New Iberia, March 5th, 1914.
The Police Jury of Iberia Parish met in regular session this day, Dr. H. A. King presiding and the following members present, viz: Dr. F. A. Boykin, Messrs. L. C. DeBlanc, Fred Decourt, Laodice Delcambre, F. J. Drullhet, E. J. Gary, L. J. Landry and O. D. Romero. Absent, Messrs. H. P. Gates and P. C. Walet.

the present public road right near the church at Rynella, and following this road to proceed direct along the Salt Mine Railroad connecting with the road known as the plank road to Avery Island. By crossing the Salt Mine railroad just South of the junction with the Abbeville road, we lengthen the proposed road about 100 yards, but we have all good high land for the road by making this change; whereas, if we continue along the Salt Mine railroad, we would be obliged to go through two large swampy ponds. The owners of the property along this road are willing to donate a right-of-way to the Parish for the road on the following conditions: That suitable crossings be maintained across the ditches at points where present field roads now cross the proposed road. The donors reserve the right to levy their land against overflow should it be found that the deep ditches, which it is proposed to cut in order to build this road, bring too great a volume of water through which this road will pass. The committee earnestly hopes that you will have a survey of this road made, and commence work on it at the earliest possible moment.

Avery Island, La. Mar. 3d, 1914.
To the Honorable Police Jury, Iberia Parish, New Iberia, La.:

Sirs—At the suggestion of Mr. Marcel Derouen, one of the committee, which you appointed to look into the feasibility of securing a right-of-way for a road paralleling the Salt Mine railroad from New Iberia, La., to Avery Island, La., the following clause is submitted as a substitution for the third from last paragraph in the original resolution adopted by the above committee: "That suitable crossings be maintained across the ditches at points where the present field roads now cross the proposed road in order to facilitate parties working the adjacent lands to carry on their necessary farming operations."

Mr. Numa Drouet protested against the construction of this New Iberia-Avery Island road over the lands of Ellis Segura on which he has a cane switch, claiming that a recently expropriated road and two natural drains already traverse these lands and the proposed road would impose a needless hardship upon the owner. He suggested that the present existing road be utilized to the point where it crosses the Abbeville Railroad and the committee's recommendations be carried out from that point. On motion of Mr. Landry, duly seconded and carried, the Engineer was instructed and directed to survey the routes recommended by the committee and by Mr. Drouet and report to the Jury at its next regular meeting.

President King reported that he had caused a survey to be made of the road leading across Treville's pasture and had been informed that Ellis Segura would donate the twenty foot right-of-way necessary if the Parish would construct a wire fence along the line of his prop-

erty adjacent to the proposed road. On motion of Mr. Romero, seconded by Mr. Delcambre and carried the road as surveyed by the Engineer was adopted as a public highway and the President authorized to pay for the construction of the fence required by Ellis Segura.

A petition of property holders asked for the opening of a road in the Fifth Ward through the lands of the Heirs of Morval Derouen. On motion of Mr. Landry, seconded by Mr. Delcambre and carried, this petition was granted and the President directed to appoint a committee of free holders to secure rights of way and assess damages to those whose lands would be traversed. The President appointed the following committee: Jos. Norris, Chairman; J. A. Segura, Arthur LeBlanc, F. J. Romero, Francois Segura and Harrison Derouen.

Mr. J. J. Olivier, on behalf residents of the section lying in the rear of Lydia and Sterling Plantations, asked that a road be opened to lead to Lydia and connect with the New Iberia-Lydia road. Mr. Decourt moved that the Engineer be instructed to survey such a road and that a committee of free holders be appointed to secure the rights-of-way and assess damages to the property holders whose lands would be utilized for the road; this was seconded by Mr. Romero and carried. The following were appointed to serve on the committee: J. J. Olivier, Chairman; Eugene Broussard, Alfred Sharpentier, Alcibiades Lancon, Clay Lancox, Oscar Broussard and Edward Meyer.

Residents of the Eighth Ward petitioned the Jury to cause repairs to be made to the continuation of Church street from the corporate limits of Jeanerette, through the Bois addition, on motion of Mr. Derouen, seconded the members from the 8th Ward for such action as they deemed proper, provided that the street in question was a public road properly deeded to the Parish.

Mr. Domingue asked for an appropriation for the purpose of cleaning a public drain through his property. This was also referred to the members from the Eighth Ward for such action as they deemed proper.

Mr. Moss reported that the ditch along the Model Road near Jeanerette was caving rapidly and offered to build curbing and haul the material necessary if the Parish would furnish such material. On motion of Mr. Decourt, seconded by Mr. Gary and carried, the Eighth Ward members were directed to furnish Mr. Moss the lumber and nails necessary for this work.

On motion of Mr. Decourt, seconded by Mr. DeBlanc and carried, the District Attorney was directed to prosecute Theodule Oubre for draining his lands on the public roads of the 4th Ward.

Mr. Landry moved that the President be authorized to appoint a committee empowered to construct a canal near the Western Corporate limits of the City of New Iberia, jointly with the City and the Southern Pacific and Frisco Railroads. This was seconded by Mr. Decourt and carried. On motion of Mr. DeBlanc, the District Attorney was instructed to prosecute all violators of the Ball Room and Dog License Ordinances.

Messrs. Dallas and Kramer explained to the Jury that the road leading from the Dallas bridge which has been abandoned was the private property of Mrs. Erath and was of no public service and asked that the Jury withdraw its request to have the road re-opened. On motion of Mr. Decourt, duly seconded and carried, the Jury withdraw its request for the re-opening of this road. The following bills were approved: JUSTICES AND CONSTABLES.
