

THE ELECTION

The election Thursday to select a Railroad Commissioner for the Second District of the State when our own Mr. J. S. Power ran a close second was very gratifying, not only to himself, but to his friends throughout Iberia Parish. Those in the race besides himself is the present incumbent Shelby H. Taylor and Messrs. Jemel and Kelly, both of whom having now dropped out will leave the second fight solely between Taylor and Power. In this section the light vote due to the rain resulted in fully fifty per cent of his vote falling off and also the fact that many did not take enough interest to go to the polls. The vote right here in our City being only 454 when there should have been not less than 500. Mr. Power receiving 428, Kelly 18 and Taylor 8, a positive indication that Iberia would have given him 95 per cent. The showing all over the District was an excellent one and we feel certain in the second race with Kelly and Jemel out of the running, Mr. Power will come out victorious. It behooves all of those in the District to get together and give him every vote that he is entitled to. It was impossible when we closed our forms to get the entire result of the Parish, consequently we will defer its publication until our next issue. We feel assured the gentleman will make the District a good live officer and for that reason recommend him to the people of the District as the logical man for the place.

HARMON H. SHADEL.

The sudden death at his home on Washington Avenue of Mr. Harmon H. Shadel last Sunday morning at four o'clock was indeed a great shock to his large circle of friends in this City. Deceased had been enjoying fairly good health for the past two years and on Sunday morning between the hour of three and four a sudden spell of illness overtook him when he used the telephone and called his physician to his bedside. When his home was reached, we understand he had breathed his last. Mr. Shadel was aged 62 years and came to this City with his parents from Baltimore, Md., where he was born, when 5 of years of age. When a young man he engaged with his father in the saw mill business after which he went to swamping and followed that occupation until his demise. He was a man that did a great deal of philanthropic work during his life time and a number of years ago assisted others here in organizing the Knights of Temperance Society of which he filled the highest office until his health became so impaired it was necessary for him to relinquish those duties, he however, remaining a member up to his death. He was also an honorary member of Iberia Fire Company No. 1 and for years was a very active member of the Fire Department. Some years ago he also identified himself as a member of the Benevolent Society and Woodmen of the World, both of whom turned out in large numbers on the occasion of the funeral to pay tribute to their departed brother. Immediately after it became known that he had succumbed his friends, Mr. and Mrs. Leon Bagarry took charge of the remains which was placed in their home to await the arrival of his nephews who reside in the State of Ohio, the funeral being arranged to take place on Wednesday afternoon from the Methodist church. Deceased left no children to mourn his loss, his wife passing to the Great Beyond a number of years since. His death is a direct loss to the City and is deplored by the community.

The increasing high cost of food has been a problem which has agitated legislators and householders for some years. The great war now going on has multiplied the figures so that the most astute financier is staggered by the complex problem. The United States or perhaps we might say the Western Hemisphere seems destined to be for some time to come, the storehouse for the world, which fact means of course that if we are to feed the world, there must be an immense increase of production. Land from which all food must come, should be made to produce (to its limit). Every man who can and will handle a plough should get busy if he has or can get land to cultivate and if he has not he should be furnished it for a consideration within his reach. Coming down to small things, it behooves every one to see to it that every foot of idle ground on farm or city lot is put to use, for food supply. The vacant lots in this town should be converted into garden spots. In some towns in Mississippi this work is under direction of Civic Leagues in conjunction with the civil authorities and the school boys and girls are organized in squads for the practical work under intelligent direction. There will be buyers here for all kinds of farm produce raised on a large scale so that our markets are not likely to be over stocked with garden stuff so the home garden can be made to supply the home table.

ITEMS FROM THE BOY SCOUTS.

The local troop had their regular meeting on Friday night. After passing on the necessary business they proceeded with the initiation in the Loyal and Friendly Degrees. The following safely passed through these degrees: Langston White, Willie White, Lyle Fisher, Edmond Trappe and Edwin Simon.

In the death of Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, the Boy Scouts lost one of their best friends. Mrs. Wilson believed in the work of the Boy Scout Movement and did much to encourage and promote it. She showed her interest in many ways and on the occasion of the fourth annual meeting in Washington she received the National Council in the White House. On this occasion she pinned the Eagle Scout badge on the breasts of five Scouts who had earned the right to the honor.

Soon after the news of Mrs. Wilson's death was announced, requests began to come to National headquarters for some action by means of which the Boy Scouts of America might express their sympathy for their Honorary President in his great sorrow.

Acting on these suggestions, a five-foot floral design of the First Class Scout badge was sent to the White House in the name of the Boy Scouts of America and paid for from voluntary offerings.

All connected with the Scout Movement here and abroad have been conscientious and firm in their purpose in advocating universal peace. What part the Scouts will have in the present war is naturally of grave concern and deep interest to all engaged in Scouting the world over. It is too early to make any intelligent comment upon the significance of the reports thus far published in the press. Certainly all connected with the Boy Scout Movement know that each Scout and Scout official will, following the Scout Oath and Law to which he has subscribed, do his full duty.

Practically all of the reports already received from the countries engaged in war tell of Scouts doing all they can to relieve distress and suffering. In Germany the Scouts have volunteered to assist in gathering the harvests. In England the Scouts have volunteered their services as messengers where lines of communication have been cut, to patrol the exposed lines of communication, and to give warning if danger threatens. It is also reported that Scouts may be used to help care for the wounded. The Red Cross is organizing Scouts to assist in its work.

The Scout Movement has been established in each one of the countries now at war with an estimated enrollment of 350,000 boys.

Everyone interested in Scouting here will watch for all references to the Boy Scouts or the Boy Scout Movement with keen interest, and it is hoped that we may, working together, be effective in having correctly and clearly understood the significance of authentic reports which may be received from time to time.

The Boy Scout Movement is now doing, and will continue after this war to do, all in its power in the interest of peace scouting consistently hoping for the approach of the day when there will be no war.

An exceptionally fine indorsement of the Boy Scout Movement appears in the July Bulletin of the American Federation of

Catholic Societies. The reference to the Boy Scout idea is in editorial form and the text of it is as follows: "Philanthropists and reformers have brought into existence a large number of movements and betterment associations. The majority of such undertakings, which usually are based on charity instead of upon social justice, are the works of individual men interested only in their respective hobby. If, however, there is one movement that deserves universal support and encouragement it is the Boy Scout movement. Money and time spent for the co-ordination of the vitality of the boy is a profitable investment. It answers to a large degree the question of the 'boy problem' and in turn eliminates the problems incidental to the development of the younger generations."


