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**WORLD WAR BULLETINS.**

London, Aug. 5.—Germany has issued an ultimatum to Italy.

Copenhagen, Aug. 5.—Heavy fighting was heard at various points along the North sea today. Denmark is isolated. All steamship railway communication have ceased.

New Orleans, Aug. 5.—That the president will rescind her proclamation of neutrality and join the nations, is believed to be indicated by a cablegram received in New Orleans today by the master of the Italian steamer Sicilia, ordering her to take and no cargo and to anchor immediately in neutral waters. A cablegram stated that the instructions were sent by direction of the Italian government. The Sicilia was loading a general cargo when the order was received. The loading operations were suspended and the vessel moved to the river.

Warsaw, Aug. 5.—Russian frontier patrols, driving the enemy's cavalry before them, have crossed the east Prussian frontier at Lyk and Biala and penetrated miles into German territory. The Russians captured and destroyed the German railway stations at Borjomin and Biala and communication from Lyk to Annegurg, the enemy falling back all along the front, burning villages.

Berlin, Aug. 5.—Via London—German warships have destroyed the fortified towns and places on the coast of Algeria.

The Hague, Aug. 5.—Martial law has been declared in all parts of Holland. It is officially announced that up to the present the Germans have not violated the Dutch frontier.

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 5.—A big black-headed eagle above the door of the German consulate was torn from its supports today by a crowd which threatened the consulate with destruction.

Having thrown down the insignia of Germany and trampled in the crowd broke a little glass defaced signs on the consulate doors and then left. Immigration and military officers are preparing to stop all German and American subjects to may endeavor to flee to the United States.

Algiers, via London, Aug. 5.—Authentic confirmation of the report of the destruction of the German cruiser Panther and of the capture of the German cruisers Goeben and Breslau reached here today.

Hull, Eng., Aug. 5.—A number of German steamers anchored at this port were taken over by the British authorities today as prizes. The crews, made up mostly of native reservists, were made prisoners of war.

Dover, Eng., Aug. 5.—A British warship seized the German bark Perkeo, which left New York July 18 for Hamburg.

Washington, Aug. 5.—Diplomatic dispatches indicate Sweden will join Great Britain, France and Russia if she finds herself unable to remain neutral.

Paris, Aug. 5.—Two regiments of German Uhlans have been destroyed by the Belgian army, according to an official announcement given out tonight by the French war office.

London, Aug. 5.—Confirmation has been received of the report that a French warship has captured the German steamer Porto of Guernsey channel islands. The Porto, which belongs to the Aldenburg-Portuguese Steamship company, is a vessel of 1800 tons and plies between Hamburg and Portuguese ports.

London, Aug. 5.—A naval action was in progress in the North sea this afternoon, according to the Evening Standard, which adds that this news was confirmed by a high authority who, however, said the action was not of decisive importance.

**LESSON FROM A DOG FIGHT.**

There is always a good sermon in a dog fight. The other day on one of the principal residence streets a young woman came along with a fox terrier strap. The dog, bristling with energy, seemed to be leading the young woman rather than the young woman leading the dog. The terrier broke away and tackled a bull pup living in one of the yards. After some barking and gnashing of teeth, the two entered into conflict with vengeance and in the struggle dislodged quite a little sod from the lawn which served as a battlefield. With the superior endurance of his breed the bulldog finally got the terrier by the nape of the neck, held him motionless and was gradually working his hold around the terrier's throat.

The young woman began to scream as soon as she saw her pet getting the worst of it, and made an effort to pull him loose, but the bulldog's jaw was locked. Then she begged for someone to shoot the bull pup. A crowd had gathered, but no one had a gun. In the midst of the excitement a cool-headed man came along, turned the water into alawn hose lying near and stuck the nozzle into the bulldog's mouth. The bulldog loosened his hold, coughed the water out of his lungs and went squittering and sneezing down the street, while the young woman recovered her badly lacerated terrier.

The first instinct of everybody is to shoot at the climax of a conflict. Many a life has paid the penalty of the habit of carrying concealed weapons. Many families have been bowed down with inexpressible grief simply because one contestant to a controversy had a weapon in his pocket.

The safest and surest way to prevent crime is to begin at the very beginning and make it practically impossible for people to go about the streets armed. Disarm every individual, and make the penalty for carrying weapons so severe that people will be afraid to take the risk and we shall have done much to lessen crime in the United States.

If we had the same facilities for throwing water as we do for throwing lead, steel and other missiles, our civilization would soon be on a good deal higher plane.—News-Star.

**THE EUROPEAN WAR.**

Practically all of the great powers of Europe are now at war. Where there was peace and interchange of commerce, international trains and communications, now there is disturbance, separation, isolation, and great armies moving soon to be engaged in bloodshed and destruction. Conditions have changed in a moment, as it were from national consideration to national ferocity with passions inflamed to wreak the last vengeance possible from one another and why?

The Austria attack on Serbia was the beginning and Austria's alleged reason does not seem adequate in the face of the fact that Serbia offered to give all satisfaction she could in justice and honor to herself. Austria acted as if blinded by hate she made a pretext to assault her little neighbor.

Russia both because of race kindred and alliance protested and began mobilizing her army. There were no open threats, the mobilization was all, but Austria was given to understand she would not be allowed to execute Serbia, whereupon she promptly disavowed any intention of acquiring more territory, she was just going to punish Serbia and teach her to quit plotting against Austria's integrity. Russia wasn't satisfied and so continued to mobilize.

Here Germany became excited and sent an ultimatum with a twenty-four hour limit to know what Russia meant, Germany is Austria's ally and holding that position felt herself entitled to ask questions, but Russia evidently either did not recognize Germany's right in the matter or else considered her manner insolvent, for she did not answer. The Kaiser's whiskers bristled and without more ado Germany declared war against Russia. Why. Certainly Germany could have waited to see what Russia purposed.

Next there is great excitement in England and France, mobilizing is ordered and yesterday Germany invaded French territory and a declaration of war by England was expected hourly.

England as an ally of France was under obligation to come to her aid when she was attacked, but Germany's attack on France was a voluntary initiation apparently on the assumption that France would join her ally Russia and Germany wanted to hit the first blow.

And so the great European war is on.

But the apparent differences are not sufficient reason for such a world war or any war. The reason lies deeper. Racial antagonism and jealousies are largely responsible. Also France has never forgiven Germany for Sedan and the loss of Alsace-Lorraine. However the chief cause, no doubt, lies in the enormous military establishments of the European countries. Militarism had reached such proportions as to have become a burden to every nation. Indeed the cost of the armies and navies had about reached the limit and yet each promised only further additions. The military burden could not continue to increase indefinitely, there was bound to come a time when it had to stop and a readjustment take place. Several years ago the Czar of Russia proposed disarmament, but the jealousy and suspicion of the other nations prevented. So there was nothing to do but let events take their course.

The military burden had evidently now reached the limit, and as a result the European nations have started in to solve the problem apparently the only way it can be done and that is by the arbitrament of arms. Such a solution will be at a stupendous cost, but it had to be. Kismet.—Advertiser.
