Last Tuesday evening a number of gentlemen met in the office of the City Judge, where they had been invited to attend an impromptu meeting to listen to a few remarks of Mr. E. P. Carstens of Shreveport, La., relative to equalizing the assessments of New Iberia, as was done at the above place at the urgent request of Mr. Carstens. The gentleman explained what had been done in his adopted home and showed the gross irregularities as they existed there until the block system of assessing was adopted, which has proven a God send to the community and every taxpayer is placed on an equal footing. His remarks were well received, and we have reasons to believe will prove of much benefit to our Commissioners, when they take up the work here. Mr. Carstens complimented the work of the present Police Jury for taking the lead, among the South Louisiana Parishes in the publication of the list of assessments. From what we understand it was the intention of the present Commissioners to take up this work and make their own assessment for the present year, but it seems there is a flaw in the Law that necessitates postponement until 1914 when New Iberia will make its own assessment and tax every piece of property 50 per cent of its value. Mr. Carstens left for Baton Rouge on Wednesday where he appeared before the Board of Equalizers on behalf of some Law which he wished to have enacted at the session of the State Legislature. The attendance at the meeting was not very large, however, the following gentlemen interested in equal taxation turned out to hear him, among them being Mayor Fontelle, and Commissioners Suberbielle and Villere. Dr. H. A. King, president of the Police Jury, Wm. Bernard, Prof. L. E. Wale, Harry T. Hall, W. B. Sharp, E. P. Millard, Dr. W. F. Carstens, Sam LeBlanc and M. W. Fisher.

Iberia Parish Truckers' Association.

E. J. CARSTENS, President.

The meeting held by the Iberia Parish Truckers' Association was largely attended, all seemed anxious to go to work and make a success, by giving their attention to the growing of all kinds of truck for the Northern, Western as well as our local market.

Each member had his list, which was handed to the Secretary, giving the number of acres they will put in truck, and the quantity they will have ready to ship this coming Fall and Winter.

Judging from the number of letters received from produce dealers, there is every prospect that a large quantity of truck will be disposed of. Their representative will be on hand just as soon as we will be ready to ship.

It is now up to the truckers, to get busy and be ready, by being first and having the best in the market, Iberia Parish will soon be known as the garden Parish of Louisiana.

Remember we must have quality, and quantity to induce buyers to come to our city. After they have been here once and seeing what fine vegetables grown by our gardeners, buyers will locate here, then there will be no more trouble for our gardeners to dispose of all the truck they can raise.

Then what a change will come over our city, truckers will need help to gather and pack vegetables, and that means a big pay roll every Saturday evening.

The employed will need provisions, dry goods, shoes, etc., merchants will be kept busy the whole season as truck is an all cotton crop, not like cane and sugarcane, only a few months, during Fall and Winter.

Now let us get ready and commence operations. The first to give our attention is the cabbage crop, as this is one of the most important for Fall and Winter, thousand of car lots are shipped and sold every season to the Northern, Western as well as our local markets.

The next consideration is the variety to plant. The mistake made by many of our gardeners is the growing of large and late sorts, they are not wanted. The demand is for early and small size, weighing from two to five pounds; they are also more profitable to the truckers as a greater number can be grown to the acre.

It will be useless and time lost to try to grow cabbage on poor soil. The land should be well fertilized with rotted stable manure, if not available, then use commercial fertilizer, about 1000 to 1500 pounds to the acre. It is not expensive, about \$27.50 per ton. After the cabbages are off the same land can be used in the Spring for crops forming roots, bulbs, such as beet, carrot, peas, corn, melon, cucumber, squash, etc.

It will be more profitable to plant only one acre, soil well fertilized, making a full crop of headed cabbage than having a lot of loose headed unsalable. Seed of all varieties, early and late can be sown from the 1st of August to the 1st of September.

By sowing seeds of the following named varieties, headed cabbage will be ready for market from November to February. At that time they are in demand, gardeners will find ready sale for their crop.

The Early Jersey Wakefield is the first to head for market in 80 to 90 days, short stemmed cone shaped, a reliable header, weighing from 2 to 4 pounds. By setting plants in rows three feet apart 15 inches distant in line, from 8000 to 9000 can be grown to the acre. The next is Early

Summer 80 to 90 days, heads hard and flat, same weight as the above planted same distance.

Stein's Early Flat Dutch 90 to 100 days, a variety planted extensively by truckers. Good sized head 2 to 7 pounds. Good seller for local market.

Henderson Succession 120 days, good sized forming solid heads from 4 to 8 pounds.

All Season 120 day, one of the best all around cabbage for gardeners, stands all kind of weather, does not burst early, and slow to run up into seed, weight 4 to 8 pounds.

The following are the late sorts, Late Flat Dutch, Surehead, St. Louis Late Market, forming very large heads weighing from 8 to 25 pounds, not desirable for shippers, as large sized cabbage are not in demand. The sorts wanted are the 2 to 5 pounds. So do not waste time in growing a large crop of late sorts.

To raise plants from the seed sown in August, you will have a deal of trouble on account of insects destroying the young plants as soon as they are up, consequently care must be taken in preparing the seed bed.

Choose a piece of land as far as possible from hedge rows and fences, as they are the breeding place for all kind of insects injurious to vegetables. Also be careful that the piece of land you are going to utilize for seed bed, that no cabbage has been grown on that piece of land the year previous.

The seed bed should be about 21 feet wide and as long as necessary according to the quantity of seeds to be sown. After the ground has been spaded and well pulverized, level with a rake and free from clods, sow the seeds, water with a sprinckler, scatter tobacco dust over seeds sown, then cover same with pulverized dirt using the hand or a course sieve.

After the seeds are sown the beds should be covered with boards, leaving a distance about six inches from the ground.

In about four or five days seeds will be up, then uncover, water plants as often as necessary, cabbage flies will still attack the young plants. They can be kept off by using tobacco dust. Apply in the morning when the dew is on.

In about five or six weeks plants will be ready to set out. Do not allow plants to remain too long in seed bed; eight weeks is long enough.

Seeds can also be sown in drills 15 inch apart. The early variety plants can be set in rows three feet apart, 15 to 18 inches distant in line, take them out of seed bed carefully with a garden trowel. There is no necessity of waiting for rain or change of the moon. Set out when ready. All that is necessary aryafter plants are set is water immediately. Apply about one pint of water to each plant, continue every morning and evening until they have taken root. Cultivate often with a hoe until large enough to use a plow.

Those who intend growing cauliflower can follow same directions as for cabbage. The requirements are the same.

Only the early varieties of cauliflower should be planted so heads can be ready from November to January. Sow seeds of the following:

Early Snowball, Early Erfurt, Half Early Paris.

At the end of the month weather not too hot and dry plant Bush beans, Beet, Carrot, mustard, Swiss Chard, Turnip, Radish, Ruta Baga, Parsley, Endive, set out Shallots.






