We were presented this week with a stalk of sugar cane raised by one of the negro tenants of Mr. John R. Taylor whose place is situated near Cade Station. The stalk of cane is of the D 76 variety and contains 13 red joints, tipping the scales at three pounds and ten ounces. The tenant has cultivated 60 acres with two little Creole mules which shows that it is not necessary as some farmers seem to think, that cane to be worked properly requires big American animals. This shows what can be done here with cheap mules if our farmers would be satisfied to use nothing but native raised animals which takes less corn to keep up. This negro has always produced good paying crops since assuming charge of the place and others could do just as well if they made up their minds and farmed economically.

Some months since we called attention to the need of a pair of Fire horses for America Fire Co. No. 2 whose truck is entirely too heavy for the one horse compelled to pull their heavy hose carriage whenever there is an alarm. The fact that the truck of that Company is in the rear portion of the City and that nine-tenths of the alarms are given in at great distances, makes it obligatory on the part of the City that another animal be bought at an early date. It is almost a case of cruelty to animals to use only the one horse to pull the thousands of feet of hose in addition and it behooves those in authority to make the purchase of another animal as soon as possible as the work is too hard for one horse which is completely fagged out every time it answers an alarm. Is not this worthy of consideration by our City Fathers?

It was our pleasure this week to drop in at the New Iberia Foundry and Machine Shop owned by the estate of the late George Simon where we found almost the entire crew of the large machine shop employed, in fact it is one of the busiest places in the City at the present time. The proprietor of the Foundry have recently installed at a great expense one of the Davis Pressure Generators, a new invention for welding cast iron, brass, etc., thus obviating the necessity of casting when pieces of machinery get broken. The Generator works under a pressure of a thousand pounds and it is wonderful to see how easily iron can be welded together. The heat is so intense that the iron or brass is melted within a few minutes and expert can join the parts together in such manner that one would never know that a break had occurred. At the time of our visit there we found Mr. Paul Voorhies, the Manager and Foreman of the Shop making a thorough test of the new device. The beauty of the invention is that it generates its own gas at whatever pressure is desired.

Last Monday morning the City Court with Judge Nuckolls on the bench was convened to try the first case since he has assumed the office for a violation of the Sunday law. The party involved was Mr. Chas. E. Catadual, owner of the business place at one time owned by Mr. Jules Landry. It seems the violation of the law was committed on the 5th instant, but it was not until Saturday last that sufficient evidence could be obtained with which to make an arrest and bring the accused to trial. The defendant was represented by Hon. Edwin Broussard while the State's interest was ably looked after by District Attorney Muller.

Notice was given the Court that an appeal would be taken to the District Court.

A special meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was called last Monday evening by Secretary-Manager Bernard, the purpose of the meeting being mostly to take action on matters pertaining to the Southern Pacific railroad and the operation of its trains via Abbeville. For some time the Railroad Commission have been endeavoring to have them give the public a double daily service from this point to Midland and return for the convenience of the traveling public. This matter will come up before the Commission on Sept. 22d and the New Iberia Chamber of Commerce was asked to give their approval of the demand made by the Railroad Commission for the additional service. It was the decided opinion of a majority of the members present that the additional service would be of untold benefit to our little City and the public in general and they promptly voted to recommend the service. It is contended by the Railroad officials that it will cost the Company an additional thousand per month above running expenses and that it would necessarily be a hardship upon them were such service rendered for the accommodation solely of a few drummers. While we do not approve of working any unnecessary hardship upon any corporation if the double service will prove advantageous to our City we cannot but approve of the plan of the Railroad Commission. It is up to the Railroad to show the Commission wherein they will lose money. If they do not make expenses it will be a hardship upon the Company, however the experiment should be made for the convenience of the traveling public.
