### TO SPAN GLOBE.

Washington, Oct. 28.—Crackling and sputtering with life, the navy's new wireless station at Arlington, Va.—the most powerful plant in the world—to-night flung from its lofty aerials the first messages which signaled an important step in the building of a globe-girdling wireless system which will keep every ship of the United States navy and every insular possession within instant communication of the capital.

Wireless operators, professional and amateurs, on one side of the globe cars tonight, straining to catch the faint buzzes as the powerful apparatus sputtered out its calls for Panama, Colon and the Atlantic coast navy stations.

Down in the sound-proof operating room, windowless and protected by double doors, some of the navy's most experienced operators, directed by Lieutenant Woodworth, sent out the first flashes.

N. A. X., N. A. X., the call for Colon, 1785 miles away, was sent hurrying through the ether. At intervals the instruments sparked off "N. A. R." the call for Key West, 975 miles off. No official messages were sent but the results of the test were noted at all stations on the Atlantic coast, as well as Key West and Colon and reports on the trials will be made tomorrow.

**Can Send 3,000 Miles.**  
The radius of the new plant will be about 3,000 miles. This range, probably the acme of wireless operations, will be attained gradually and it may be weeks before the big plant is "tuned up" to its highest efficiency.

Communication with the Pacific coast will be attempted only at night for the present but later on throughout the day the secretary of the navy at his desk at Washington will be within instantaneous communication with Key West, Guantanamo, Colon, the naval coaling stations, the winter maneuver grounds and all Atlantic stations.

When the plant is working perfectly and the chain of stations is completed Washington will be in touch with Hawaii, Samoa, Guam, the Philippines and Pearl Harbor. The completed system will cost about \$1,000,000. The seas then no longer will be a wilderness for the American navy.

Ships, because of weaker equipment cannot communicate with the powerful plant at Arlington but they may relay messages to the various stations for transmission to Washington.

### THE ELECTRICAL CULTURE OF CHICKS.

One of the most interesting features of a 30,000-egg electrical hatchery at Muskogee, Oklahoma, is the method of forcing the growth of chicks by the aid of electric light. A 0-watt tungsten lamp, which, by means of a special switch, is turned on and off for alternate periods of eight hours each is suspended in the runway. The chicks fill its craw in the eight hours of electric illumination, and rests during the eight hours the light is shut off. Thus the chicks live three electric days in two ordinary sunshine days. In the customary way of brooding chicks, eight hours out of the 24 are wasted, or to express it electrical the load factor is 66 per cent. The electric outfit, however, is run at nearly 100-per cent load factor, and electric chicks four weeks old far outweigh chicks brooded in the old way. This up-to-date method of raising chickens is described in an illustrated article in the November Popular Mechanics Magazine.

### MEXICO'S HOSTILITY TO FOREIGNERS.

While General Diaz was president and dictator of Mexico great encouragement was offered to foreigners with capital to settle in the country and to take part in the development of its resources.

On the faith of this invitation and promise of protection it is said that during the Diaz administration more than 40,000 persons from the United States moved into the sister republic and invested hundreds of millions of dollars there in building railroads, in mining and in coffee plantations and other interests.

But most of the Americans have been forced to flee the country and their property has been wrecked and plundered. Now the slogan is said to be "Mexico for the Mexicans," and this antagonism towards foreigners has found expression in a bill which has been introduced in the Mexican Congress, which provides:

"No foreigner, or foreign company may acquire land or property in Mexico, and foreigners and foreign companies now holding land and property in this country shall be given five years in which to dispose of it, in default of which the government shall appropriate land or property.

"From all great holdings of land, the government may appropriate such land as is not under cultivation to be distributed among the poor. The poor may denounce land not under cultivation, paying for it a minimum price."

This shows a most radical change from the conditions which were the rule during the long, and to Mexico, prosperous administration of President Diaz.—Piscayune.

The terrapin is fed regularly with meat and the mere chopping of the meat on the block near the pen will bring them racing to that end of the pen like chickens to a feed of corn.

The conclusions reached by Senator Burke are the conclusions that must be reached by every citizen who carefully and intelligently considers the proposed changes from the standpoint of "the greatest good to the greatest number." There may be some few people in Louisiana or some few corporations who will have to go down in their pockets for a large share of the taxes that they have been accustomed to paying, but these additional burdens will be placed upon the people best able to bear them. Is there anybody who can reasonably say this is not as it should be? If more revenues are absolutely necessary for the conduct of the State's business, will any one say that the masses—the common people—should be called upon first to make up this sum. Here and there some industry, some firm, some utility corporation may be adversely affected by the new scheme, but the great majority of the people will receive a benefit. And this much is absolutely certain—that under the new system every individual and every interest will be treated fairly when compared with his neighbor. And that is the very thing which has been found impossible of accomplishment under the present system of assessment and taxation.
