Police Juror Horace P. Jates and Mr. Nic Muller are erecting a corn shelter in the upper portion of New Iberia. This is a banner year for the raising of corn in this Parish and unless all sign fail prices will be fairly good this season, despite the arge crop.

—Died, at the residence of its parents in New Iberia on Sunday, Feb. 12, 1913, Annie Deloro, born Feb. 12, 1913, the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Deloro. The funeral was held from the Catholic church on Monday, August 11th.

—Deputy Sheriff Thomas Migués made a flying trip to Many, La., Sabine Parish, where he accompanied two gentlemen arrested at the instance of the Sheriff of that Parish. Mr. Migués returned home on Monday evening.

—Since cotton has virtually come back as one of the staple crops of this section, a number of men have erected cotton gins throughout the Parish. This week Mr. Villa Rubia of New Orleans closed the sale of a large gin to be erected by Mr. Joseph Norres, one of our prosperous farmers of the 5th Ward. While the rains have done considerable damage to the fleecy staple still the outlook is good for a fair crop this year.

—Last Wednesday morning at 3 o'clock, the large, recently overhauled wharf on Fulton Street used by the Southern Pacific as the docks was discovered on fire. It was only by the prompt arrival of the Fire Department that a disastrous conflagration did not take place. This wharf is situated back of the large planing mill of the O. J. Trainor Cistern Factory and for a time it looked like the mill was in great danger. The general impression is that the fire was of incendiary origin as traces of coal oil was very evident from the general manner in which the fire spread.

—At the invitation and through the efforts of one of our fellow-citizens, Mr. H. C. Butts of Missouri, a large real estate dealer and capitalist visited New Iberia where he spent several days looking over the adjacent country with the intention, if lands are sold cheap enough, to settle a colony near here. The gentleman was escorted around by Hon. H. P. Gates and from what we learn his impression of lands here were very favorable. From this point he went to Lafayette where he also looked over several tracts of land. If our people ever hope to have colonies settle here they must not hold up the prices of their holdings at exorbitant figures as is done in some sections.

—Died, at the home of his parents in Loreauville, on Tuesday, August 12th, 1913, Adrien Gonssolin, Jr., aged 25 years, son of Hon. Adrien Gonssolin of the above mentioned place. Mr. Gonssolin had been ill for several weeks and his death was unexpected. His remains were interred in St. Joseph's Catholic cemetery on Wednesday afternoon at five o'clock. The family have the sympathy of a large number of relatives and friends. Since writing the above we are informed that Mrs. Gonssolin, the esteemed mother of the deceased is critically ill as a result of the shock.

—This section of the country has had several rains that were unprecedented, covering many of the public roads with water until it was unsafe to travel. Last Saturday after the heavy precipitation, we are informed that water would actually reach inside of vehicles coming through the pasture leading to Lourd's lane. We hope at no distant day when the Police Jury is enabled to float their proposed lands sufficient canals will be dug to prevent these occurrences. It is only by good drainage that our highways will be fit to travel and we sincerely hope our Parish solons will have no trouble in disposing of their bonds which will enable them to remedy these conditions.

—The members of the Uncolored Aid Society are arranging to give a Lawn Party on some date during the last week of September, for the purpose of raising money to meet the needs that so often occur for their assistance among those in want. A program will be arranged that will make the event one of the best from an amusement standpoint ever arranged by the ladies.

—Last Thursday evening at about 6:30 the large barn situated on the Lourd property, East Side of the Bayou Teche owned by Mr. Longtin was completely destroyed by fire. The location of the building where the Fire Department could not reach it, made it impossible to save any part of the structure. Besides a large amount of feed which Mr. Longtin kept on hand for his herd of dairy cows there were 40 barrels of onions destroyed. The most unfortunate feature of the loss is the fact that Mr. Longtin did not carry one cent worth of insurance, consequently the loss is a heavy one.

—Contractor Eugene Guillot is placing material on the grounds of Mount Carmel Convent where an elegant building is soon to be erected. The spreading fame of this splendid institution has been attracting larger numbers of pupils each year, until the present buildings have become inadequate to the demands of comfort. Recently application was made to the Archbishop for permission to enlarge the Convent and resulted in the contract to Mr. Guillot for the construction of an annex which is to be a replica of the building fronting Bayou Teche. When completed, the two buildings will have a frontage on the Bayou of 114 feet by a depth of 58 feet. The lower floor will be devoted to the Chapel and six large, well ventilated class rooms; while the second story will contain the dormitories and a suit of bath rooms with shower attachments; the entire buildings to be steam heated and equipped with every modern convenience. The proposed improvements will add much to the attractiveness of the already beautiful spot and will, we hope, be an added inducement to parents to entrust the care of their children to the good Sisters there whom no safer guardians could be chosen.

—For several years there has been an ordinance, drafted which prohibit owners of vehicles of any description whatsoever, from driving into the gutters and other drains within the limits of New Iberia. A penalty by fine and imprisonment being the punishment to be meted out to persons ignoring the law. We are pleased to see Mayor Fontelieu announce his determination to run down any driver discovered impeding the drains. It is useless for the City Fathers to make an effort to keep up the drains if every driver of a delivery wagon is permitted to cut them up as fast as they are put into shape to drain off surplus water which runs through them daily. In many instances heavy teams and automobiles plow down into them several inches deep, thus stopping all outlets and otherwise undoing what has been done at a great cost to the City Treasury. One or two convictions will go along ways towards correcting this abuse and we are pleased to see Mr. Fontelieu enforce this necessary law. Thousands of dollars have been spent for a Model Road in the eastern portion of the City and if the practice is continued by drivers in cutting up the ditches the whole road will prove a failure. Let the Police Officers be on the alert in the future.

Official Minutes Board of Trustees.

New Iberia, La., Aug. 11, '13. The Board of Trustees of the City of New Iberia met this day with Mayor Alphe Fontelieu presiding and Messrs. Suberbielle and Villermain in attendance.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved on motion of Mr. Villermain, seconded by Mr. Suberbielle and carried.

At the request of Mr. Villermain and on his motion, seconded by Mr. Suberbielle and carried the Trustee of Public Property was authorized to purchase water meters to be installed and in operation by October 1st, 1913, unless advised by consumers that water is not needed after September 1st, 1913. The rate to be 15 cents per 1000 gallons for the first 50,000 gallons and all above at the rate of 10 cents per 1000 gallons. The meters to be installed as follows, to-wit: New Iberia Foundry and Machine Shop 1 inch; Joel H. Fisher stable, 3/4 inch; W. O. Hugonin, saloon, 3/4 inch; Elks Lodge 3/4 inch; Eureka Hotel 1 inch; Mrs. Frank Blane, residence 1 inch; Miss Mona McMahon 1 inch; Patent Bros. stable 1 inch; Jules Landry saloon 1 inch; New Iberia Sanitary Laundry 1 inch; Alma Hotel 1 inch; Frederick Hotel 2 inch; A. A. Siebek barber shop 1 inch; LaBlanc & Broussard garage, 1 inch; A. G. Emmer office building Ernest Armurier 1 inch; Court House, 1 1/2 inch; George Duperier Stable 3/4 inch; Mrs. John Broussard stable 1 inch; Masonic building 1 inch; J. R. Taylor office building 1 inch; Peoples National Bank 1 inch; State National Bank 1 inch.

—This done and adopted on this 11th day of August A. D., 1913. An ordinance confirming the ordinance of June 30th 1913, extending the corporate limits of this City, which had been published and posted according to law, was submitted by Mr. Suberbielle and read, and laid over for a final vote to the expiration of the ten days required by City Charter.

It was on motion of Mr. Villermain, seconded by Mr. Suberbielle and carried that the contract awarded to Mr. John W. Angers for the driving of piling in the Bayou Teche, under date of July 16th, 1913, be transferred to Mr. Robert Angers.

Mr. Villermain requested permission to place the horse used by the employees of the Electric Light Plant with some employee of the plant for feed and care, the expenses for feed to be paid


