A GREAT CANNING FACTORY.

The L. Godechaux Company's Elm Hall Factory has been the most active factor in crop diversification of any in the State. Walter Godechaux the manager, has been making preparations to go into some other paying crops since the passage of the tariff bill. The Elm Hall Factory has shipped green and pink tomatoes throughout the country, and the canning factory under the management of W. H. Webb, an expert canning man, has been preparing up choice beets, beans, kraut, blackberries, okra, tomatoes and figs. The shipping of a solid car of canned blackberries, is a feat that Louisiana has never done before, and this was done at the Elm Hall Factory this season.

That the crop diversification and canning business is a paying

think is shown in the following statement made last Sunday to the Farm Editors while here:

"We are buying everything right here," said Superintendent W. H. Webb, formerly with the Van Camps. "The people are getting much interested and 90 per cent of the farmers are putting in our crops without being asked. Some of our tenants have made \$40 an acre on tomatoes, without interfering with their crops. The quality of our products has proven good, and the market is open and ready. Our plant is only a drop in the bucket, so there is lots of room. This country is ready for canneries, and only benefit will follow. We can produce more canned goods to the acre than any other State, and there is room and power in our sugar house to run the plants successfully."

When means that our sugar factory owners can continue in the sugar cane industry while during the summer months the factory can be turned into a canning plant. With crop diversification, live stock on all plantations and sugar cane raised more economically than formerly, this section of Louisiana should blossom like a Spring rose.—Assumption Pioneer.

EUROPEAN WAR.

St. Petersburg, July 29.—In Russian eyes the die is cast. Only a political miracle can avert war. Russia does not swerve from her determination to support Serbia and partial mobilization already has been ordered. There is every indication that the whole vast military machinery of Russia soon will be set in motion.

An imperial manifesto is awaited tonight.

Should Emperor Nicholas become generalissimo of the forces, as it is understood he will, an immense wave of enthusiasm will sweep over Russia.

The political parties have sunk their differences. The general attitude is not "jingoistic" but one of resolute confidence in the justice of the country's cause and readiness to make all sacrifices.

The proposal attributed to Austria to discuss terms when Belgrade has been occupied has been regarded as impossible. It is pointed out that before opening of hostilities Russia proposed to Austria a direct exchange of views which Austria rejected.

The foregoing St. Petersburg dispatch was passed by the censor without revision, a fact which is considered highly significant.

The bi-powers of Europe are, by necessity, gathered in two groups. In the Triple Alliance Germany, Austria and Italy, forming a barrier across Europe from the Baltic to the Mediterranean.

In the Triple Entente are France, Russia and England, drawn together in common distrust of Germany.

The purpose of the two groups is ostensibly the protection of any one power in a dispute with a second against hostile action on the part of a third. In fact, however, war between any two powers would almost certainly involve all of the powers, and that fact has served, up to this

time, to preserve the peace of Europe.

In the present case, a general war in Europe likely would involve Sweden and Denmark, Sweden fears Russia has designs on its territory and Denmark hates Germany for robbing it of nearly half of its territory.

Spain and Portugal, tied up with troubles at home and allied with both England and Austria, probably would remain neutral.

Greece probably would like to aid its ally, Serbia, but Greece now is on the verge of war with Turkey. Bulgaria, too, probably would like to join Austria against Serbia in revenge for its humiliation in the last war, but Rumania on the one side and Turkey on the other, to say nothing of Russia, probably will hold it in check.

Minutes and Promulgation of Results of Special Election.

New Iberia, La., July 24th, 1914.

The Board of Commissioners of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District met this day in open session as a board of commissioners of a sub-drainage district number one (1) of the said Bayou Carlin Drainage District, pursuant to call with President John C. Curtis presiding and the following members present: Messrs. Honora Romero, Jules Olivier, Hardy Boutte and Alfred C. Duboin for the purpose of examining and canvassing the ballots cast at the special election held on the 22nd day of July, 1914, of the voters of sub-drainage district number one (1) of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District; which election was held under call of the said Sub-District of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District, of date May 5th, 1914, for the purpose of submitting to the voters of said sub-drainage district the proposition of levying a special average tax on the lands in said sub-district to provide better drainage therefor, and also to submit the proposition to incur debt and to issue bonds, and to examine and canvass the returns and to promulgate the results thereof.

The President having thus declared the purpose of the meeting the Board then proceeded to open the ballot box of said election, examine and canvass the returns of said election and declare the results which it did as follows:

Numbers of votes cast for the proposition to levy a tax not exceeding thirty cents per acre on every acre of land in sub-drainage district number one (1) of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District for a period of thirty-seven years for the purpose of providing, undertaking, making and completing a better system of drainage for the lands within said sub-drainage district.

Five (5) votes.

Votes for, in valuation of property, Six thousand three hundred and thirty (\$6330) Dollars.

Number of votes against the proposition to levy a tax not exceeding thirty cents per acre on every acre of land in sub-drainage district number one (1) of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District for a period of thirty-seven years for the purpose of providing, undertaking, making and completing a better system of drainage for the lands within said sub-drainage district.

Number of votes against the proposition to incur debt and issue bonds for sub-drainage district number one (1) of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District, to the amount of Twelve thousand (\$12,000.00) Dollars, to run until April 1, 1951, bearing interest at the rate of Five per cent per annum, payable annually, for the purpose of providing, undertaking, making and completing a better system of drainage for the lands within said sub-drainage district.

Whereupon motion duly carried the said board of said sub-drainage district number one (1) of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District declared both of said propositions as submitted at said special election have been carried at said election.

THE WAR IN EUROPE.

Prospect of a war between Austria-Hungary and Serbia upsets the bourses of Europe and the stock exchanges and wheat pits of the United States, not because a war confined to the two countries would be of great importance, but because the warning of Russia that it would not permit an invasion of Serbia points to tremendous possibilities of entanglements involving all the great powers of Europe.

The dual monarchy will be able to depend on the support of the German empire, and if Germany becomes involved, the third member of the triple alliance, Italy, would doubtless cast her fortunes with the other two. The triple alliance would make a formidable foe for any combination of powers, but if Russia takes the part of Serbia there are two possibilities, either of which would give the triple alliance a worthy contestant. The first possibility is a pan-Slavic confederacy, consisting of Russia and the Balkan states. The second possibility is the triple entente pitted against the triple alliance. The triple entente consists of Russia, France and England.

Every resource of diplomacy will be exhausted before war is permitted to involve the triple entente against the triple alliance, but such a contingency is possible. It is altogether likely that diplomacy will effect a peaceful settlement before the entanglement gets beyond Serbia and Austria-Hungary. If the trouble gets beyond these two countries, the much likelier outcome will be a pan-Slavic alliance between Russia and the Balkan states, which might be opposed by the Germanic countries, with Italy, France and Great Britain holding aloof and maintaining the balance of power.

Whatever the outcome is, if there is war the American wheat pits seem to believe that the price of American wheat will rise; and this will indirectly benefit all cereals, beginning with corn and probably involving rice.—Beaumont Enterprise.
