

Official Minutes Board of Trustees.

New Iberia, La., May 4th, 1914.
The Board of Trustees of the City of New Iberia convened this day in regular session with Mayor Alpha Fontelieu presiding and Messrs. Suberbielle and Villerman in attendance.
The minutes of the previous meeting were read and on motion of Mr. Suberbielle, seconded by Mr. Fontelieu were approved.
On motion of Mr. Fontelieu, seconded by Mr. Suberbielle it was ordered that the cinders at the electric light plant be placed at the disposal of the Mayor for the use on streets.
On motion of Mr. Fontelieu, seconded by Mr. Villerman a communication was addressed to the Cartinas Manufacturing Co. inviting them to locate their plant at New Iberia.

SOUTHWESTERN REFLECTIONS.

Has defective drainage interfered with the planting and working of your crop this Spring? Any farmer will tell you that his crops are from two weeks to one month late "because the Spring is backward."
In this case the "backward Spring" is simply another way of saying that the lands are so poorly drained that the water soaks into the ground instead of being carried off as fast as it falls.
A "backward Spring" sometimes costs the farmer lots of money. To illustrate: Two weeks ago potatoes were quoted on the Chicago market at \$7.00 per barrel. This week they are quoted from \$5.00 down. Thus, the two weeks you have lost because of bad drainage has cost you if you have potatoes ready for shipment now, just \$2.00 per barrel.
Let's do some figuring on this: One acre of land, cultivated under favorable conditions, ought to produce a minimum of fifty barrels. This means that the "backward Spring" or bad drainage, cost the farmer \$100 per acre.
Of course, to those farmers who haven't had the enterprise to join the Southwest Louisiana Development Bureau and plant early potatoes for the market, this is "all Dutch." But to the farmer whose potatoes have been set back two weeks because of the rains it means a loss of \$100 of good American money on every acre he planted—not to mention the reduced production.
Now, is the man who is paying \$100 per acre for the privilege of "enjoying" bad drainage, going to kick when he is asked to pay a drainage tax of 5 mills on forty dollar land—or twenty cents per acre? and yet the country is full of men kicking just that way. What do you think of such men?
The Southwest Louisiana Development Bureau is at work on a big drainage plan and we are going to "Shell the Woods" with logic along this line.

THE COMMON DRINKING CUP.

That you may not grow careless about the danger of the common drinking cup, we copy the following article from the Greensboro, N. C., Record:
We all make fun of germs, the danger of drinking from the same cup or glass, and all that, but there is something in it. Here is an authenticated instance rather close to home. A woman and her little girl were coming from Tennessee to Jamestown on a visit. On the train was another woman with a small child. One of the women had a drinking cup, the other did not. Occupying seats not far apart the two women were on more or less familiar terms. Both children drank from the same cup. One was not well by any means, but it was not known from what she was suffering. Arriving at Jamestown one of the women alighted and went to the home of a friend. Inside of a day her little child was taken violently ill with diphtheria and died in three days. County physician Jones was notified and has since discovered that the little girl on the train had diphtheria, thus showing conclusively that the disease was communicated from the drinking cup. The child that died was perfectly well when it left ennessee and was well when it arrived at Jamestown, but diphtheria showed itself the next day and was swift in its work.—Ex.

TAKES BULLET FROM HEART.

New York, April 28.—The living, throbbing heart of a human being had been taken out of the body itself, a bullet imbedded in it cut out, the violently beating heart sewn up and replaced!
That is modern surgery's triumph.
And the boy whose heart was so mended is alive today and is working again—as if nothing had ever happened to him!
Modern surgery announced its greatest triumph of the twentieth century the accomplishment of two celebrated surgeons, before the American Surgical Association in New York City.
Dr. Alexis Carrel, of the Rockefeller Institute, winner of the Nobel prize in 1912, told the assembled surgeons of his success in interrupting the circulation of blood in a dog for two and a half minutes, in which time he performed delicate operations which, if duplicated in the human heart, will enable surgical science to repair many injuries to that delicate organ, which are now invariably fatal.
Heart operations have been impracticable, because of the impossibility of arresting circulation without stopping life itself. But Dr. Carrel has proven that life may go on while the heart itself stopped.
Dr. Carrel stopped the heart of the dog by clamping rubber tipped clamps to the arteries, restoring the circulation nearly three minutes later by removing the clamps.
Dr. Robert Proust, the distinguished French surgeon, interested the assemblage by the statement that he had extracted a bullet from the heart of a boy four years ago. The boy is now earning his own living.

STATE AGRICULTURAL BUILDING.

Realizing that the progress and prosperity of Louisiana depends upon the development of her agricultural resources, the farming interest of the State, and other branches of industry depending upon the products of the plantation and farm, are now almost a unit concerning the necessity of greater facilities being provided the youth of the State or their more thorough education along all lines of agricultural practice, including field crops and live stock. It is also realized that it will devolve upon our State Agricultural College to provide this necessary education; but in order to do so, greater equipment will be absolutely essential, and what this institution stands most in need of at the present time, and for the future, is a building at the University with adequate equipment to take care of this most important branch of work.
In showing the general sentiment throughout the State regarding this matter, it is only necessary to mention that the most prominent agricultural and allied organizations have expressed themselves either through resolution or endorsement, of the project of having the coming Legislature appropriate an adequate amount of money for the purpose of erecting, on the State University campus, an agricultural building in keeping with the present and prospective needs of the State's agricultural development, and representative of the planters and armers of the State.

Among the organizations which have so expressed themselves may be mentioned the Louisiana Swine Breeders' Association; the Louisiana Corn Growers' Association; the Louisiana Jersey Breeders' Association; the Dixie Dairy-men's Association; the New Orleans Board of Trade; an association of some 275 farmers of the State in attendance at the Farmers' Short Course last January, etc.
This unity of expression on the subject covers, practically, the whole State of Louisiana, and is illustrative of the general sentiment which prevails with reference to the subject of providing an agricultural building on the University grounds which will represent the farming classes of the State and better enable our young men to prepare themselves for the greater development of the States agriculture resources.
Up to the present time the State has never made an appropriation specifically for the construction of agricultural buildings in connection with the College of Agriculture; those at present occupied are merely makeshifts of buildings scattered over different parts of the campus, and totally inadequate for the purpose.
It is hoped that all progressive citizens in our parish interested in agriculture will lend their aid in the accomplishment of this project, which is one of our greatest needs at the present time.
