ACT OF INCORPORATION

NEW IBERIA SANITARY LAUNDRY, Ltd.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Iberia. Be it known, that on this 14th day of the month of February, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirteen, before me, Nathan Davis a Notary Public in and for the Parish of Iberia, State of Louisiana, duly commissioned and qualified for the purpose and in the presence of the undersigned named and undersigned, personally came and appeared:

Messrs. Haver S. Sealy and Jules E. Dupuy, residents of the city of New Iberia, Parish of Iberia, and Homer Dupuy, resident of the city of New Orleans, Parish of Orleans, all of full age, who declared that, availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of this State relating to corporations, and especially of Act No. 26 of 1888 of the General Assembly of Louisiana, they have consented and agreed, and they bind themselves, as well as such other persons as may hereafter be associated with them, to form and constitute a corporation and body politic for the purpose and to the intent and under the stipulations, articles and conditions following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.
The name and title of the said corporation shall be "New Iberia Sanitary Laundry, Ltd." and its domicile is hereby established in the City of New Iberia, Parish of Iberia, La., and under its said corporate name, said corporation shall have power and authority to contract, sue and be sued; to make and use a corporate seal, and the same to break and alter at pleasure; to hold, receive, have, purchase, improve, alienate, convey, sell, borrow, pledge, mortgage and hypothecate, under its said corporate name, property, real and personal, and to take and accept such officers, directors, agents, managers, or employees, as the interest or convenience of said corporation may require; to make and establish by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management and regulation of its affairs, as may be deemed necessary and proper, and the same to change and alter at pleasure; and to do all such other acts and things as may be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purposes of said corporation.

Said corporation, unless sooner dissolved, according with its charter, shall exist and continue for the term of twenty-five (25) years from and after the date hereof.

The president, or in his absence the vice president, shall be the proper person upon whom citation or other legal process shall be served.

ARTICLE II.
The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized, and the nature of the business to be carried on by it, are declared to be the following, to-wit:

To own and operate a steam laundry and do a general laundry business, and in connection therewith, to own and operate any and all businesses incidental or in connection therewith, and to do all such other acts and things as may be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purposes of said corporation.

ARTICLE III.
The capital stock of the said corporation shall be Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) divided into ten thousand (10,000) shares of the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) each, which said stock shall be paid for in cash at the time of subscription, or as may be provided by the Board of Directors of said corporation, and the same may be issued, at not less than par, in payment or exchange for property or rights actually received or purchased by said corporation, and the same may be issued for money advanced, and for such other valuable considerations or services as the Board of Directors of said corporation may determine; provided, that no stock shall be issued for less than par value, and therefor has been received by the said corporation.

Any stockholder may sell, assign or transfer his stock in this corporation, and provided thirty (30) days' prior notice of such intention to sell, assign or transfer the same be given the corporation, and the stockholder so transferring the same after giving thirty (30) days' notice, the said stock may be sold in open market. The stock of said corporation may be transferred by the stockholder, and provided such transfer thereof be made on the books of said company, at its office, in the City of New Iberia, and on the surrender of the stock certificate, and the transfer of any fractional part of a share shall be made.

This corporation shall commence doing business as soon as forty (40) shares of the capital stock shall have been subscribed for.

ARTICLE IV.
The corporate powers of this company shall be vested in and exercised by a board of three (3) directors, one of whom shall be the president, who shall also be officer-treasurer of said corporation, the vice president and one (1) stockholder; however, the membership of the board of directors of the corporation shall be determined by a vote of the majority of the issued stock of the corporation at any called or special meeting held for that purpose.

The following persons shall constitute the first board of directors of this corporation: Haver S. Sealy, president, Jules E. Dupuy, vice president, and Homer Dupuy, treasurer.

No person shall be eligible as director or officer who is not a stockholder of this corporation; provided, however, that the board of directors may elect a Secretary, who need not be a stockholder, and the right to dismiss him at its pleasure, as hereinafter provided.

During the absence of the president, the vice president shall act as president. Said board shall continue in office until the first Monday in January, 1914, on which date and thereafter, annually, on the first day of January, of each year, a board of directors shall be elected, provided, that should fixed date be a holiday, the election shall be held on the next legal day thereafter.

Notice of election shall be given by at least twenty (20) days publication immediately preceding such election, in one of the weekly English newspapers of this City, and the board of directors shall appoint one or more stockholders to preside at such election as commissioners. In the event of the failure of any commissioner or commissioners to attend the election, the president, or in his absence, the vice president, shall fill the vacancy or vacancies. Any failure on any cause whatsoever to elect directors in the day named for that purpose shall constitute a default, and the officers of the corporation, shall hold over until their successors are chosen.

In such event the president shall cause another election to be held within thirty (30) days, and shall give notice thereof as herein before provided.

At every election and meeting each stockholder shall be entitled to cast one vote for each share of stock registered in his name, and may vote by proxy.

The said board is further authorized to regulate and adopt such by-laws, rules and regulations as the affairs and business of the corporation may require, and as it may deem necessary for the conducting and management thereof; provided, that the same shall not conflict with this charter, or with the laws of this State, or of the United States.

The said board shall elect or appoint such officers, agents, employees, servants and clerks as it may deem necessary for the conducting of the business of the corporation; fix their compensation, term of service, with the right to dismiss them at said board's pleasure; and said board shall have the right to fix and determine the salaries of the several officers hereto provided for.

ARTICLE VI.
This charter may be amended, modified or repealed, the capital stock increased or decreased, or this corporation may be dissolved, at a general meeting of the stockholders convened for the purpose, and by the affirmative vote of a majority of the stock subscribed for at time of said general meeting, whether present or represented at such meeting.

Thirty (30) days' prior notice of such meeting shall be given in any weekly English newspaper published in this City. In case of dissolution or termination of this corporation, either by limitation of its charter or from any cause, the liquidation of its affairs shall be conducted by three (3) commissioners, selected from the stockholders, with like consent, and at a meeting called for that purpose, as above set forth in this article.

The said Commissioners shall remain in office until the affairs of said corporation shall have been fully liquidated, in the event of the death of one or more of said commissioners, the survivors or survivor shall continue to act.

ARTICLE VII.
No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or debts thereof, in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the corporation on the shares of stock subscribed or owned by him, nor shall any informally in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or of expelling a stockholder to any liability, beyond the unpaid balance of any of his stock.

This done and passed at my notarial office, in the City of New Iberia, Parish of Iberia, State of Louisiana, on the 14th day of the month of February, 1913, in the presence of Messrs. Walter S. Henning and Francis W. Crosby, competent witnesses, lawful and residents of this City, who hereto sign their names, together with said parties and me, Notary, after reading of the whole.

Amendment to Charter of the New Iberia Commission Co., Ltd.

NEW IBERIA, LA., JANUARY 25th, 1913.
Pursuant to the resolution of the Board of Directors of the New Iberia Commission Company, Limited, adopted at a meeting held on the 7th day of December, 1912, and pursuant to the notice given the stockholders forty days previous to this meeting, and the publication made of the same, all conformably to Act 49 of 1907, the following amendments to the Charter of the New Iberia Commission Company Limited are adopted, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.
The capital stock of this company is hereby fixed at the sum of twenty five thousand dollars, to be divided into and represented by two hundred and fifty shares of the par value of one hundred dollars each. Said stock shall be paid for in cash, at such time, in such amounts and after such notice to the subscribers as may be fixed by the Board of Directors, or the same may be issued for labor done, services rendered, or property actually received or purchased by this corporation, upon such terms and in such amounts as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors.

The corporation shall become a going concern and shall be authorized to commence business as soon as three thousand dollars of the capital stock shall have been subscribed for.

The amount of the capital stock of this company at the time this vote was taken was ten thousand dollars, represented by four persons as follows: H. T. Hall, one share, A. E. Hall 48 shares, E. W. Hall one share, and J. P. Suberbielle 5 shares. The increase in the number of shares was made up of two hundred and fifty shares, and the balance of the amount to twenty five thousand dollars and the vote on the adoption of the resolution individually was as follows: H. T. Hall, forty one shares, A. E. Hall, forty eight shares, E. W. Hall, one share.

Against the increase, none. Absent, J. P. Suberbielle, owning five shares. H. T. HALL, Chairman. E. HALL, Secretary.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Iberia. Before me, J. G. LeBlanc, Clerk of the 19th Jud. District Court, and Ex-Officio Recorder and Conservator of Mortgages, and Ex-Officio Notary Public in and for the Parish of Iberia, personally came and appeared H. T. Hall and A. E. Hall, both residents of Iberia Parish, and to me well known, who being by me duly sworn, deposed and said: That they were Chairman and Secretary respectively of a meeting of the stockholders of the New Iberia Commission Company held on the 14th day of January, 1913, and that the above and foregoing certificate of the proceedings of the stockholders meeting held on said day is a true and correct copy of all the business transacted at that meeting.

Witness my hand and the seal of the Office of the Company was appended by me on the 14th day of January, 1913, and I have signed the capital stock from ten thousand dollars represented by one hundred shares to twenty five thousand dollars represented by two hundred and fifty shares.

Deposited further declared that they signed the foregoing certificate of the proceedings of said meeting in their official capacities as Chairman and Secretary respectively, and that the signatures and names thereto are their true and genuine signatures.

The increase in the number of shares was made up of two hundred and fifty shares, and the balance of the amount to twenty five thousand dollars and the vote on the adoption of the resolution individually was as follows: H. T. Hall, forty one shares, A. E. Hall, forty eight shares, E. W. Hall, one share.

Against the increase, none. Absent, J. P. Suberbielle, owning five shares. H. T. HALL, Chairman. E. HALL, Secretary.

Hall, both residents of Iberia Parish, and to me well known, who being by me duly sworn, deposed and said: That they were Chairman and Secretary respectively of a meeting of the stockholders of the New Iberia Commission Company held on the 14th day of January, 1913, and that the above and foregoing certificate of the proceedings of the stockholders meeting held on said day is a true and correct copy of all the business transacted at that meeting.

Witness my hand and the seal of the Office of the Company was appended by me on the 14th day of January, 1913, and I have signed the capital stock from ten thousand dollars represented by one hundred shares to twenty five thousand dollars represented by two hundred and fifty shares.

DOG LICENSE ORDINANCE

Mr. Decourt offered the following ordinance which was adopted on his motion, seconded by Mr. Valet and carried.

Section 1. Be it ordained, that in conformity with the provisions of the Act of the Legislature of 1910, an annual tax of one dollar is hereby levied upon all dogs kept within the limits of the town of Iberia, Jeanerette, La., and Delcambre, La.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, that the Police Jury of the Parish, through the Constable of each Ward, shall furnish tags, bearing in plain English the number of the tag and year, for which issued; which tags shall be securely fastened around the neck of the dog on which the tax has been paid, and a tag when thus displayed, shall be evidence of the payment of the license tax herein provided.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, that the said license tax be due and payable to the stable of the Ward in which the dog is kept, on the 1st of March each year; and the dog not having around the neck the tag above provided for March 1st of each year, and destroyed by the Constable, any other person who has such dog roaming at large in the Parish.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, that all licenses collected herein provided by the Constable shall be turned over to the retary of the Police Jury, which is hereby fixed as a condition of the Constables of the Wards and their services meeting the license tax.

Section 5. Be it further ordained, that any person or persons harboring any dog or dogs upon his premises without having paid the license tax herein provided, shall upon conviction by any Court of competent jurisdiction be fined not
