—The City Council held a business session last Tuesday evening when several important ordinances were introduced and carried that will eventually mean much to New Iberia. A number of gentlemen connected with the New Iberia Board of Trade were present and presented the following resolution which was carried unanimously:

"Whereas it is to the manifest advantage of the City of New Iberia to obtain new industries, which will necessarily afford employment to labor, increase the volume of money in local channels and superinduce a condition of material development;

Be it therefore ordained and resolved by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the City of New Iberia that, as a consideration and inducement for the establishment of any new industry or industries in the City of New Iberia, an amount equivalent to all the taxes collected by the City of New Iberia from the party or parties hereinafter mentioned, each year beginning with the year 1913 and extending to and including the year 1923 shall in each of said years, be paid by the City of New Iberia through its governing body to any individual, firm or corporation that shall establish and operate any new industry, provided, the yearly payroll thereof exceeds ten thousand dollars.

Be it further ordained, etc., that any new industry, factory, saw mill, iron works, sugar refinery, etc., established and operated in the City of New Iberia during the year 1913 having a yearly payroll aggregating ten thousand dollars shall be regarded as having been established in New Iberia only in view of the inducement hereby offered and the same shall be regarded as a vested contract between the City of New Iberia and the individual, firm, partnership or corporation operating the same."

MRS. CASSIE POLLARD DEAD.

This morning Mr. S. P. Colvin received a message from Dr. Willis Pollard of Kaufman, Texas, conveying the sad news of the death of his mother, Mrs. Cassie Pollard, which occurred at an early hour this morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Judson H. Grambling, in Harrisburg, Texas.

Mrs. Pollard's body is being brought to Ruston today and will arrive here on the five o'clock east bound V. S and P train this afternoon. Burial services and interment will take place at the Ruston cemetery immediately after the arrival of the train this afternoon.
