

OFFICER GOES FOR WALTERS.

Opelousas, La., June 18.—H. E. Estorge, the officer named in the requisition papers signed by Governor Hall for the transfer to Louisiana of W. C. Walters, held in jail at Columbia, Miss., on the charge of kidnaping Bobbie Dunbar, leaves tomorrow morning to bring Walters to Opelousas, following the granting last night by Governor Brewer, of Mississippi of the requisition.

Walters will be confined in jail here pending action by the grand jury.

It is stated by the district attorney that nothing he knows of will take the case out of the ordinary course, and that the trial will probably not come up until next September or October, after the summer vacation of the court.

While the people here are much interested in the case, there seems to be no spirit of animosity prevalent among them toward Walters, and, as one of Mr. Dunbar's attorneys said today, "Walters might be turned loose on our streets without incurring the least risk of injury."

It is the general opinion here that Walters will be perfectly safe in the jail here, which is a modern one and well equipped throughout.

The Police Jury met in special session this day in pursuance with the following call: Sir—Please be advised that a special meeting of the Police Jury has been called for Saturday, June 14th, 1913. 1st. To accompany the officers of the State Highway Department on an inspection trip over the Model Road; and for the transaction of all business connected with the road.

2d. For the consideration of and action upon any and all business which may be presented at the meeting.

Pharr reported to the Jury the death of a mule with charbon on his plantation and the presence in his pasture of some twenty heads of stock belonging to his neighbors which had been exposed to the disease. He stated that he had vaccinated all of his stock and agreed to vaccinate these others if the vaccine virus necessary was furnished him. On motion of Mr. Gates seconded by Dr. Boykin and carried, the Secretary was instructed to procure the vaccine virus for Mr. Pharr and that all the stock be quarantined in Mr. Pharr's custody, for a period of ten days.

After a discussion of the roads in general, the Jury accompanied State Highway Engineer W. E. Atkinson and his assistant, F. S. Shields on an inspection of the Model Road which the contractor wished to turn over as completed. On arriving in Jeanerette the meeting was continued in the offices of the Citizen's Bank. Mr. Atkinson pointing out the defects in construction which he required to be repaired before final acceptance of the road. The contractor agreed to make these repairs without delay and in explaining his contract, confirmed his agreement to maintain the road for a period of five years.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the meeting was adjourned.

THE SLAUGHTERING OF YOUNG CATTLE.

The Grand Cane Item calls attention to the appalling increase in the slaughter of young cattle, and very rightly urges the farmers to pay more attention to the raising of cattle and all kinds of stock. The Item says:

At the rate at which young cattle are being slaughtered for the market the time is not far distant when it will be almost impossible to find commercial cattle to supply the public demand in this country. Even now the prices are becoming almost prohibitive to the poorer classes of people, and something will have to be done to supply the deficit and lower the high prices of meat in all markets.

Our farmers will have to give more attention to poultry and stockraising—to raising a more feed for wintering cattle, and giving them better care and protection in cold weather. There are constant, though gradual, changes going on throughout the country effecting the conditions and opportunities of the farmer and it is important to them that they give thought to them. For instance, the last census report disclosed the fact that there is a deficiency in the number of sheep, hogs, and cattle, and thus better opportunities of the farmer for profitable returns from stock raising follows. The price of hogs and good beef cattle at the present time makes stock raising an inviting field.

MRS. CARSON TELLS SHERIFF "I WILL KILL YOU."

Monroe, La., June 18.—"The State of Louisiana has broken faith with me one of its citizens, and now I propose to break the laws of the State," were the defiant words of Mrs. Sue Garig Carson, wife of the Rev. C. H. Carson, formerly rector of the Episcopal Church here, delivered in open court just before noon today.

As Mrs. Carson was leaving the court room she said to Sheriff "Jack" Parker: "You had better write that letter I told you to write, for I am going to kill you."

Immediately Sheriff Parker took her by the arm, escorted her back to the court room and asked Judge Dawkins to interdict her, that he would make out papers at once. At present Mrs. Carson is under arrest, and it is probable she will be called before the court later today and possibly interdicted.

This unique case had its inception more than a year ago, when Mrs. Carson sued her husband, a talented Episcopal rector, for divorce, which was denied. They have one son, a boy about ten years old, and Mrs. Carson has persistently contended that the State has denied her due consideration and rights, and that her son has been denied the support and care guaranteed citizens.

Her husband, who was also archbishop of North Louisiana, was transferred to Panama by Bishop Sessums. The immediate cause of the trouble was the sale of the home of the Carsons at sheriff sale, on foreclosure of mortgage. She refused to vacate and prepared to defend what she termed her rights. This morning a rule to show cause why she should not be evicted was on trial, and it was then she made the startling declaration. The rule was decided against her and she was ordered evicted.

Ordinance Police Jury.

The following ordinance was introduced by Mr. DeBlanc and was on his motion, seconded by Dr. Boykin, unanimously adopted:

Whereas it has come to the knowledge of the Police Jury that the practice of permitting the carcasses of dead animals to remain unburied and to decay in the open fields and pastures; throughout the Parish; and Whereas such practices are public nuisances and withal exceedingly unsanitary, now therefore

Sec. 1. Be it Resolved and ordained by the Police Jury of Iberia Parish, in regular session assembled, that hereafter the carcasses of all horses, mules, cattle, sheep, hogs, dogs, cats or other animals which may die within the Parish of Iberia, shall immediately be destroyed by burning or be buried not less than four feet below the surface.

Sec. 2. Be it further resolved and ordained, etc., that any person or persons violating the provisions of Sec. 1 of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction by any Court of competent jurisdiction, shall be fined in an amount not to exceed twenty five dollars or in default of payment shall be imprisoned, not to exceed thirty days; or both in the discretion of the Court.

Sec. 3. Be it further resolved, ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall be enforced immediately upon its promulgation.

ACT OF INCORPORATION OF THE FULLER DRUG COMPANY

STATE OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF IBERIA. Be it known that on this 29th day of the month of May, A. D., 1913, before me, Ventress J. Smith, a Notary Public, duly commissioned and qualified, of Louisiana, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declared that availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of the State of Louisiana relative to the formation of corporations, and agree by these presents to covenant and undertake, to contract, sue and be sued; to purchase, hold, sell, lease, mortgage and pledge real estate and personal property, to appoint such directors, officers and agents as the interests of the Company may require, and generally to do all things, needful and necessary for the purposes herein stated.

ARTICLE II. The domicile of this corporation shall be in the City of New Iberia, Parish of Iberia, Louisiana, and all citations or other legal process shall be served upon the President, and in his absence upon the Vice-President, or in the absence of both, upon the Secretary-Treasurer.

ARTICLE III. The purpose for which this corporation is established and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are declared to be the purchase and sale, by retail, of drugs, chemicals, toilet articles, perfumery, etc.; and all other articles of merchandise that is or may be incident to the carrying on of a general retail drug business.

ARTICLE IV. The capital stock of this corporation is fixed at Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00), divided into and represented by one hundred shares of the par value of One Hundred Dollars each. No certificate of stock shall be issued until the same shall have been paid for, in cash, property, or such other equivalent as the Board of Directors may determine or the laws of the State of Louisiana may permit.

This corporation shall have the right to begin business as soon as Three Thousand Dollars of the capital stock shall have been subscribed and paid for by the stockholder in this company shall offer for sale any stock in this company without first offering to one of the members hereof and ten days notice given of such intended sale. It being understood that the shareholders in this company shall first be given the privilege of purchasing any stock that may be offered for sale.

ARTICLE V. The corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of three Directors elected by a majority of the stockholders thereof at the annual election to be held hereafter, on the first Monday of June of each year. The said Board shall hold office for one year or until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. In case of failure to elect Directors on the day herein fixed, this corporation shall not be dissolved but the incumbent Directors shall continue in office until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. If any vacancy should occur on the Board of Directors the same shall be filled by the remaining Directors by appointment from among the stockholders.

ARTICLE VI. The Board of Directors shall have power to make, adopt or repeal such rules and regulations for the conduct, management and business of the corporation as they may deem proper; to appoint from time to time such officers, agents, clerks, or other employees as they may deem necessary, and to discharge at pleasure. All salaries and compensation for agents, clerks and employees shall be fixed by the Board of Directors and shall be changed at their pleasure.

ARTICLE VII. The officers of this corporation shall consist of a President, Vice President and Secretary-Treasurer elected by the Board of Directors at their first meeting to be held on the first Monday of June 1914; at every annual election notice thereof shall be given to the stockholders by publication ten days previous to said meeting and at the annual meeting of the stockholders may vote by proxy.

ARTICLE VIII. At its dissolution, whether by liquidation or expiration of Charter or otherwise, the affairs of this corporation shall be liquidated by one or more Commissioners, elected by a majority of stockholders at a meeting held for that purpose, ten days previous notice in writing being given to each stockholder. Said Commissioners to remain in office until the affairs of said corporation shall have been finally liquidated; and should a vacancy occur in their number such vacancy shall be filled by the remaining Commissioners from one of the stockholders.

ARTICLE IX. No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or debts thereof in any further sum than the unpaid balance due to the company on the shares of stock subscribed by him; nor shall any informality in organization have the effect of rendering this Charter void or invalid in any liability beyond the unpaid balance, if any, of his stock.

ARTICLE X. Until the election to be held in June 1914, the first Board of Directors shall consist of Thomas E. Conrad, Henry L. Fuller and W. L. Burke; of whom Thomas E. Conrad shall be President; W. L. Burke, Vice President, and Henry L. Fuller, Secretary-Treasurer.
