AMENDMENT TO CHARTER OF Iberia and Spanish Lake Club.

New Iberia, La., May 4th, 1913

The active members of the Iberia &
Spanish Lake Club met this day pursuant
to call. Present, Luke Trainor, Captain,
A. J. Maunus, Secretary, Robert P.
Broussard, by proxy to A. J. Maunus,
Walter J. Burke, Dr. Henry A. King,
A. B. Murray, C. E. Smedes, by proxy to
A. J. Maunus, William Lassalle and Zouen
Decuir, Absent, Alxio Voorhies, Jules
Dreyfus, Dr. George Sabatier and R. P.
Hogsett.

The Captain stated that pursuant to call
the members met for the purpose of con-
sidering the necessity and advisability of
amending the articles of incorporation in
order to undertake certain improve-
ments and extensions contemplated by
the Club.

After general discussion, upon motion
of A. B. Murray, seconded by Walter J.
Burke and unanimously carried, the fol-
lowing resolution was adopted, to wit:

Whereas the owners and active mem-
bers of the Iberia & Spanish Lake Club
are desirous of making the Club more at-
tractive by undertaking and completing
certain improvements and extensions for
the benefit of the membership, and for
the purpose of giving greater financial as-
surance to the Club in undertaking these im-
provements by permitting other persons to
become Active Members of the Club upon
the payment of twenty five dollars initia-
tion fee, and in so doing, to eliminate
what was known as the Passive Member-
ship.

Therefore be it resolved that the origi-
nal Charter or articles of Incorporation of
the Iberia & Spanish Lake Club, in order
to carry out the foregoing changes and
stipulations, be amended so as to read as
follows:

Be it known, that on this 4th day of
May 1913, before me, Ventress J. Smith,
a Notary Public, duly commissioned and
qualified, in and for the Parish of Iberia,
State of Louisiana, personally appeared the
competent witnesses, personally known and
appeared William Lassalle, A. J. Maunus,
Walter J. Burke, Jules Dreyfus, Luke
Trainor, A. B. Murray, C. E. Smedes, Dr.
H. A. King and M. F. Hogsett, who declar-
ed and said that they are the owners of
the Club House and the grounds appur-
tenant thereto situated on Spanish Lake or
Lake Teche, in the Parish of Iberia, and
that desiring to avail themselves of the
laws of the State of Louisiana relative to
the formation of corporations for literary,
scientific and social purposes, they have
conferred and agreed together and
among themselves, together
with such other persons as may
hereafter become associated with them,
to form and constitute a corporation and
body politic in law under the conditions
and stipulations hereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE I.
The name and style of this corporation
shall be the Spanish Lake Club, and its
domicile shall be in the town of New
Iberia, Parish of Iberia, Louisiana. Under
its said corporate name it shall have
power to contract, sue and be sued, to
make and use a corporate seal, and to
make, break and alter at pleasure; to
hold, receive, lease, purchase and convey
under its corporate name, property real
and personal; to receive and accept dona-
tions and bequests of property, both real
and personal; to name and appoint such
officers and agents as the necessity or con-
venience of the corporation may require;
to make and establish such by-laws, rules
and regulations for the management and
regulation of the affairs of this company
as may be necessary and proper; and to
change and alter the same at pleasure; to
do all acts and things that may be re-
quired necessary in order to carry out the
objects and purposes of this corporation;
said corporation unless sooner dissolved
under the provisions of this Charter or by
authority of law, shall exist for a period
of twenty five years from this date; all
elections or other legal process shall be
served upon the President, or in his absence
or inability upon the Vice-President, or
in the absence of both, upon the Secretary
of the Corporation.

ARTICLE II.
The object and purposes of this corpora-
tion are hereby specified to be as follows:
To establish and maintain a Club House
for the members of the Club and their
guests. To establish and maintain a li-
brary and reading room therein; to pro-
mote literary and social intercourse
among the members; to give entertain-
ments and receptions for the members
and their guests; to inculcate a love of
the piscatorial art; and to promote the
science of gastronomy; to foster and de-
velop the social spirit among the mem-
bership, and to do all things necessary
and incidental to the purposes herein
stipulated.

ARTICLE III.
The officers of this corporation shall be
a President, a Vice-President, a Secre-
tary and Treasurer, who shall be elected
at a general meeting of the membership to
be held on the second Monday of April
of each year. A majority of the members
present shall elect.

At every general or stockholders meet-
ing of the corporation each member will
be entitled to but one vote. Ten mem-
bers shall constitute a quorum for the
transaction of the business of said corpora-
tion, and a majority of said quorum shall
decide every question. At such meeting
the members may elect their own Chair-
man and Secretary to preside.

ARTICLE IV.
The corporate powers of this associa-
tion and the management of its affairs
shall be vested in and exercised by a
Board of Directors composed of seven
members, to-wit: The President, Vice-
President, Secretary, Treasurer and three
members to be elected annually with said
Directors, and who shall hold office until
their successors have been chosen and
qualified. The Board of Directors are
given the right and authority to make such
rules, adopt by-laws and regulations for
the proper management of the affairs of
this company; to determine and to fix the
entrance or initiation fees and the terms
and conditions on which the same is to be
paid, as well as the annual dues to be paid
by the members; to elect and appoint
cash managers, officers, agents and em-
ployees as the needs of the association
may require.

Any four members of the said Board
shall constitute a quorum for the transac-
tion of business, and all questions shall
be decided by a majority vote. Vacan-
cies occurring on the Board by death, re-
signation or inability to act shall be filled
by the Board itself from the membership.

ARTICLE V.
The membership in this club shall be
fixed at one hundred and fifty mem-
bers, and any person may be admitted
to the membership of this Association
upon the purchase, donation or other
reason of any member's interest
entitled such person to the
privilege of voting and entering
the Club, but to entitle any person to
membership by acquisition of stock in
this Club it is required that such person be
ballotted upon by the Board of Directors,
who are given authority to accept or re-
ject the same applying for membership. A
majority of the Board of Directors present
shall accept or reject an applicant for
membership.

ARTICLE VI.
Upon the expiration of this Charter of
Incorporation or upon the vote of three-
fourths of all members then in good
standing, at a meeting to be called by
the Board of Directors after thirty days
notice to be published in one of the
papers in the City of New Iberia, this
corporation shall be dissolved. Upon
the dissolution of said corporation the
mode of liquidation shall be as follows:
Three members to be chosen as liquidat-
ing commissioners to wind up the affairs
of said company, and in the event of any
commissioner being unable to act by
reason of any inability, the other com-
missioners are given the power to fill the
vacancy from among the membership.

ARTICLE VII.
No member or stockholder of the cor-
poration shall ever be held liable for any
debt or default of the Club or corporation,
nor shall any informality of organization
have the effect of rendering this Charter
null or of exposing any member to liabil-
ity beyond the unpaid amount of his
entrance or initiation fee and his month-
ly annual dues.

ARTICLE VIII.
The election of officers to serve until
the second Monday will be held on Mon-
day the 5th day of May 1914 at 6 o'clock
P. M., at the Court House in New Iberia,
La., and shall constitute the first Board
of Directors.
