**"THE CONFESSION."**

**THE POOR MAN'S FRIEND.**

We have heard a good deal of the poor man's friend. Here is one so advertised. He is a politician, and wants the poor man's vote, mainly because it is more numerous than the rich man's. And this is a symptom of charity among us, and it would be childish to snarl at it.

But the thoughtful mind does not resist the conclusion that in the long run such deeds are not of much permanent value to the poor.

The poor man has just one friend, real friend.

It is the Honest Man.

The more you think of that word, "honest," the more it seems to roar like thunder, to flash revealingly like lightning.

The honest thinker, the man who refuses to say what he does not believe—how much the poor owe him. It is he who has stopped gloomy theories, overturned tyrant thrones, abolished iniquitous laws, done away with the customs. To him is due the death of witch burning slavery, and quackery.

The poor have but one enemy. It is Privilege. In the end the poor pay for hereditary monarchies, tariff-fattened trusts, grafts, and sinecures. And the buttresses of privilege are moral cowardice and intellectual dishonesty.

The prime minister of Privilege is Expediency.

It is expediency that protects and promotes graft, ecclesiastical, political, or financial. It is because men say what they do not believe for the wretched reason that "it is best," or "it is safest," that ancient frauds live on and are fattened by the blood of the poor.

There is no finer charity on earth than for a man to be truth, tell the truth and act the truth. At last it is such a man who blesses his fellows.

To get money from the people by chicanery and return it, or a part of it, to them as charity, this has hitherto been the typical philanthropist. The moral sense of the modern world has gotten, or is getting, beyond that.

The Roman emperors oppressed the people and gave them bread and circuses—"panem et circenses." The spiritual lords of medievalism oppressed the people and gave them "alms." The modern financial baron oppresses the people and gives them "institutions."

"And yet I show unto you a more excellent way."

It is—be honest.

Take nothing you do not earn. Accept no benefit for which you do not return some equivalent. Do not do anything that does not appeal to you as the truth. Tell the truth. Quit trying to "do the people good." Begin trying to be honest, plain, downright honest.

So doing you may be sure that no matter how lonesome or absurd you may appear on earth, you will find that in heaven your name will be set down as "The Poor Man's Friend."—Ruston Leader.
