The committee appointed by the members of the Spanish Lake Club met last Tuesday evening for the purpose of opening the bids for the proposed new Club buildings which they will build on that beautiful span of water. The lowest bid was that of Mr. Dan Boutte for \$1900 and the work was awarded to him. From what we are informed the construction will begin as soon as the lumber can be hauled on the grounds. Mr. F. We hope at no distant day the Commissioners of New Iberia will see the urgent necessity of purchasing a sprinkling wagon and allay the dust nuisance on the principal streets of New Iberia, especially the residence sections. At every trip of the Trolley cars on our main thoroughfare, clouds of dust from the Model Road is rolled up and sent into the homes that make it very uncomfortable and unpleasant for the occupants, particularly since the gravel has been put down in that section of the City. On some occasions when the auto hit the speedway one is literally swallowed up as it were by the dust. The investment of a sprinkling wagon would be a good one and all of the residents of New Iberia would welcome it, particularly since the automobiles are so numerous here, and have no respect as it were for the City ordinance relative to speeding within the limits.

The friends of Judge John R. Davis of the City Court are much gratified to know that he has recovered from his illness and is again resuming his work on the City Court bench, administering justice and enforcing the City ordinances. Since his sickness he was well represented by Judge Ventress J. Smith who kindly volunteered to see that the peace of the City was kept at the high standard set by Mr. Davis. We cannot but express our opinion that Mr. Smith did his duties faithfully and impartially and the violators of the law were kept in subjection during his incumbency. We trust Judge Davis health will continue to improve as heretofore.

The services of Messrs. John T. DeValcourt and Harry J. Smith expert accountants have been procured to audit the books of the New Iberia Electric Light Plant and the Collectors and Mayors offices preparatory to turning same over to the new administration. This is carrying out the usual custom of the City Fathers before winding up their affairs and we are pleased to note that local accountants were given the preference in work of this nature instead of sending off for outside help. The gentlemen will finish their work in time for next Monday evening's session when the first meeting of the Commissioners will be convened.

The Police Jury, acting as a Board of Reviewers, have been in daily session for the past week. Every assessment in the entire Parish is being scrutinized and equalized with property of like character. This work will be completed within the next few days when, we understand, notices will be sent to all taxpayers whose assessment has been disturbed, to show cause why the advance should not be made. The task undertaken is tedious and offers many difficulties, but, we trust, will result to the betterment of conditions long known to be unsatisfactory. While some of the former Board of Reviewers have tried to remedy the inequalities in assessments they have too often permitted the property holder to set his own value on his holdings and the Parish has suffered as a consequence. One landholder has been assessed for \$50,000 an acre while his neighbor was paying on a basis of \$25,000 which is unjust and should not be tolerated any longer.

The attention of our readers is directed to the strong letter issued by Mayor-elect Fontelieu who will be inducted into office next Monday evening, his commission as well as that of the other Commissioners being expected today. Mr. Fontelieu has laid great stress on what he will expect of his subordinate officers during his administration and we have reasons to feel that he will carry out every promise that he makes. With a determined official in charge of the Police Officials of this City, we cannot but believe every ordinance as now on the statute books will be rigidly enforced. Often times the Police of a town or City become inactive and indifferent towards making arrests because they have no one over them to watch their manoeuvres. Now that the power is given the Mayor to make his own selection and discharge them at his own pleasure we think they will earn every dollar that is paid them for patrolling the City. It will be noted also that the new Official intends to assume personal charge of the streets which will also effect a large saving to the municipality, this doing away with the services of a Street and Bridge Commissioner.

We have on several occasions called attention through our columns to the manner in which automobiles are run within the City limits by a number of chauffeurs, thus endangering the lives of pedestrians who are necessarily compelled to cross the streets as the occasion require. New Iberia has ordinances covering this abuse, but it seems no attention is paid to it in this community. On Sunday evening last when several hundred men, women and children were returning home from the Base Ball Park on lower Main Street, some of the autos that were in search of passengers literally tore back and forth at not less than a twenty mile an hour clip and not a single Police Officer was in sight to arrest them. It should not be necessary to await an accident before redress will be given by those who are paid to Police the City. This abuse should be corrected at once and heavy fines imposed or else some person will meet with an accident that may cost the loss of life or limb.

The new Commissioner Messrs. Fontelieu, Suberbielle and Villermin boarded the west bound train yesterday for Lake Charles where they will consult with the officials of that thriving City so as to better acquaint themselves with the Commission Form of Government system which will be put into effect here after, next Monday, when they will be sworn in as officials of New Iberia. Since the Commission Government has been adopted by our neighbors a great change for the better has taken

place there and the citizens, from what we understand would never go back to the primitive way of conducting that cities business. We anticipate the same condition here and feel satisfied the gentlemen in whose trust the citizens have placed this responsibility will all make good if they have the backing of the entire community.

On Sunday evening last Mr. Chris Capp of Avery Island and a party of ladies and gentlemen came over near meeting with an accident that might have cost them their lives. From what we could learn Mr. Capp ran his car into Church Alley with the intention of backing out and turning around, unaware that the Trolley Car was just ahead of his party when he backed his auto onto the track resulting in a collision and all of the occupants being thrown out and slightly bruised, the car being dragged almost a half block before it could be extricated and released from the Electric car.

We wish to call the attention of the Health Officers of a serious condition existing because of the thousands of dead and dying fish contaminating the waters of Bayou Teche and poisoning the atmosphere with the stench of decay. To add to the dangers of such a condition, a number of negroes, armed with long poles and believing that the fish rise to the surface in search of shade have been engaged in killing and capturing the sick fish to indulge their appetites. Annually at this season, this condition arises to a greater or less extent; and is due to the poisoning of the Teche by agencies which can and should be traced. Seeking to serve their own interest, it has long been a practice for persons and corporations to use the Teche as a cheap and convenient receptacle for their refuse, without care or thought of the consequences to the health and comforts of entire communities and annually protests are made to no purpose. The laws of the land offers remedies for such evils and should be invoked and we sincerely trust that the authorities will exert themselves to have them strictly enforced.



And it is further ordered by the Court, that the clerk shall send by mail to all known creditors, copies of said petition and this order, addressed to them at their places of residence as stated.
