## DON'T LET THE FLIES AND MOSQUITOES GET A START.

Every year the ay-borne disease, typhoid fever, and the mosquito-borne malaria are responsible for thousands and thousands of unnecessary deaths, lingering illnesses, greatly impaired efficiency, and untold millions in doctor's bills.

Typhoid fever and malaria are preventable disease, and there is no good reason why they should not be absolutely banished from our country. It may sound a little hard, but do you know that it is somebody's fault when there is an outbreak of typhoid in your family or your neighborhood? Somebody's fault when your loved ones suffer from malaria borne by mosquitoes that should never have been allowed to breed? Right now is the time to fight these death-carrying pests, and it is again a case where an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

Don't let the flies and mosquitoes breed. Perhaps 90 per cent of the common house flies breed in horse manure in the stables, and this can be prevented by cleaning out the stables at least once a week and keeping the manure in screened receptacles until it can be put on the fields.

If this cannot be done, powdered borax frequently sprinkled over the manure will keep flies from breeding. Then be careful to see that no flies have access to privies and garbage piles, and our usual plague of flies will be a thing of the past.

Science has proved that a particular kind of mosquito is entirely responsible for malaria, and if this particular species of mosquito never bites us we are certain never to suffer with chills and fever. Here, too, it is a simple case of prevention—not letting these pests breed. All ponds and stagnant pools should be drained, or if this is impossible, they should be oiled once a week. Buckets, barrels, tin cans and like receptacles should be kept emptied of water, and thickets of weeds and underbrush that might harbor mosquitoes should be cleaned up.

After all these precautions have been taken, every window and door in the house should be carefully screened. The expense of this will not be great, and it is the best kind of insurance against doctors' bills, sickness and death. Good health is one of the biggest and best things life gives us. Let's make sure of our share of it by swatting the fly and mosquito.

### HIGHEST SALARIED STATION AGENT DIES AT MORGAN CITY.

Morgan City, La., May 10.—Baron Randolph Natili, diplomat of the Southern Pacific railroad, "pal" of Eugene Fields and known as the highest salaried railroad station agent of the country, which was \$25,000 a year, died today, aged 71. He was better known in Washington and national diplomatic circles than in his home town. He was personally acquainted with every railroad president in the country, and years ago attracted the attention of Charles Whitney, A. C. Hutchinson and Collis P. Huntington.

Baron Natili was the head diplomatic agent of the Southern Pacific, and although ostensibly station agent at Morgan City until his death, was entrusted by the railroad with the handling of all of its difficult matters of diplomacy with the United States government at Washington and with other railroads.

Collis P. Huntington first recognized the remarkable qualities possessed by Baron Natili. The friendship between the two grew so that they made several European trips together and finally Baron Natili was trusted with the Southern Pacific's most intricate work. He was the station agent in the name only at Morgan City. Most of his time was spent in different sections of the United States.

He was taken ill in New York a few days ago. His brother-in-law, Dr. Charles Chassignac, brought him to Morgan City.

## CALLS ROOSEVELT "A GOD SEND" TO THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY.

Tupelo, Miss., May 10.—Vice President Marshall spoke to a large and intelligent audience tonight at the Comus theater on "National Tendencies."

Mr. Marshall's talk was very interesting, being interposed with amusing incidents in national life. He stated that he thought Theodore Roosevelt was what his name signified—"A God send to the Democratic party. He spoke of the sinking of the Lusitania, stating that it was without precedence in modern times and called for careful and serious investigation before talking hasty steps. He censured those who were so hasty in demanding a declaration of war without serious investigation. He stated that he considered that when a person boarded an English vessel he was virtually on English soil and must expect to stand the consequences.

Mr. Marshall stated that there were too many men crying for war who would not enlist unless given a position of selling goods to the commissary department, and who did not consider the awful seriousness of war. He stated that the mission of the American people was to take a forward step in the interest of peace rather than a backward step for war. He said that he trusts his chieftain at Washington and not until he says "strike" will he speak in favor of war.

"The trouble with our civilization, especially of the North and West," said Mr. Marshall "is not trying to follow the steps of the 'prince of peace' instead of scheming to evade the laws of the legislature."



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### OPPOSED TO THE JAPANESE.

Thibodaux, La., May 5.—There has been so much recent agitation on the question of organizing Japanese farmers into Louisiana, that the Louisiana farmer has become really alarmed by the prospect. At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Louisiana Distributing Company, which is formed of local associations throughout the Lafourche territory, and beyond, the matter was thoroughly discussed from every viewpoint, and the consensus of opinion was strongly opposed to this movement. As a result of this discussion a committee was appointed to draft the following resolution:

"Be It Resolved; That it is the sense of this body as representative of its membership, that the invasion of the Japanese in our community will prove a menace to our farmers, to our merchants, to our landowners, and to our State at large; that the Japanese element is against civic improvement, is against progress, and is obnoxious in every respect to the general growth and development of our country; and that it shall be the purpose of this organization to take its stand against any introduction of these resolutions be read in the minutes of this body; that a copy of same be sent to representative publications of this State, and a copy be sent to the General Assembly, now about to go in session, with the prayer that same be read before that body; and that other organizations similar to ours be asked to join us in this movement."

One of the strongest arguments against the Japanese was presented by Mr. Krumbhar, who spent several years in the Hawaiian Islands, where he came in close personal contact with the results brought about by their having gained a foothold. He dwelt at considerable length upon the inevitable depreciation of the value of loans that is bound to follow in the wake of Japanese settlers. This is due to the fact

that they will lay out nothing for improvements and that they find so many ways to make themselves objectionable to American neighbors, that the latter are glad to sacrifice their holdings of real estate in order to get away from their environment. Patience and perseverance are the most solid virtues of the little brown race, and it stands them in good stead when it comes to playing the game of "freeze-out," which is their chief method of obtaining the desired surrender of property holders. Experience is considered a good teacher, and these men evidently desire to profit by the lessons she has taught with California as a pupil.
