EDWARD SIMON IS CLAIMED BY DEATH.

St. Martinville, La., Feb. 11.—Judge Edward Simon, 90 years of age, distinguished scholar and jurist, graduate of Harvard, son of the late Edward Simon, justice of the Louisiana Supreme Court, and father of the present district judge, James Simon, died at his home here yesterday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock. The funeral took place at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Judge Simon was born April 22, 1824, and practiced law up to October, 1911, when his health failed. He was elected district judge before the Civil War, and served two terms. The judicial district at that time was composed of several parishes.

Judge Simon received his primary education at Jefferson College, in St. James Parish, and from there went to Georgetown College, near Washington, and later graduated in law from Harvard. Judge Simon, at Harvard, studied under Greenleaf, Story and Longfellow. He was from the pupil Simon that the poet Longfellow obtained the description and topography of the Teche country to write his poem "Evangeline." The Evangeline Oak, made famous in the poem, is still standing on the banks of Bayou Teche, in St. Martinville.

A few years after returning from Harvard this district elected Judge Simon district attorney. He was a member of the Constitutional Convention of 1879 as a delegate from St. Martin Parish, and took a prominent part in the framing of the organic laws of Louisiana.

The mother of Judge Simon was Miss Eugenie Zerbain, related to the Fusilier and Grevenberg families. Judge Simon married Miss Harriet Helen Kitchen, who died twenty years ago. He leaves six children: Eugenie, wife of W. F. Williams of Chicago; Alice, wife of E. W. Bienvenu; Lorenz, wife of Edward Suisson; L. O. Simon, Walter Simon and James Simon, judge of the Nineteenth Judicial District Court. Judge Simon also leaves three sisters: Mrs. George H. Braughn, Mrs. Henry McLean and Mrs. Ernest DeBlanc, all of New Orleans and one brother, Judge Arthur Simon of Opelousas.

LAFAYETTE VOTES FOR COMMISSION.

Lafayette, La., Feb. 11.—The election today for government by commission resulted in victory for the advocates of the measure, the vote standing 324 and 278 against, a majority for of forty-six.

Naturally the proponents of commission government feel much elated and are confident that the new plan will work out for the town a thoroughly businesslike and progressive administration.

The new scheme of government will not go into effect until the end of the present administration reliable, but by reducing acreage on these and devoting attention to intensive farming in trucking, not forgetting to raise a mule or two, a blooded horse, cow, some pigs, chickens, a garden for home living, etc., the farm yield will increase more and more until farming will become not alone most healthful but most lucrative. And as the farm begins to pay better, there will follow not only better roads, but telephones, electric lights and other city advantages, for the dividends of the farm will justify these conveniences and comforts.—Lafayette Advertiser.
