—For a number of years it has been evident that some steps be taken in this section for the protection of bird and fish life and in fact the enforcement of all conservation laws now on the statute books. On September 2d a meeting of the citizens interested in these laws met at the Court House for the purpose of organizing a good strong Association all pledged to see that all State and Parishes ordinances relative to the shooting of game only in season be put into effect. On Wednesday evening another meeting of the membership was held and by-laws and rules adopted which was signed by not less than twenty-five active members. The first officers are Messrs. W. B. Kramer, president with Mr. Clet Girard as secretary. The full minutes appearing in another column of this Journal.

—The wedding of Miss Addie L. Carter, daughter of Mrs. E. S. Carter of this City and Mr. George Gouch of Patterson, was solemnized at Alexandria, La., on September the 1st at the home of her brother, Mr. Jas. Carter. Miss Carter will be remembered by many as the former manager of the Postal Telegraph office in New Iberia. For the past year she had been holding a responsible position at Monroe. The young couple passed through New Iberia en route to their home at Patterson where they will reside in the future.

—On the occasion of the visit here of Mr. Roosevelt next Tuesday the Ladies Guild of the Episcopal church will sell refreshments in the Fisher building adjoining Hotel Frederic. The committees who have in charge the menu will spare no pains to serve refreshments and dinners that should be a drawing card that day. Our business men are also invited and requested to take dinner with them which will be sold at reasonable prices. The cause being a worthy one everybody is invited.

—We are more than pleased to announce to our readers that the Parish Demonstration Farm as outlined by the Federal Government will be placed upon Hope Farm, the Committee having made their report at Washington immediately after arriving there. This is certainly good news to our farmers who will soon be in position to attain much knowledge through the experts who will have the Live Stock Farm in charge. On Thursday last the Police Jury, in keeping with their promise to the committee made an appropriation of one-third the cost for the erection of the Pontoon Bridge at the Sandager Plantation just this side of Hope and also made an appropriation of \$1500 for the erection of dipping vats in each Ward for the eradication of the cattle tick which is so detrimental to this State. It is only a question of a few years when the entire quarantine imposed upon Louisiana will be raised and we will be in a position to obtain the same prices for our live stock as other sections that have freed themselves of this pest years ago. The people of this section should have reason to be thankful for the appropriation made for the Live Stock Demonstration Farm and had not our citizens got busy when they did, Iberville Parish would have captured it. It shows conclusively what can be done by concerted action on our part and we feel assured now that when questions come up that bear upon the whole people of this Teche Valley they will respond to a man as in this instance.

—For some time complaints have been made to us with reference to the slowness and delay in building the cement sidewalks in the Southern portion of New Iberia by the contractor, Mr. W. A. Prather. There are no complaints that we hear of about the quality of the work being put down, but the residents of that section are very much discouraged over the little progress being made. From what we are informed the work has been stopped for some cause or other for the past two weeks, which necessarily forces the pedestrians to walk in mud where the old walks have been removed to make room for the improvement. This is certainly an injustice to the property holders and steps should be taken by the City Commissioners to have the contractor finish the job. The sidewalks in that section of the City are almost all in such condition that they cannot be used and the Corporation takes a chance of having a damage suit on their hands should anyone fall and break a limb. In justice to the City, Mr. Prather should proceed at once with the improvement and not stop until it is finished in accordance with the contract.

—Indications point to the establishments of another rice mill in New Iberia in time for next season's crop. For some time Mr. Philip Conrad, one of Iberia's most successful rice farmers have, with others interested in the movement been concentrating their minds on a manufacture of this kind and this week it took such shape that Mr. Robert A. Jacob of the real estate firm of Jacob & Dallas has been busy trying to find a suitable location within easy reach of both railroad and water for shipping facilities. We understand he has found a site that will be acceptable to Mr. Conrad and within a few days the necessary arrangements will be made to take over certain property within the confines of the City. Some years ago New Iberia possessed one of the largest rice mills in this section of the State, but unfortunately it was taken, lock stock and barrel into an Association that dismantled it and removed the machinery elsewhere, thus removing the only rice mill we ever did possess and throwing a number of laborers out of employment which was a direct loss to the community. It now behooves the citizens of New Iberia to lend every assistance within their power to encourage Mr. Conrad to place this enterprise in this City. We feel certain it will be made a success as there is plenty of labor here with an abundance of raw material to draw from. The finest rice in the world is raised along the Teche and we never could understand why some one did not erect a plant of that nature here years ago. We need industries of every kind and New Iberia could be made a center for factories if our own capitalists would make the venture.

SEPTEMBER 8th TO BE A GALA DAY.

Committees who have in charge the entertainment of ex-President Theodore Roosevelt, who will reach New Iberia next Tuesday morning, Sept. 8th have been diligently at work arranging the program that will be put into effect for the entertainment of our distinguished guest. Mayor Fontelieu has issued a proclamation for the business houses to close between the hours of the reception and it is the intention to have every public place in this City decorated with flags and bunting such as it never has before. Arrangements have been made for the erection of a stand for the speakers on the Court House grounds where it will be possible for everyone who desires to lend his presence at the speaking to be present. Hundreds of visitors are expected here as the Southern Pacific is offering reduced rates over its line and the New Iberia & Northern are also making special efforts to bring people from Port Barre and all intersecting points. From what we are informed by members of the entertainment committee it is the intention to have several hundred citizens meet Mr. Roosevelt on the Model Road leading to this City from Jeanerette on horse back and he will be asked to ride into the City horse back. After reaching here he will take breakfast at one of the hotels and the meeting will then be opened with a few remarks by the Mayor. As stated in our last issue it behooves all of our citizens who have civic pride to do their best to give Mr. Roosevelt a hearty reception despite the fact that he is being brought here in the interest of the Progressive party. JOHN T. DEVALCOURT.

In the death of John T. DeValcourt which occurred at 12:30 last Thursday morning, New Iberia mourns the loss of an honored, respected and esteemed citizen. Born in New Iberia in 1846, a scion of one of the most prominent families of the Attakapas, Mr. DeValcourt spent almost his entire life in this community aiding in its development and ever ready to lend his efforts to its advancement. Although but a boy at the outbreak of the Civil War, he as the other youths of his day, became enthused in the cause of the Southland, and on attaining his seventeenth year, offered his services in her defense and served with distinction during the remainder of the conflict. A neatly framed, honorary discharge from the Confederate army, was a proud possession which he but recently was showing to his friends about town. On his return from war, Mr. DeValcourt took up the work of bookkeeping and accounting; and until his death was considered one of the most proficient in this section.

Always kind, genial and considerate of the feelings of others, Mr. DeValcourt was universally esteemed and many are the friends who mourn him and join us in expressing sincere sympathy to his devoted wife and sons, Harry and Jack; and to his sisters, Miss Elizabeth DeValcourt and Mrs. Sarah Barnard.

His funeral on Thursday afternoon was conducted at the home and grave by Aurora Lodge 193, F. & A. M., of which he was the last surviving charter member; and at the Episcopal church by Rev. R. R. Diggs, his pastor, the sacred edifice being much too small to admit the number of friends who wished to pay the last homage to his memory.
