A case of much interest that came up before Judge Simon of the District Court this week in which a decision was rendered sustaining a decision of the City Court, issued by Judge Nuekolls some weeks since, has settled forever the rights of barrooms to open their restaurants which is in the same building on Sunday. It will be remembered some two months ago, Judge Nuekolls served notices that in no places where both saloons and restaurants were operated would he permit their doors to be opened on that day, irrespective of whether the bars were screened or not. Contrary to his warnings the law was violated which resulted in him imposing a \$250.00 fine on the guilty parties. The case was appealed, as stated above, and on Thursday His Honor, James Simon, sustained the verdict as rendered. He stated however, that had the case appeared before him owing to the exceedingly depressed times he would very probably imposed only a nominal fine upon the guilty person. From what we are informed Judge Nuekolls may accede to the oral request of Judge Simon and reduce the penalty for this first offense. He is as determined as ever to enforce the law which is very explicit in prohibiting the opening of any doors of a building wherein liquors are dispensed on Sunday.

—Despite the dry weather the rice crop this season is as fine as it has ever been at any season of the year, notwithstanding the fact that many of our farmers who went into the culture very extensively, were held back owing to the cold spell which lasted so late in the season at the time planting operations should have been in full blast. There is on display in the show window of the New Iberia Hardware Company an excellent batch which was raised on the place of Mr. Lee Gonsoulin near Loreauville. Yesterday Mr. Philip Conrad and his father, Mr. Adrien Conrad commenced cutting and on Monday, we understand Mr. Conrad will commence his mill on the East Side of the Teche. Once this crop begins to be harvested money will commence to circulate in our midst quite freely. In the Loreauville section of this Parish the fields are simply beautiful with this cereal, in fact almost that entire section has substituted rice for cane this season. In conversation with Mr. S. L. Broussard, our Parish Farm Demonstrator he told us that he was afraid the people of that vicinity would devote too much of their land to that one crop. He would much prefer seeing them diversify by raising a little cane, rice and corn and if prices and yield on one was not remunerative to the farmers, then the other crops would make up the deficiency. In this Mr. Broussard is correct: it is diversification that is wanted. There is too much risk when all of the eggs is put into one basket. Our farmers ought to profit their experiences in the past when everything was sugar cane. If we are to plant one crop only it would be much better were it to be in corn which would mean hogs, and in fact all kind of live stock and chickens and better results would be obtained and the small farmer would become more prosperous.

The negro boy who recently robbed the residences of Dr. Mauldin, Harry Winters, E. H. Buffinton, Mrs. H. Scharff, Edgar Landry and others was caught with some of the goods by Officer Broughton and is now held in custody until he can be sent to the House of Correction. The boy is barely 12 years old and is so criminally inclined that it will take several years close confinement to cure him of his mania. This week a Radiator was stolen from the Garage of Messrs. LeBlanc & Broussard by some white boys which was also recovered by the officers and the accused brought before the City Court and severely reprimanded. Most of these acts of petty thievery have been committed in the day time, but were the officers to take into custody all children under 17 years that are permitted to roam the streets at night they would very probably not get into such company that would lead them astray. Parents themselves should see that their children are under their own roof after nightfall unless they are accompanied by an adult. Nothing more than promiscuous hanging around street corners lead these boys into malicious mischief which is bound to make criminals of them when they become older. There is absolutely no use of having a curfew law on our statute books if it is not enforced by the officials and as the law is a good one we would like to see it rigidly enforced.

The criminal term of the District Court was concluded last Thursday with Mr. L. Tasker Dulany representing the State as its prosecuting attorney. There were upwards of twenty-five convictions with five or six acquittals which is an excellent showing. Mr. Dulany has made this Parish a splendid prosecuting attorney considering the fact that he had but little time to study his cases. He has received a great many compliments for the manner in which he prosecuted those brought before the bar of justice. In selecting Mr. Dulany to succeed the late Mr. Muller, the Governor could not have made a better selection. One thing that speaks well for the Parish was the fact that there were no murder cases. It is proven conclusively that Iberia Parish is entitled to a Parish Court that would be in session continuously so as to keep the jail free of prisoners which cost the Parish thousands of dollars yearly. Under the present conditions prisoners charged with petty offenses that cannot come up before the City Court have to remain in jail for months until the District Court is convened. It would be well if a Constitutional Convention be called, to extend the jurisdiction of the City Court to include the entire Parish. We are satisfied better results would

be obtained and there would not be near so much minor infractions of the Law. As it is today many cases are brought before the Grand Jury and a lot of time lost securing indictments and ferriting out frivolous charges that never should have any attention of the Court and certainly should not take up the time of the Grand Jury.
