The Association will be of mutual benefit as numerous plans were proposed by which the country merchant could lop off unnecessary expenses in the delivery of goods. As conditions are at this time, deliveries are made of as little as five cents worth of matches which not only causes great inconvenience to the storekeeper but it is done at an actual loss. This together with other losses is responsible for the businessmen's failure.

## LEAGUE TEMPERANCE MEETING

An interesting temperance meeting was held last Sunday night at the Methodist church by the Epworth League. The subject presented was "Epworthians as Dike Builders against Rum." The topic suggests the dikes of Holland which are built to keep out the water. So the great work before the League is how to keep the liquor traffic out of this country. A brewers' convention recently said: "Our chief enemies are the Methodist Church, the Baptist Church, the Epworth League, and the Anti-Saloon League." As usual the brewers were short on information, but they were right as far as they went. The most formidable host against them are the young people. They have leaped eagerly into every campaign that has been waged. They have made themselves count in every skirmish. The Lincoln-Lee Legion is a movement to get boys and girls and young people to sign a pledge of total abstinence and of active opposition to the liquor traffic. There is an active Legion in this City and it means that the young people are determined to get rid of the saloons. These militant youths can be depended on to fight longer, take defeat more cheerfully, and come back more perseveringly than any army of mercenaries that can be hired by money or patronage or liquor to take the field against them.

## ORDINANCE NO. 63.

The following ordinance was introduced by Mr. Suberbielle, seconded by Mr. Villermin:

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the City of New Iberia that it shall be unlawful for any person to build or construct bridges or steps of wood in any street of the City where concrete sidewalks have been constructed.

Sec. 2. In building bridges or steps whether of wood or other material, the same shall be built so as not to in any way obstruct or interfere with the drainage of the street.

Sec. 3. Any bridge or step constructed in violation of this Ordinance shall be taken up at the expense of the person violating this ordinance and who in addition be liable to a fine of not less than One Dollar nor more than Five Dollars.
