PICK FOSTER AND VOEGTLE.

Washington, March 10.—Although members of the delegation assert no formal action has been taken on any of the places, it is reasonably certain that so far as the delegation can control the matter, men have been selected for five of the twelve and good Federal offices in Louisiana. They are:

Collector of the Port—Murphy J. Foster, former Senator. Postmaster at New Orleans—Joseph Voegtle, former State Senator.

Naval Officer—"Jack" Parker, sheriff of Ouachita Parish. Marshal of the Eastern District—Chas. Piqua, private secretary to Gov. Sanders.

Marshal of the Western District—Former Sheriff Kirkpatrick of Claiborne parish.

There is less doubt and uncertainty concerning Foster and Voegtle than there is about any of the other men mentioned. All, however, are subject to change without notice, as the railroad time table says, because it is just possible that the Cabinet officer who is to be the superior of any one of the men may have a few thoughts on the fitness of the man proposed, or the great or fitness of a man not proposed by the delegation. Nobody knows just how far President Wilson is going to allow his Cabinet officers to control appointments.

RESTRICTING IMMIGRATION.

It is true that early immigrants to this country were quite generally so poor that they sold themselves into servitude to pay for their passage; also, that the net gain of population through immigration in recent years has been smaller, relatively to total population, than in several early periods. But neither fact has much relevance to the question whether any restriction should now be placed upon immigration went largely to vacant land.

It is also true, in the sense in which Uncle Joe Cannon might have said it, that "without the great immigration of recent years the United States would not have made the progress it has." There would have been fewer tons of pig iron, smaller foreign-trade totals. The enormous supply of raw, cheap labor has stimulated industry; but industry may be stimulated without any real national progress. Steel mills may flourish though men deteriorate.

We think, on the whole, the great immigration of recent years has been good for the immigrants and for the country. The only practical question is whether we have now reached a point where it would be better for the country to exercise some choice—to select, so far as possible, those immigrants who are likeliest to be profitable. If any selection at all is to be made a simple literacy test is the best instrument. An illiterate man may be a saint, and a literate man may be a scoundrel; but the broad probabilities are that a man who is able to read is more intelligent, more enterprising and has been brought up under better conditions than an illiterate one. And broad probabilities are the only things with which a statute can deal.—Saturday Post.

CONTINUED RISE IN THE PRICE OF OIL.

The price of oil continues to rise and those who are compelled to use it in quantities are constrained to ask why. The Cleveland Leader, which is printed in the center of a great oil producing district, discusses the matter and reaches a conclusion that more oil must be discovered before lower prices can be hoped for.

"More crude petroleum is being taken from the earth in the United States than was ever produced at any former period," says the Leader. "The decline in the flow of old wells is more than offset by the 'gushers' in new fields, especially in California. Yet the price of oil rises far and fast and there is nothing to indicate that the market has a permanent top limit. Consumers of oil products ask why these conditions, seemingly contradictory, exist at the same time. They demand an explanation from the oil refiners, especially the Standard Oil Company and its subsidiaries. The strong independent companies are flourishing, but they are uneasy over the possible consequence of rapid and repeated changes in the price of crude oil. Unless some deep and undisclosed plan exists for far-reaching warfare in the oil business, the explanation must be the immense and growing consumption of petroleum products and the outlook for still greater increases upon the stock of oil now above ground. The vast spread of the automobile industry involves the consumption of enormous quantities of gasoline, and the increasing use of internal combustion engines in vessels is another important factor in the strength of the market for crude petroleum and its products.

More than 300 seagoing ships are already equipped with oil engines which do not burn their fuel under ordinary boilers, but explode it in their cylinders. The history of the oil industry shows that these conditions will probably result in the discovery of new fields and another long step forward in the production of crude oil. If that happens the rise in the price of all petroleum products is likely to be checked, even if there should be no reaction toward lower market levels. The future of the entire industry hinges upon the yield of oil from the earth. Once get petroleum enough above ground and the lawmaking power in the countries which are the great consumers of illuminating oil, gasoline and other products of like nature can be trusted to force a reasonable scale of prices to purchasers."—L. C. Times.

Answering an enquirer who desires to know if there has been a Baptist president of the United States, the Richmond Times-Discussor says: There has not. There have been eight Episcopalian: Washington, Madison, Monroe, William Henry Harrison, Tyler, Taylor, Pierce and Arthur. There have been six Presbyterians: Jackson, Buchanan, Polk, Lincoln, Cleveland, Benjamin Harrison, and to these Woodrow Wilson must be added. There have been four Methodist chief magistrates, Johnson, Grant, Hayes, McKinley, Van Buren and Roosevelt were adherents of the Reformed Dutch church. John Quincy Adams was a Congregationalist. Fillmore and Taft were Unitarians. Garfield was a Disciple. Seven religious bodies have been represented by the twenty-six presidents.—EX.

A recently-issued report by a packing house calls attention to the fact that one reason for the high price of beef is the slaughter of calves. In 1911 there were 8,000,000 calves killed in the United States, their average weight being seventy pounds. If they had been kept alive for one year their average weight would have been about 600 pounds. Incidentally the increase in weight would have made beef more plentiful, and not improbably cheaper.—EX.



IN LENT, BUT NOT OF LENT.

Every year the duration of Lent is a puzzle to many persons who cannot understand why the forty-day period they know it covers is more than forty days long, from the beginning to the end. They see by the calendar that Good Friday comes more than forty days after Ash Wednesday, and yet they are informed that Lent lasts precisely forty days. The explanation lies in the fact that Sundays are all feast days, not fast days, in the usage of the churches, which observe Lent strictly. So the Sundays which come between the beginning of Lent and its close are like islands in a sea or cleared spaces in a forest, and they do not count in making the forty days of the Lenten period of self-denial. After Lent comes there must be forty days before it ends, not including any Sunday. With this fact kept in mind, the calendar will be found to fit the established duration of Lent, and there will be no difficulty in understanding the time required to reckon up its forty days.—Cleveland Leader.
