—The New Iberia Creamery  
has had installed this week a  
large dynamo with which to op-  
erate the different pieces of ma-  
chinery necessary for the opera-  
tion of the Creamery. From  
what we are informed by Mr. J.  
C. Kendrick, Jr., the manager of  
the concern, everything will in  
shape by the latter part of next  
week for the trial run. Mr.  
Kendrick stated to us that this  
Creamery will be the equal of  
any in the South and it only re-  
mains now for the management  
to get sufficient butter fat to make  
it the success which it should be.  
It is hoped that all of our farm-  
ers will prepare themselves with  
sufficient milk cows to not only  
make the Creamery a success, but  
to enable themselves to make a  
good profit from their surplus  
milk.

—Since the City Commissioners  
adopted the ordinance calling for  
the special election for the cutting  
of Bayou Boutte canal, as endor-  
sed by the Committee of business  
men some months since, some lit-  
tle opposition to the route has  
sprung up among our citizens.  
The bone of contention is the fact  
that the cheaper route was adopt-  
ed which will put the canal within  
four miles from Loreauville, while  
had the route been selected bring-  
ing the canal through Little Ba-  
you it would reclaim thousands  
of acres of land and come out  
within a radius of two miles from  
New Iberia. According to a  
statement made by Mr. A. A.  
Theriot there is a strong senti-  
ment in the Third Ward to create  
a drainage tax to make up the dif-  
ference in the cost between the  
two route, if that be acceptable  
to the taxpayers of New Iberia.  
The most regrettable feature of  
making the change would be the  
delay incurred as it would be  
necessary to submit the matter to  
the Bond purchasers once more,  
to see if it is feasible to adopt  
the route nearer New Iberia. It  
is probable a committee will  
again appear before the Commis-  
sioners at its meeting next Mon-  
day evening with something  
tangible to offer the citizens as  
an inducement for making the  
change.

## REV. C. C. KRAMER.

A well spent life, replete with  
love of fellow-man and filled with  
acts of kindness, was terminated  
by the death of the Rev. C. C.  
Kramer, which occurred in  
Franklin at the home of his son,  
Wilbur H. Kramer, last Sunday  
evening at 9 o'clock. Coming to  
Louisiana from his native city  
of Baltimore shortly after his  
ordination to the Episcopal min-  
istry, Mr. Kramer spent a few  
years in New Orleans and later  
accepted a call from New Iberia  
and for twenty-two years min-  
istered to the congregation of the  
Epiphany church, as a profound  
scholar, a gifted speaker and  
theologian, Mr. Kramer ranked  
with the leading clergymen of  
Louisiana and was frequently  
called to fill the pulpits of the  
most prominent churches of the  
State, on one occasion serving  
the wealthy Christ church in  
New Orleans for several months  
during the absence of its rector.  
His qualities as man and priest  
were so highly appreciated as to  
cause his Bishop, the Most Re-  
verent David Sessums, to depart  
from the established rules of the  
church and preach an eloquent  
eulogy over his remains. The  
funeral which took place from  
the church of the Epiphany,  
which he had so long and faith-  
fully served, was conducted by  
Bishop Sessums, assisted by Rev.  
Messrs. Hale of Franklin; Tupper  
of Houma; Duncan of Alex-  
andria and Diggs of New Iberia  
and was the most impressive ever  
held in this City. The Masons  
of New Iberia and Franklin add-  
ing to its solemnity by accom-  
panying the remains to the Ceme-  
tery and with beautiful cere-  
monials, consigning them to the  
grave. Mr. Kramer is survived  
by his widow and four sons, these  
are Messrs. Wilbur H. Kramer  
and Paul Kramer of Franklin,  
Edwin W. Kramer of Missoula,  
Montana and Louis C. Kramer of  
San Francisco, Cal. The pall  
bearers selected from the mem-  
bership of Aurora Lodge F. & A.  
M. were: Messrs. A. B. Murray,  
C. E. Smedes, P. R. Burke, Robt.  
S. Bell, Jules Dreyfus, E. T.  
Weeks and Chas. Gougenheim.

## DEATH OF ALEXANDER DE- VALCOURT.

New Iberia lost another of its  
natives last Tuesday, April 21st,  
at Birmingham, Ala. in the per-  
son of Mr. Alexander DeValcourt,  
born March 28th, 1842, the re-  
mains arriving here on Thursday  
afternoon at four o'clock via the  
Southern Pacific, accompanied by  
Mr. Bruns DeValcourt, the es-  
teemed son of the deceased and  
Mrs. Sarah Barnard who had been  
called to his bedside during his  
illness. Mr. DeValcourt's death  
was a distinct shock to a large  
number of our old residents here  
who knew him from childhood,  
being a son of one of the first  
settlers of this country with a  
large number of descendants,  
many of them being prominently  
identified in business circles.  
Some fifteen or sixteen years ago  
Mr. DeValcourt removed to Bir-  
mingham, Ala., where he accepted  
a position as auditor of the Crane  
Iron Manufacturing Company  
and held this position contin-  
uously until he was overcome with  
an attack of Bright's disease from  
which he succumbed. Mr. DeVal-  
court leaves to mourn his demise  
two sons, Messrs. Bruns and  
Alexson and two sisters and one  
brother, Mrs. Sarah Barnard,  
Miss Lizzie and Mr. John T. De-  
Valcourt. The funeral services  
were held at the Epiphany church,  
Rev. Diggs officiating after which  
they were escorted to the Rose  
Hill Cemetery by a large number  
of the members of Aurora Lodge  
No. 139, F. & A. M. of which Or-  
der he was one of the charter  
members. The pall bearers were  
Messrs. John R. Taylor, C. E.  
Smedes, J. J. Forgey, P. R. Burke,  
W. G. Weeks and Chas. Gougenheim.  
The family have the sym-  
pathy of the community in the  
hour of their grief.
