Through the efforts of Rev. J. M. Langlois, the good pastor of St. Peter's Catholic church New Iberia will, within the next few months be possessed of a first-class boys preparatory school where the higher grades also will be taught. From what we are informed negotiations are under way for taking over the beautiful property of the heirs of the late Jack Henshaw, situated on the Model road which abuts the Teche. It is the intention to make the tuition so small for the admission of the pupils that there will be no excuse for any boy to go without an education should he wish to enter the place of learning. It is hoped the plans of Father Langlois will materialize as there is a good opening here for a school of that kind and it will relieve the congested condition of the public schools of this City.

In a conversation with one of the citizens of Jeanerette who came here on a business mission this week, his remarks with reference to the unsightly condition of the Court House square, made so by a lot of dirty rotten benches being scattered over the grounds in a helter skelter manner demands that something be done at once to either have them overhauled, painted and set to one side or taking them entirely off the public grounds. The gentleman wanted to know if the citizens of New Iberia had "lost all of their civic pride." We offer as a suggestion that the City Commissioners ask permission to have about a dozen repaired and painted and set on a cement foundation to one side of the grounds and the remaining number be used as fire wood or given to some one who can use them as yard benches. rettean was, that they were "unfit to be in one's back yard, much less in the Court House square." Remarks like the above coming from a visitor should bestir some one who has authority to get busy at once and remove the unsightly benches from the grounds.

The Southwestern Traction and Power Company received their new car last Monday direct from an Eastern factory and it was immediately put into service between this City and Jeanerette, though the car is intended for the St. Martinville extension as soon as the line is constructed. The car bears the inscription St. Martinville on one end while the other is lettered Jeanerette, and is a good indication that they anticipate an early start on the extension to that point. The new car is about six foot longer than the others in use and has a smoking compartment in conjunction with the baggage room and as a whole is much more comfortable to ride in than the others in service. The first trip was made last Tuesday with Mr. Frank Delahoussaye in charge. It would be an accommodation and a great convenience to the conductors were the local people to pass over their fares as they enter the car instead of making the conductors walk through to collect between the different stops, some of which is only a few hundred feet as it is impossible for them to help the ladies on and off should the patrons compel them to run after fares.

Whether or not the negroes of this vicinity will succeed in raising the necessary bonus for the establishment in this Parish of the Southern University, we are unable to state, but up to the present they have received by subscription from their own race something over \$5,000, a very creditable showing when taken into consideration the condition of this section due to loss of crops, which necessarily means a stringent money market. We noticed a few days since in a special sent from Baton Rouge that the citizens there had voted a special tax of \$20,000 to be used for the purpose of constructing a High School for the use of the negroes, the tax being voted almost unanimously with thousands of dollars for internal improvements, such as extending the sewerage and water works system. The maintenance of that school once it is erected will require not less than \$2,000 additional to be taken out of the City treasury. In the case of the establishment here of a training school where they are to be taught farming and other trades which will fit them to make an honest living the outlay for the buildings alone will be something like \$200,000, the appropriation being already made by both the State and Federal Government, conditionally upon the site being donated by those interested. To maintain a school of that nature it will require not less than \$40,000 per annum which will also be circulated among the business houses of this City for the necessary food stuffs and clothing of those in attendance as boarding pupils. If the school is a good thing for Donaldsonville, Alexandria, Baton Rouge and other cities we can see no reason why an effort should not be made to assist the negroes in raising the bonus to locate the school here.
