—A telegram from the State Engineer's office bears the welcome intelligence that the Atchafalaya Levee Board has awarded to C. H. Parker, the contract for the building of the Port Barre-Charonten Levee. The construction of this levee means a great deal to the Parish of Iberia and will reclaim thousands of acres of its most fertile lands which are now subject to annual overflows. For years, this project has been contemplated and a number of leading citizens of Iberia, St. Mary and St. Martin Parishes, have been urging it upon the Levee Board. We congratulate these on the final success which has crowned their efforts.

—Senator Walter J. Burke returned Wednesday from a visit to Lake Charles, where, as chairman of the Employers Liability Commission, he addressed a convention of Amalgamated Labor organizations, last Monday. On Tuesday, the Senator was invited to address the All South Transcontinental Good Roads Convention, also in session at Lake Charles. Thoroughly familiar with every feature of the proposed Employers Liability Act, and alive to the importance of Good Roads, Mr. Burke handled his subjects in his usual fluent and concise manner which favorably impressed both of his audiences.

—The 50-foot cedar poles ordered by the Commissioners, to be used instead of the present electric light poles standing on Main Street, about six feet from the curbing and thus interfering with the movement of teams, arrived this week. Within a few days linemen will be busy placing these tall poles on the curb from the Post Office to Hopkins Street in order to get the unsightly ones off the public thoroughfare. This is an excellent idea as it will give considerable more room for the passage of vehicles, especially now that so much of the Street is utilized for the track of the Trolley line. These poles are of such height that all of the wires will be above the tall second story balconies where they will not interfere with any of the buildings. It is the intention to erect new wires, a great portion of the insulation of the wires now in use having been worn off, making it not only dangerous to the wiremen, but hazardous in many instances.

—We had occasion this week to visit the Candy Manufactory and Ice Cream parlor which will be open for public patronage in a few days by Mr. D. L. Ivy, one of our new comers to New Iberia. Mr. Ivy has secured the services of an expert candy maker from California who has already turned out several grades of candy that is the equal of any we have ever sampled. It is the gentleman's intention to turn out an article of candy that will not only meet the demands of the local trade, but he hopes to build up a large outside business that will require him to have several men busy at all times in his establishment. It behooves the people of New Iberia and vicinity to give him all encouragement necessary to make his establishment a success. We feel confident the people of this City will lend him every encouragement possible to develop his factory which will not only give employment to a number of our people, but be the means of bringing in money from the outside. We can never hope to get large factories here unless we first encourage the smaller ones.

—It is with a feeling of deep regret that we mention the intention of our fellow-citizen, Mr. J. W. Eckart who will soon close out his jewelry business and leave the State after a residence in New Iberia of upwards of twenty-seven years. After mature deliberation the gentleman has come to the conclusion that there is more opportunity for his young sons in a larger city, particularly in his line of business and for that reason he will hold a series of auction sales until his large stock of beautiful goods is completely disposed of and his real estate holdings sold out at private sale, after which he will depart with his children to a larger center. The departure from this City of Mr. Eckart and his esteemed family is sorely regretted by all who know them, most if his children being born in our midst, some having reached their majority. Mr. Eckart had always been identified with every movement for New Iberia's advancement and contributed both

his money and time to push every movement that was calculated to advance the City's interest, never losing faith in the possibilities and future of this section of Louisiana. The Enterprise wishes for him and his family God-speed wherever they see fit to cast their lot.

—President H. A. King of the Police Jury attended the Southern Highway Good Roads Convention which was held at Lake Charles the early part of the week. From what we are informed Dr. King interviewed several members of the Intercoastal Committee whom he met at the Convention, with reference to the feasibility of inducing the Government to use the New Iberia Canal as a connecting link with the Teche and met with a great deal of encouragement. If the proper steps were taken by some one in authority there is a great possibility of our people succeeding in perfecting an arrangement by which our big Canal would be used instead of the Hanson Canal as was first intended. If only our people would come together and organize a live Chamber of Commerce there are numerous things that could be accomplished for the good of New Iberia. Have not our people the energy to form such an organization or do they wish to remain dormant and permit other communities to leave us in the lurch. Something should be done at once to perfect this organization. Who will take the lead? Dr. King reported a great deal of enthusiasm amongst the Good Roads delegates and obtained much valuable data pertaining to road building and the determination of the Highway Association to use this route as the main road for the Highway to California.



LECTURE BY DR. E. L. STEPHENS, PRESIDENT OF INDUSTRIAL INSTITUTE.

Again, New Iberia is indebted to Miss Louise Taylor for a delightful literary treat. The auditorium of the High School was well filled by an audience so absorbingly interested in the subject so admirably handled, that Dr. Stephens to test the why and the wherefore of such profound silence, told quickly a funny story and a laughing response at once told how keenly every one was alive to the various changes in the speakers beautiful address.

Robert Browning is generally acknowledged to be one of the worlds most profound poets. Some one spoke of his works as a very sweet orange with an exceedingly tough skin. Another, as rich gems deeply buried in the earth. In these busy times in lazy times, many folks have neither the time or the energy to work for, and realize the covered beauties from a poets pen.

But, Dr. Stephens culled from the finest of Browning's poems and illuminated them with his own appreciation, letting the noble sentiments speak for themselves. Even the brightest of us must have wondered why we had not enjoyed this rare insight into



the real meaning of these poems before. We did not stop to ponder, upon simply a poem, or perhaps our thinking machine was not in such excellent working order. Dr. Stephens has none of the monotony of the ordinary lecture. His voice is conversational, clear and distinct, with variety of tone, as the subject demands, graceful in manner, a very pleasing personality; all of which counts for considerable in interesting an audience. While most poets write volumes about youth and its merriment and attractiveness. Dr. Stephens recited a gem, in which old age is commended as the furnished result of life's experiments. Youth tries one way then another, but age has decided what is best, an exquisite poem which some of us are going to study to our supreme satisfaction. The Southwestern Industrial School is to be congratulated on its president. It is a very fine institution, and New Iberians have still a little tug at their hearts whenever it is mentioned, but we had to let them have it just around the corner at Lafayette, and that little town is chock full of corners you know.
