Last Tuesday, death invaded the ranks of the Catholic clergy and removed from his sphere of usefulness, as pastor of the congregation of Arnaudville, the popular and well beloved Father Maisonneuve. While a student in his native France, the behest of the Master, "Take up thy cross and follow me" was given heed by the youth who later entered the priestly life to which this command directed him. Later, when duty dictated the abandonment of home, of friends and of country in order that he might labor in the Lords vineyard in a strange and distant land; the young priest never hesitating, bade farewell to all that was near and dear to him and journeyed to New Orleans where he reported to the Archbishop for assignment to whatever tasks might be allotted to him. Merited promotion for his earnest efforts among the French speaking populations finally gained him the pastorate of Arnaudville where he endeared himself to the entire population who to-day mourn his loss. His funeral last Friday, attended by the ceremonials due his station, was conducted by a large number of the clergy who came from all parts of the State to do homage to his memory and to consign his remains to the sacred grounds which lie adjacent to the little church where he had so

**GOD IS TRUE TO HIS WORD.**

It is not God, but man, who is on trial; man who prays often, not to the God of Christ, who declared that there can be no peace until righteousness is established, but to Gods of his own making, to the tribal God whose care is for his own people and not for all his children in all nations. God's truth has not failed, nor His love. He has never promised ease and physical comfort; He has never said that the world was made for man's pleasure. He has promised strength, but as the result of discipline, self-denial, and suffering; He has promised security, but as the result of overcoming evil with good; He has promised peace, but only when justice has been established; He has promised a redeemed world, but only when purity and love have been enthroned and crowned. Christianity has not failed; it has not even been tried. Hosts of men and women have lived by it, and been victorious over sorrow and trial, and died in the serenity of a faith which had become a life; but the world has never tried it. There is no Christian nation, nor is there a Christian civilization. In every nation there are sincere and faithful Christians, but there is no nation which, in spirit, institutions, and law, conforms to the law of Christian love. Some nations have gone farther than others in Christian experience and the endeavor to make Christianity the controlling principal of national life; but no nation has yet gone beyond the early stages of this radical reconstruction.—The Outlook.

**RACE SEGREGATION.**

The Trotter incident shows that there is a growing tendency among educated negroes of the north to oppose race segregation not only in government offices but in public buildings and conveyances, in places of amusement and public entertainment and in places of residence. The incident shows that a few negro leaders in the north are growing bolder in their demands, for they

have not hesitated to invade the White House and insult the president of the United States, and they have subsequently held public indignation meetings for the purpose of justifying their course.

The negro Trotter does not represent the best men of his race. He represents only those educated negroes who seek social equality with the white man. The better part of the colored race is represented by Booker T. Washington, who believes that the negroes will be given such recognition as he earns it and that the mission of the real friends of the race is to prepare it for better things.

"Segregation," says the Shreveport Times, "deprives the negro of no right to which he is entitled under the law. It does not bar him from employment in the government service. It does not operate against his pay. It simply recognizes a fact. That fact is that there is a color line; that it was drawn by nature and not by law; and that there is no way of bridging it without harm. The negro who does not recognize these things lacks pride of race and becomes a menace to its inviolable rules."

**IMPORTANT NOTICE TO SHIPPERS.**

We quote for your information Section from the War Revenue Act No. 217, entitled "An Act to Increase the Internal Revenue and for other purposes."

"Express and freight: It shall be the duty of every railroad or steamboat company, carrier, express company or corporation or person whose occupation is to act as such, to issue to the shipper or consignor, or his agent, or person from whom any goods are accepted for transportation, where a charge exceeding five cents is made a bill of lading, manifest, or other evidence of receipt and forwarding for each shipment received for carriage and transportation, whether in bulk or in boxes, bales, packages, bundles or not so inclosed or included; and such shipper, consignor agent or person shall duly attach and cancel as is in this Act provided, to each of said bill of lading, manifests or other memorandum, a stamp of the value of 1 cent; Any failure to issue such bill of lading, manifest, or other memorandum as herein provided, shall subject such railroad or steamboat company, carrier, express company, or corporation or person, to a penalty of \$50.00 for each offense."

Under this Act it is incumbent on the shipper to furnish the revenue stamps and affix such stamp to each dray receipt or bill of lading and cancel such stamp at time bill of lading or dray receipt is presented to the Agent of the carrier for signature.

Where shippers are in the habit of obtaining dray receipts for their shipments and subsequently exchanging such dray receipts for bills of lading, the dray receipts should invariably bear the proper revenue stamp as it is not permissible for the carrier to sign any form of receipt for goods offered for transportation unless such receipt contains the necessary stamp. When these dray receipts are exchanged for bills of lading, such bills of lading will contain a notation accordingly, as it is not necessary to affix a stamp to both the original dray ticket and bill of lading.

In order to avoid delay, it is suggested that shippers provide themselves with supply of stamps to be affixed to all dray receipts or bills of lading, effective December 1st.


