LOCALS.

The regular services of the Presbyterian church will be held to-morrow night at eight o'clock. The public is cordially invited to be present.

The regular meeting of the Protestant Cemetery Association will be held next Monday afternoon at five o'clock at Hotel Frederic. As business of importance will come before the Association all the members are urged to attend.

According to reports we have been able to obtain this section from the mouth of Bayou Teche to Breaux Bridge this season will produce not less than 150,000 sacks of the best Honduras rice ever raised in South-west Louisiana. The season will begin about July 21st and with prices ranging from \$4.50 and up per sack there will be thousands of dollars put into circulation within the next sixty days.

It is with regret that we announce Mr. L. Cyrus DeBlanc's resignation as a member of the Police Jury of this Ward which occurred at the last session of that body as Mr. DeBlanc, beyond any doubt made an excellent officer since he was honored with that position. His retirement from that office is due to his having taken up his residence in the 5th Ward of the Parish which made it obligatory upon him to relinquish his seat after having served but two years. It being necessary that some other member must be elected by the people to serve the unexpired term, it is hoped that some good man will offer his services at once so that the election will be held the same day that the City Judge is selected.

Commissioner L. F. Villermin started the work of laying the water mains on Julia Street this week and from now on the work will be continued until all of the streets in this City receive the same water and fire protection. The Commissioners deserve the praise of the community for their efforts in giving all of the property holders of New Iberia the advantages of having water on their premises. Once this City is supplied with pure drinking water which will not be long unless obstacles are placed in the way of the Commissioners, the property holders of New Iberia will have reason to rejoice. As the conditions are at present in times of drought many of the residents in the outlying districts are compelled to use the Bayou water for cooking and even drinking purposes to the detriment of themselves and the community as a whole.

On June 20th next Saturday there will be a meeting of the Atchafalaya Basin Levee Protection Organization held at Melville, La., to further the objects of the Association. This project being for the welfare of this section here should be a large number from this City and Parish in attendance. We understand that Mr. R. J. Lockwood, the general manager of the New Iberia and Northern Railroad is arranging to run a special train from Franklin so as to enable our people to attend the meeting. Doubtless a very low rate will be given over that Railroad if they can make the arrangements. This being a public meeting hundreds from New Iberia should take advantage of the opportunity to be present.

Quite an interesting ceremony will take place on Thursday afternoon at 3:30 on the lawn in front of the Alma House. There will be a presentation of a Confederate flag to Camp No. 1788, U. C. V. of New Iberia. Besides the presentation address there will be a chorus of the young daughters and grand-daughters of the men who wore the grey, when the old war tunes will be sung to revive the memories of the past. This movement which was inaugurated by the ladies of the Civic League and perfected by the work of the ladies of New Iberia, has met with general encouragement. Assistance has been readily given by all citizens applied to, by the press, by the Police Jury, by the Mayor and others. Three of our caterers offered bids very reasonable for the banquet; the Alma House being the lowest was selected by the Committee. The ladies are very appreciative of all help extended in "giving honor where honor is due" to our New Iberia veterans.
