Burguières et al vs. The Iberia, St. Mary and Eastern Railroad Company. A restraining order granted the plaintiffs was modified so as to allow the meeting of the board of directors this week. Immediately following the court's decision attorneys for the plaintiffs made application for an appeal from the modification of the restraining order. This being refused Attorney Milling then gave notice that plaintiffs would make application to the Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari, mandamus and prohibition. Attorneys for the plaintiffs will appeal from the decision of the court of no right and cause of action.

Children Cry FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA

—Mr. Edmond Boutte of this City who met with a severe accident last Monday at Anse la Butte is doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances. It seems Mr. Boutte who was engaged as driller in one of the wells of the Ehrick Oil Company and the engineer, Mr. Ellie Hulot, who was assisting him were standing on a frail board across a hot pool of oil at the Company's well when the board broke, precipitating them into the pool. Mr. Boutte was scalded on both legs up to the knees while his partner had one leg badly burned with the hot fluid. Mr. Boutte was at once brought to New Iberia where he is receiving medical attention.

—Among the refugees reaching this section of the State last week from Tampico, Mexico, was Mr. and Mrs. Leopold Beslin of St. Martinville. While en route to their home they visited New Iberia and stopped with their friends in this City. Mr. and Mrs. Alphonse Hitter of upper Main Street. Mr. Beslin was engaged in the hotel business at Tampico, but states that his notice to board the ship came so suddenly that he was unable to gather any of his personal property, making his flight with but little more than the clothes on his back. After spending a few hours here he and his wife departed for St. Martinville.

—Mr. Leopold Levy, owner of the handsome brick building at the corner of Main and Bridge Streets which came near being destroyed by fire last Friday, arrived here on Thursday evening to look after his interest in this City. In conversation with Mr. Levy he stated to us that he desired a rigid and careful investigation on the part of the State Fire Marshal and was willing to pay a reward for the conviction of the person who attempted to destroy his property. In all probability had the property been destroyed, Mr. Levy would have sold the lot in preference to improving his holdings. His losses on the last fire at the same spot ran into the thousands of dollars only a few years ago which is but little encouragement for him to make such investments here.

—The New Iberia Creamery, under the management of Mr. J. C. Kendrick made its trial run this week and turned out some beautiful samples of butter the equal of any ever brought to New Iberia. The goods are neatly wrapped in parchment paper and then encased in special boxes which makes it attractive to the purchaser and consumer. The Creamery starts out very auspiciously and it now behooves our farmers to supply the cream to this industry, which is destined to become one of the most beneficial to our section of the State. —Last Thursday morning a little child of Mr. Rodney French, about nine years of age came very near losing her life by drowning in Bayou Teche. It seems the child was on the Bridge when it was being turned by the Bridge Keeper to let a boat go through and fell off between the two sections of the Bridge, which is very deep at that point and had it not been for an old negro man who witnessed the accident would have lost her life. It would be well in the future for the Bridge Keeper not to permit any more children to remain on the Bridge when it is being opened for boats to pass through, otherwise some child may yet lose its life. For many years the practice of children remaining on the Bridge while it is being opened has been permitted which should be stopped by those in charge. It would also be advisable to fasten the chains on each approach to the turning table when the Bridge is in use. From what we understand the chains have been discarded in recent years. This makes it very dangerous for the children who usually stand at the extreme end of the approaches when the Bridge is being opened. The negro who saved the child's life should be given a medal or some other reward for his bravery.
