SPAIN'S KING.

King Alfonso's behavior in the affair of Sunday last was quite characteristic, for his courage is known of all men, as his father's was. Throughout his reign, the young sovereign has shown absolute fearlessness, both physical and moral. Few rulers have had greater difficulties and dangers to face. The country has been disturbed in all sorts of ways. Alfonso's title is disputed by millions of his subjects who are monarchists by conviction, but who believe that the throne rightfully belongs to the Carlist branch of the Bourbon house. The Republicans, of course, detest monarchy, no matter who happens to wear the crown. Nevertheless, the weakly boy rose fast in the public esteem and now, nearing the end of his twentieth year, may be said to incarnate Spain's best hope of progress along conservative lines.

The change wrought within the last four decades is truly marvelous. Alfonso XII succeeded to a heritage of infamy, for his mother was the Queen Isabella whose name became a byword in all centers of gossip, and his father, Francisco de Assisi, was a contemptible fiend. But Alfonso XII was made of different stuff. Brave as a lion, his tact and common sense soon became proverbial. Though his second marriage (with Maria Christina, a Hapsburg princess) was no love match, as his marriage with Maria de Las Mercedes had been, the alliance was a most lucky one, for Maria Christina had to serve as regent till the present King, a posthumous son, reached his sixteenth year, and the regent performed her delicate duties with the rarest unselfishness and skill. Regeneration was constantly in the air, but universal respect for a noble woman kept the most radical opponents within bounds.

The young King has not infrequently gone counter to the deepest prejudices of the race, but has always known just where to stop. Thus he married an English princess reared in the Protestant faith and thereby set precedent above policy. But there has never been the slightest suspicion of foreign influence, and the wisdom of the match has passed beyond controversy.

Alfonso's escape from death is most fortunate in every sense, but is especially fortunate because the heir to the throne is only six years old, and another long regency might give the revolutionists the upper hand. Spain is rich in every resource, but needs decades of peace for their full development. For years and years, the country was the prey of bloodthirsty factions, as Mexico now is. It seemed as if there would never again be a stable government. But Alfonso XII came just in time to save society from total wreck, and the work of salvage thus begun has gone steadily on. Alfonso XIII is "every inch a king" and all true friends of Spain will wish him a reign as long as Louis XIV's.—Times Democrat.

MEETING OF IBERIA TRUCKERS' ASSOCIATION

New Iberia, La., Apr. 9, '13.

The Iberia Parish Truckers' Association met this day with President E. J. Carstens in the chair and the following members present, to-wit: Messrs. C. L. Lassalle, N. Lemaire, F. G. DeCour, G. B. Vlobergh, Agricole Breau, Edmond Darby, Fred Decuir, W. D. Condron, Delma Bodin and J. E. Schwing.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The following applications for membership were presented and duly accepted, namely: Messrs. Oscar D. Romero, R. P. Ribbeck, Geo. F. Winters, Gall O. Pharr, James Marin, Sr., and Paul Doerle. They all paid their initiation fee of 50 cents to the Treasurer.

The following personages were added to the Honorary list of members of the Association, viz: The President of the Police Jury, The President of the Board of Trade, the Agent of the Frisco at New Iberia, the Agent of the M. L. & T. R. R. & S. S. Co., at New Iberia, the Agent of the Wells Fargo Express Co., at New Iberia and the Agent of the United States Express Co., at New Iberia.

The Treasurer of the Association made a call on the members for the first quarterly assessment of 25 cents, due since April 1st, 1913. All the members present responded at once, and the Treasurer was instructed to notify the rest of the members.

Mr. H. F. Richard appeared before the meeting on behalf of Crockett & Weil of Alexandria, La. He gave an interesting talk about the cultivation and harvesting of Irish Potatoes, and also sweet potatoes. He stated his purpose in appearing at the meeting and asked to be considered a buyer for all or a part of the Irish potatoes that the Association will control for the market, and promised to give a price that would meet with the Truckers' approval. While he did not bid for the Sweet Potatoes and onions, he stated that most probably he would be in the market for these crops as well.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

The bills of Mr. E. E. Millard for \$7.50 and Mr. M. W. Fisher for \$8.50 were presented and ordered paid.

TEACHERS AND THE TEACHING PROFESSION.

In their annual convention in the City of New Orleans this week the school teachers of Louisiana will have many problems presented to them for consideration connected with their profession. Men of science will unfold to them the mysteries of the child life, the psychology of study, the power of habit and many abstract and abstract questions; men and women of practical experience will narrate what they have gleaned from the wide school of human endeavor, and from all these sources the teacher who is alert to the voice of wisdom will gather much of practical value.

But in many respects the greatest university in the world is the schoolroom where growing children of every type are presenting constantly the many-sided, ever-changing phases of intellectual and physical development. The teacher who is able to see in the "primrose by the river's brink" nothing more than a yellow primrose, will lose much, if not indeed all, of the power that comes to her whose clear vision discerns the inner significance of the child's aspirations and strivings after the things that are but dimly set forth in the best textbooks. In fact, the lessons that are of greatest value to the pupil are those lessons which no text-book that ever was printed possesses the power to carry.

Truth and honor, dignity and virtue may be inculcated by precept upon precept, but it requires the power of a living life to fix them ineffaceably upon the heart, to grip them upon the plastic forces that produce character. And so, the personality of the teacher becomes the chief factor of importance in the classroom.

The text-book is but a suggestion; study and recitation are but the practice of mental gymnastics whereby the fibers of mind are toughened and strengthened and a clearer and broader outlook is obtained. Very necessary aids these are in the scholastic regimen but utterly deficient in the most essential requirements of a true education. Books cannot take the place of the human element in the task of building up a balanced life; for that is what true teaching means, and if it be not made to mean that, it becomes a delusion and a snare.

Education that is worth the time it takes to talk about it means equipping the student with the tools that will enable him to perform his tasks in life efficiently. Not the intellectual tools alone, but the physical tools and the moral tools as well. These require the presence of a capable and sympathetic personality as teacher, companion and friend. Not the stern requirement of compliance with rule and rote under penalty of punishment—as valuable as discipline undoubtedly is in the classroom and in the home; but the admirable blending of kindness and firmness which creates a bond of sympathy between pupil and teacher, and illumines and lightens the heavy tasks of the school day.

In our overcrowded schools the pupils lose much by lack of that intimate personal touch with the teacher, and school work becomes a task and a burden instead of being a natural and pleasant process of investigation and normal unfolding of the mind to an appreciation of the beauty of knowledge. As the traveler passing through shady lanes and green fields in a new and delightful country has presented at each turn of the road an ever-changing prospect of field and forest and lake and mountain and river, enchanting the eye and inspiring the heart—so each successive recitation in the school should present to the wondering pupil a "marvelous wealth of entrance" knowledge of which it had but dimly dreamed before.

And it is the power of personality that can accomplish this miracle. All the great teachers of antiquity made learning real and fascinating by the power of matchless personality supplemented by the force of tremendous intellectual prepotency. When Simon Peter, peering through the gloom and mist of the tempest, discerned the dim outlines of a majestic figure striding over wave and through the blinding storm he cried out in rapturous awe: "Suddenly catching a gleam of recognition, his heart bounded high within him. 'It is the Master!' he cried; and then courage rose and joy tripped over fear.

Thus it ever is with the pupil. The sympathetic smile of the master lightens the gloom, drives away fear, resolves doubt, makes the stony path smooth and enthrones self-confidence, certitude and peace, where before were confusion and despair. Teacher, would you make the study hour a pleasant pastime and the recitation room a place of triumph? Then make them mean something to your pupils. Be master of yourself and of the subjects you teach; be a sympathetic, kindly, human friend and all the rest will be yours.—Country Review.

SUGAR THE MODERN APPLE OF DISCORD.

These are perilous times for the cane sugar industry of Louisiana and the beet sugar industry of the West. It is proposed to put sugar on the free list within three years. This is a mistake. For thirty years the constant agitation of the tariff and the fear of the removal of the sugar duty have made impossible the normal development of that industry. To remove the duty would seem to be to destroy the industry; for, in the open, the United States cannot compete with Cuba, Mexico and other tropical countries. It is unjust, because it means the destruction of private property merely to appease a demagogic clamor. It is unwise, because it means the giving over to foreign countries and the American sugar trust absolute control of America's sugar supply, and it is impolitic because of the disastrous effect such action will produce upon the political situation in the United States. And in addition to all this, for the reasons set forth above, it will most probably increase the cost of sugar to the American consumer.—Country Reviews.
