The fact that thousands of dollars have been spent on the New Iberia Commercial, with but little direct benefit to our community should bestir our citizens in trying have this route adopted. **POTASH PAYS**

**JUNIUS SAMPSON.**  
All that was mortal of Junius Sampson was laid to rest in Rose Hill Cemetery last Monday. A native of Boston, Mass., Mr. Sampson came to Iberia when a young man and in 1874 purchased Marshfield Plantation which he managed for twenty years. Over-taken however by adversity, as many other planters were following the removal of the sugar bounty, he surrendered his place to his creditors and, nothing daunted, began life anew with naught but courage and determination as his assets. Coming to New Iberia he obtained employment in the lumber yard of Gall and Pharr as a day laborer and continued in that capacity for several months and was then promoted to the post of book-keeper. On the retirement of the firm, Mr. Sampson accepted a position with the C. W. George Co. of Beaumont and removed to that city in 1902, and resided there until the day of his death. Although acquitted of his debts by failure, Mr. Sampson was of that type which recognizes no injustice and, by hard labor and self denial, he paid every claim against him, to the last farthing. He was married in 1879 to Miss Ella Rose of Fausse Pointe, who, with three children, survive to mourn him, these are Messrs. T. W. R. Sampson, C. C. Sampson and Miss Margaret Sampson, all of Beaumont. The funeral services from the Episcopal church were conducted by the R. R. Diggs, and were attended by a large number of friends from Loreauville and New Iberia where he was best known, and where his sterling qualities had gained him the respect and esteem of all.
