PACKING COMPANIES GET JOLT.

Jefferson City, Mo., Feb. 9.—Armour & Co., Swift & Co., Morris & Co., the St. Louis Dressed Beef and Provision Company and the Hammond Packing Company were found guilty today of violation of the State anti-trust law by the Missouri Supreme Court. An ouster order was issued, but the companies may remain on the payment of \$25,000 each. The court declared that the National Packing Company, organized by the Swift, Armour and Morris companies, acquired two other companies to control the supply of live stock and the output of dressed beef.

EX-CHIEF JUSTICE APPEARS AS LAWYER FIRST TIME IN YEARS.

For the first time in twenty-four years Hon. Joseph A. Breaux, former chief justice of the State Supreme Court, on Wednesday appeared before that tribunal of which he was a member for almost a quarter of a century, to plead as practitioner at the bar, a case on appeal.

The ex-chief justice retired from the office which he had held more than twenty-four years, only a short time ago. The case is that of Fred Frantz vs. Anthony P. Schiro, an action to recover \$2500 on a promissory note made by Schiro, representing part of the credit price of the purchase of a shoe store at Canal and Rampart streets, purchased by Schiro from F. Roth, in 1911. Judgment was rendered in the civil court in favor of the defendant, Schiro, and the appeal followed.—States.

GERMANY'S ORDERS GROW.

New York, Feb. 10.—Exports at this port in the week ending Feb. 6 were \$23,526,602, compared with \$26,272,091 in three weeks before. This year's exports to date total \$148,146,690, against \$119,413,507 in the same period last year.

Germany's orders were larger than at any period since the European war began, shipments to that country totalling \$1,670,202. England's shipments for the week were valued at \$4,486,815, and those of France aggregate \$3,191,362. Italy's purchases, largely grain, totalled \$2,238,834.

How completely the Mexican situation has disrupted New York's trade with Mexico is revealed in the statement that exports for the week were next to the lowest of any country being only \$1,380.—States.

New York, Feb. 10.—According to a weekly report by the commission for relief in Belgium, issued Tuesday, the commission has transported to date or arranged for transportation, a total of 280,431 tons of food in forty-six ships.

DEBT GREATLY INCREASED.

Total debt of the five leading European nations involved in the present war stood at the beginning at approximately \$23,700,000,000. After little more than four months' fighting, it had increased four and a quarter billions, or nearly one-fifth. At this rate, it would advance 50 per cent in a year, and double itself if the war continues for two years.

With the exception of England which, with its recent \$1,700,000 loan, is financed ahead for some months, the nations at war do not seem to have funded their expenditures any distance into the future. New loans are contemplated by several of them. For that reason the loans so far negotiated seem a fair indication of the rate at which financing will be done throughout the war.

As a considerable part of the financing done by Germany, France and Austria, subsequent to the outbreak of the Balkan war, was for military preparation, it is proper to add that to the total. In the following table the debts of the five principal belligerents as of 1913, as compared with the amount since issued, follows:

This increase in loans already made means an increase in annual interest charges of these five nations of approximately \$230,000,000. The borrowing now has to be done at higher rates than those which obtain on the older debts. The increase in interest is nearly 27 per cent, the annual charge in 1912 for this purpose being \$897,116,000.—Shreveport Times.

One of the valuable things that was pushed by the farmers' short course meeting at Baton Rouge last week was the value of sugar cane tops, etc., for storing in silos and feeding to live stock. The speakers told the South Louisiana sugar planters present at the meeting that enough silage of this kind had been destroyed and burned each year in the sugar district to have furnished food for stock that would have made possible the shipment of trainload after trainload of stock to the markets. It is said that many of the sugar planters have already begun to follow the advice given. If it is generally followed, the sugar country will soon "blossom as the rose," as the saying goes.—Alexandria Town Talk.
