The Rev. Francis J. McConnell, a bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church, is now in the United States after a number of visits to Mexico, and his opinion of affairs in that country will be of interest to his fellow-Americans who are anxious for the restoration of peace and prosperity in that nation. Bishop McConnell has visited Mexico many times in the interest of the denomination in which he holds so high a place. Five of these tours have been made since February, 1913, and in this period he was twice in the country denominated by Villa and three times in Mexico City. His views are therefore of a man who knows whereof he speaks.

He tells us that one great trouble with Mexico is that foreigners have gone there for individual profit and not for any interest in the country. Another trouble is the land question. In 1894 President Diaz ordered a survey of the land his satellites managed to get hold of huge tracts from which the natives were driven by force. In Mexico it makes no difference who votes, but much depends on who counts the votes.

The currency system has been completely disorganized and money of small denominations is merely paper with numbers printed on it. The country is deadlocked and Mexicans are killing each other for personal differences, as the fundamental principles of Villa, Carranza and Zapata are the same. Villa is simply one man power; he even takes charge of appointing the Catholic bishops in the district under his control. Carranza is intellectual, but he is pig headed and stubborn, while Zapata is a communist and agrees to divide everything if it is all to him first.

As to the duty of the United States Bishop McConnell asks: "Shall we go in and take the country outright?" He makes this answer. This would mean a bloody business, not that so many Americans might be killed, but that we should have to kill so many natives before they would be subjugated. They are most indifferent people to death.

ORDINANCE.

Whereas, the Sixth Ward of Iberia Parish, as it is now constituted, has more than one thousand qualified voters residing within the limits of its boundaries, and

Whereas, it is a matter of physical impossibility for the qualified voters at a general election to cast their ballots and have them counted and tabulated within the time limit prescribed by law, now therefore:

Sec. 1. Be it resolved and ordained by the Police Jury of Iberia Parish, in regular session assembled, that for the purpose of holding all National, State and Parochial elections, the Sixth Ward of Iberia Parish, be, and the same is hereby divided into Four Voting Precincts of which the following are the description, viz:

Precinct No. 1.—To comprise all that territory situated within the corporate limits of the City of New Iberia, lying North by Iberia Street, from Bayou Teche to the East Side of Madison Street, thence along the East Side of Madison Street to Corinne Street, thence out Corinne Street to the Corporate limits of the City of New Iberia; and all that territory contiguous to the above described lines, situated in the Sixth Ward of Iberia Parish, outside of the Corporate limits of the City of New Iberia to the line of the Fifth and Seventh Wards and to the line of St. Martin Parish.

The voting place of Precinct No. 1 is hereby designated and declared to be the Parish Court House.

Precinct No. 2.—To comprise all that territory situated within the Corporate limits of the City of New Iberia lying south by Iberia Street, from Bayou Teche to the East Side of Madison Street, thence along the East Side of Madison Street to Bank Avenue thence out Bank Avenue to the Corporate limits of the City of New Iberia; and all that territory contiguous to the above described lines; situated in the Sixth Ward of Iberia Parish outside of the Corporate limits of the City of New Iberia to the line of the Second and Seventh Wards.

The voting place of Precinct No. 2 is hereby designated and declared to be the Fire House of Fire Company No. 1 at the corner of St. Peter and Julia Sts.

Precinct No. 3.—To comprise all that territory situated West of Madison Street and between the North Side of Bank Avenue and the South Side of Iberia Street to the Corporate limits of the City of New Iberia; and all that territory contiguous to the above described lines situated in the Sixth Ward of Iberia Parish, outside the Corporate limits of the City of New Iberia to the line of the Seventh Ward.

The voting place of Precinct No. 3 is hereby designated and declared to be the Fire House of Fire Company No. 2 on Hacker Street between Center and Weeks Streets.

Precinct No. 4.—To comprise all that territory situated on the East Side of Bayou Teche within the confines of the Sixth Ward of Iberia Parish, both within and without the Corporate limits of the City of New Iberia.

The voting place of Precinct No. 4 is hereby designated and declared to be at the Veterinary Hospital of Dr. J. A. Goodwin on Pollard Avenue near Marie St.

Sec. 2. Be it further resolved, etc., that in order to more definitely describe the boundaries of said voting precincts, that the Police Jury have a map made defining the lines of each precinct be made a part of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. Be it further resolved and ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force on the first day of January 1916, and that all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, be, and the same are hereby repealed.
