodious buildings are a good illustration of excellent ventilation, sanitation, etc. Every department seemed to be working smoothly and busily, like the polished gasoline engine (39 h. p. I think) (have I put in a horse or two more than the team calls for? The carpenters department is making furniture of the Mission pattern very successfully, would it not be a proper thing for all the merchants to patronize our own fine Industrial Institute, even if it is a few miles removed from our Post Office corner. The sewing rooms were presided over by a sweet smiling gentle woman who instructed her happy girls in such a pleasant tone and manner, they all seem to love their pretty embroidery and fine stitching from agreeable surroundings.

The cooking department would satisfy the requirements of any good housekeeper, we looked into every separate bowl and pan in which good things were being made, and found that the rules used and the methods employed were just what the most capable of housekeepers would use if their cooks had only the requisite "grey matter".

The gymnasium, on the upper floor with a glorious outlook over the leafy avenues and cultivated fields and gardens, is a complete department under the care of Miss McLauren, a sister and a dainty small addition of a teacher who with us a number of years and who has many friends here still.

The evolutions were admirable and planned to exercise every muscle in the human frame. If these young girls are not graceful and well poised it is not the fault of Ette Miss McLauren. We did not catch (to remember) the names of many of the teachers, but their bright happy intelligent faces, and enthusiastic interest in their work we cannot forget. The stenographic department was well patronized by young men and maidens. The telegraphy rooms contained a number of instruments. The wireless systems we understand is soon to be installed. A very surprising incident occurred. A lady of our party in passing put her dainty fingers upon the instrument, the professor reading her question answered promptly. As there was no one among those circumstances led her further away from the need to learn professional skill, it seemed a beautiful thing that one should learn to handle one for pleasure, this intricate instrument that compels the lightning to obedient servitude. The arrangement of this excellent institution seems fine. The President, Mr. Stephens, not only has the management of the whole school, but seems to keep his hand upon the pulse of every separate department, to detect the slightest evidence of any derangement. This being the 30th of April, the school was to celebrate the statehood of Louisiana. Mr. Stephens gave an interesting history of the event in a very graphic but condensed form. In closing his remarks, he said, to assist in their celebration a song bird had wanted to them from New Iberia and she would sing for them, which she did, receiving a most enthusiastic encore again and again. The acoustics of the Auditorium are so good any bird would delight to sing there. Mr. Stephens was most courteous to our party and patient and instructive regarding the Institution, as visitors are always welcome, I should think that intelligent people from all our neighboring towns would indulge themselves of an hour spent so profitably.

It is not often that one finds in the head of such an institution the knowledge of practical utilities and profound sciences with the taste of a poet and the manners of a Chesterfield.
