—Last Sunday evening the pational Steamer "Polly" of St. Louis, Mo., owned by Mr. Alexander Gratz, a millionaire rope manufacturer of that city arrived here with a party of five ladies and gentlemen who had made the trip from the above mentioned place to New Orleans where they witnessed the Carnival festivities after which they came down to New Iberia on the beautiful Teche. The party spent all of Monday at Avery Island where they visited the Salt Mines, from here we understand they made the trip to St. Martinville where they spent a few hours in the quaint old town after which they returned to New Orleans homeward bound.

—On Saturday evening last Mr. Jules Dreyfus, our wholesale grocer suffered the loss of three mules which was killed by the Southern Pacific West Bound train, his driver having a narrow escape with his own life. The accident happened when his large wagon was returning home at the crossing a few hundred feet from the Segura refinery, he being completely hid from view at a high brush along the ridge at that place, he drove upon the track which the train was struck and all three of the animals killed outright. Something should be done in that vicinity to ward off the danger, otherwise some accident will happen there when lives will be lost as has happened before.

—We were shown this week by Mr. F. W. Crosby, general manager of the Southwestern Traction and Power Company, a copy of the blue print for their new Power House to be constructed on their property adjoining their present plant. The building will be 100x180 feet of reinforced concrete and brick, sufficient for the installation of six 500 horse power boilers, two 1250 kilowatt transformers and one of 3200; six 500 kilowatt transformers; 1400 kilowatt motor generator. The projected improvement will cost not less than \$200,000.00 and will have a capacity sufficient to furnish current for the operation of all the proposed extensions. The present building will be used after the other is completed as a modern machine shop to repair all of their rolling stock. An order has been placed for another car which we understand will also be used for the service between New Iberia and Jeanerette.

Langlois of the St. Peter Catholic Church of this city will consecrate the flag and deliver an address; and at night there will be an excellent program rendered, at which time an address will be delivered by Dr. R. Amendment to Charter of the New Iberia Commission Co., Ltd.

NEW IBERIA, LA., January 25th, 1913.
Pursuant to the resolution of the Board of Directors of the New Iberia Commission Company, Limited, adopted at a meeting held on the 7th day of December 1912, and pursuant to the notice given the stockholders forty days previous to this meeting, and the publication made of the notice, all conformably to Act 149 of 1908, the stockholders of the New Iberia Commission Company met this day at a stockholders meeting for the purpose of considering the question of amending the Charter with reference to an increase of the capital stock from ten thousand dollars to twenty five thousand dollars.

The meeting was organized by the election of H. T. Hall as Chairman and A. E. Hall as Secretary. The following stockholders were present: H. T. Hall owning eight shares, and E. W. Hall owning one share; absent, J. P. Suberbielle, owning five shares.

Upon motion of A. E. Hall, seconded by Earl W. Hall, and unanimously carried, by all of the stockholders present, voting more than two-thirds of the entire stock of the company, the following resolution was adopted, to wit:

Be it resolved that Article Four of the Charter be amended so as to read as follows:
ARTICLE IV.
The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of twenty five thousand dollars, to be divided into two hundred and fifty shares of the par value of one hundred dollars each. Said stock shall be paid and after stock in such amount as may be fixed by the Board of Directors, or the same may be issued for labor property actually received, or money done, service rendered, or money received, or any combination thereof, and purchased by this corporation, upon such terms and in such times as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors.

The corporation shall become a going concern and shall be authorized to commence business as soon as three thousand dollars of the capital stock shall have been subscribed for.
The amount of the capital stock of this company at the time this vote was taken was ten thousand dollars, represented by four persons as follows: H. T. Hall 11 one share, and E. W. Hall 48 shares, E. W. Hall one share, and J. P. Suberbielle 5 shares.
The increase in the number of shares from ten thousand dollars to twenty five thousand dollars, and the vote on the adoption of the resolution individually was as follows: H. T. Hall, forty one shares, A. E. Hall, forty eight shares, E. W. Hall, one share.
Against the increase, none. Absent, J. P. Suberbielle, owning five shares.


