The flooring was shipped here dressed from St. Landry Parish where there is an abundance of it, which is being put on the market to replace Pine, so generally used heretofore. This calls to our mind the great quantity of hard wood in the swamps of this Parish that awaits the cutting and dressing, were we to have mills here that would be prepared to work up this particular timber which would have a market throughout the United States. Had not the proposed canal to the Grand Lake been abandoned, New Iberia would have been a great market for the hard wood so near its proximity and no doubt there would have been several mills here employing our people, turning out all kinds of wood-work that would put outside money into circulation here. Our readers will remember that it was proposed to join hands with the owners of land traversing the proposed route of the canal so as to make the burden as light upon our people as possible, as it would also reclaim thousands of acres of land that is now lying idle. In conversation with Mr. Albert Mestayer, one of the active advocates of the movement to cut the canal through the Fausse Pointe section this week, he stated that while the people in his section favored the levy of a small tax for that purpose, it was useless to try and carry an acreage tax of 25c per acre as it was entirely too much for the good that they would derive from the drainage. This movement should again be taken up by our people and see if some arrangement could not be arrived at that would give us the canal to the Lake.
